ORDER GRANTING CONFIDENTIALITY TO PORTIONS OF FPC's MARCH, 1989 FUEL REPORT FORMS

Florida Power Corporation (FPC) has requested specified confidential classification for Forms 423-1(a), 423-2(b) and 423-2(c) of its March 1989 fuel report.

All of these documents contain information related to the company's fuel contracts. Disclosure of this information, FPC contends, would likely impair its ability to negotiate future fuel and transportation contracts because it would inform potential bidders of current prices paid for services.

Section 366.093(1), Florida Statutes, states in pertinent part:

... Upon request of the public utility, any records received by the Commission which are shown to be proprietary confidential business information shall be kept confidential and shall be exempt from s. 119.07(1).

Subsection (3) of the section defines proprietary confidential business information as, among other things, information concerning bids or other contractual data, the disclosure of which would impair the efforts of the utility to contract for services on favorable terms. Our confidentiality rules state that classification of material as proprietary confidential business information can be justified by demonstrating how the information it contains falls under one or more of the statutory examples. Rule 25-22.006(4), Florida Administrative Code.

An examination of the FPC document DN 4760-89 shows that it contains confidential information which, if released, could affect the company's ability to contract for fuel on favorable terms.

In consideration of the foregoing it is

ORDERED that the information FPC seeks to protect from public disclosure on its March 1989 FPSC Forms 423-1(a), 423-2(a), 423-2(b) and 423-2(c), identified as DN 4760-89 is confidential and shall continue to be exempt from the requirements of Section 119.07(1), Florida Statutes. It is further

ORDERED that if a protest is filed within 14 days of the date of this order it will be resolved by the appropriate Commission panel pursuant to Rule 25-22.006(3)(d), Florida Administrative Code.
