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PROCEEDINGS

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(Hearing convened at 6:00 p.m.)

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Ladies and gentlemen, if I can have your attention, please. We'll go ahead and call the hearing to order. We will begin by having the notice read.

MS. CAPELESS: Pursuant to notice, this time and place has been designated for a customer service hearing in Docket No. 950495-WS, application for a rate increase and increase in service availability charges by Southern States Utilities, Inc.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Thank you. We'll take appearances. We'll begin with Mr. Shreve.

MR. SHREVE: Jack Shreve, Public Counsel, representing the Citizens of the State of Florida and the customers of Southern States Utilities against the rate increase.

MR. FEIL: Matthew Feil, 1000 Color Place, Apopka, Florida, here on behalf of Southern States Utilities, Inc.

MS. CAPELESS: And I'm Rosanne Capeless, appearing on behalf of the Commission Staff.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Ladies and gentlemen,
I'm going to stand up so you can hear me. We have a
very crowded room here. Let me begin by introducing

myself, my name is Terry Deason. I'm a member of the Public Service Commission, and I will be chairing the hearing this evening.

Seated to my right is Commissioner Julia Johnson, and seated to my left is Commissioner Joe Garcia. I also want to take this opportunity to introduce you to a few of our Staff members who are here tonight. They are here to assist you. If you have any questions which you would like to speak to someone personally about, they will be here and will be available for that.

First of all, I'll begin with the attorney,
Ms. Rosanne Capeless, she introduced herself earlier.
And seated to her right is Mr. Marshall Willis.
Seated to her left is Mr. Troy Rendell. And seated to his left is Mr. Stan Rieger.

These folks are with our professional Staff in the Water and Wastewater Division of the Public Service Commission. They are accountants and engineers and rate analysts. I think that they can help you with any questions that you may have.

For those of you who may not have heard where the voices were coming from, seated to my far right is Mr. Jack Shreve, who is the Public Counsel for the state of Florida. He works for the

legislature, and it's his assigned responsibility to represent you, the customers, in opposition to this rate request.

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And seated to my near right is Mr. Matt Feil. He is an attorney who works for Southern States Utilities, and it is his position that the rate request which they are asking is justified.

That's pretty much the players. We also have a court reporter from the Public Service Commission who will be recording this proceeding. It will become part of the official record in this docket and will be available to the Commission in making its decision in this case.

The purpose of the hearing this evening is to hear from you, the customers, concerning this request which has been filed with the Public Service Commission. We are interested in hearing your comments on the quality of service Southern States Utilities provides to you. We are interested in your comments concerning the rate request, both the amount of the request, as well as the rate structure which is being proposed by Southern States Utilities. We encourage you to please participate in this process. That's what we are here for is to hear from you.

The schedule of this case is such that,

first off, it was initiated by a filing, an application for a rate increase, that was filed by Southern States Utilities. The Public Service Commission has no control whatsoever when a company seeks to change its rates. We do statutorily have to process a rate case within eight months after it is filed. That is what we are doing at this point.

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The case is at the point where we are hearing from customers. We are holding a number of customer hearings throughout the state. In fact, we basically have been out of Tallahassee all this week at hearings like this around the state.

Also, while we are going through this process, Mr. Shreve's office and other intervenors who have intervened on behalf of certain homeowner groups throughout the state are being involved in the process of litigating this case by conducting discovery, writing testimony, and things of that nature.

The technical portions of the hearings will be held in Tallahassee beginning April the 29th.

There are approximately two weeks set aside to hold those hearings in Tallahassee. At that point we will be taking expert testimony from the Company, and from Mr. Shreve, and from the other intervenors; and that testimony will be part of the record, just like your

testimony will be part of the record.

I believe that this case is scheduled for a decision sometime in the August time frame; is that correct? So we are still in this eight-month process and, hopefully, a decision will be made by August.

The procedure we are going to follow here this evening is, in just a moment I'm going to have Mr. Shreve give a brief opening statement, Mr. Feil give a brief opening statement. After they complete their opening statements, I'm going to ask all the members of the public who have signed up and who wish to testify this evening to stand and to be sworn in. This is necessary so that your testimony can become part of the official record, as I indicated to you earlier.

When we finish with the opening statements and after we swear witnesses in, Mr. Shreve will be calling members of the public to come forward. When he calls your name, we ask that you come forward to the podium and begin by giving us your name, and spelling your last name so it will be correct in the record, and to give us your address, and which system you receive service from. Then you may proceed with your statement.

We do not impose strict time limits on your

statements. The only thing we do is we ask customers to please be mindful that there are many others waiting to testify as well, to please be courteous to your neighbors.

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We are under rather cramped conditions this evening. For that, I do apologize. We did not anticipate this many customers being here, but we want all of you to be as comfortable as possible. And we are certainly interested in what you have to say, and we appreciate your bearing with us.

So at this point, I'm going to begin with opening statements. And, Mr. Feil, we'll allow you to take your time for the opening statement at this time.

MR. FEIL: Thank you, Commissioner.

My name is Matthew Feil. I'm here on behalf of Southern States Utilities, Inc. Southern States filed the rate case now under consideration because it is not able to earn a reasonable profit from the rates in effect prior to this case as being filed. Since SSU's last consolidated rate case, which included SSU's facilities in Martin County, but not in St. Lucie County, SSU has invested and will invest an additional \$100 million in utility plant statewide. Rates in SSU's last case were set using 1991 information. So SSU's additional investments since

that time, roughly \$20 million a year through 1996, were not considered in that case.

in this case showing that in 1994 SSU earned less than a 3% return on its investment. Because of the increased investments that I have mentioned, that return will diminish in 1995 and 1996, and SSU will lose money. Despite these poor returns, SSU has continued to invest in plant additions primarily because it is required to do so by the Department of Environmental Protection, the Environmental Protection Agency, the Water Management District, and other governmental agencies, rules, regulations, permits, orders, and the like.

In Martin County alone, from 1992 through 1994, SSU's plant investments have increased by approximately \$835,000. With increased investments and expenses caused by increased regulation and service requirements comes a need for revenue adjustments. Electric utilities experienced higher investment requirements and higher revenue needs in the early 1980s such that it was not unusual for an electric bill to be as much \$100 a month. Water and wastewater utilities have been facing similar pressure since the mid-1980s when the Clean Water Act was

passed.

What I've just discussed is one of the two major issues in this proceeding, the total revenue issue of this proceeding. The other major issue in this proceeding is rate structure, as Commissioner Deason has mentioned. The revenue issue concerns how much money in total SSU will be allowed to recover through rates. The rate structure issue concerns which customer groups pay what portion of the total.

rate at the conclusion of this case. A uniform rate reflects a pooling of all revenue requirements from all of SSU's service areas throughout the state and has most customers paying the same uniform rate. A possible alternative to the uniform rate structure is what's called a stand-alone rate structure, where revenue needs or requirements for each individual locality are calculated separately, and rates can vary widely from one service area to the next, even though those service areas may be located within the same county.

How these different rate structures affect you, can be illustrated in two ways. First, Martin County customers who were affected from SSU's last case can compare the uniform rates that you had been

charged prior to this case being filed with what your stand-alone rates would have been at the conclusion of the prior case. For this comparison, the stand-alone 4 rates I'll refer to are modified stand-alone rates which the Commission approved in an order issued in response to a 1994 court decision reversing uniform rates.

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For every SSU service area in Martin County, the uniform rates are lower than stand-alone rates on a combined water and wastewater bill based on average use. That difference can range anywhere from \$3.50 a month lower in Leilani Heights, to \$55 a month lower in Fox Run.

The second comparison you can make to the two rate structures, you have in front of you on the blue sheets that the Commission passed out in the back. You may compare the potential final rates under the various rate structures listed there.

For those of you in Fisherman's Haven and Fox Ron in Martin County, the approved interim rates you see listed are higher than the potential final uniform rates. The interim rates are rates which the law allows SSU to collect while the rate case is pending. Those interim rates are subject to refund at the conclusion of the case.

The interim rates shown on the blue sheet follow a version of the stand-alone rate structure. If you look at those sheets for Fox Run and for Fisherman's Haven, the interim rates are higher than the final uniform rates SSU has requested at the conclusion of the case. The reason is because of the rate structure, even though the interim rates are based on 1994 information and the final uniform rates are based on 1996 information which reflect additional investment.

their stand-alone rates as proposed would be lower than uniform rates. You can see from the blue sheets whether you benefit or not. SSU favors uniform rates for all of its customers because, among other things, you all receive the same service from the same utility company, and uniform rates serve as insurance against rate spikes that may occur in the future as a result of increased investment in just one locality.

Thank you for your attention.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Thank you, Mr. Feil.

Mr. Shreve.

MR. SHREVE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. You know the one thing Southern States really doesn't want to talk about or doesn't want you to really focus on

is how much money they want, how much of an increase they want to walk away from this case with, which is really how this whole thing got started. We are here for a rate increase request on their part.

enough money. In the last rate case, there was a sale before that case of St. Augustine Shores, a utility, in St. Augustine. They made a \$6 million profit on that. We tried to have the Public Service Commission include that in the revenues or either amortize it so it would benefit the customers. Now, the customers in St. Augustine had supported that. They paid the taxes, they paid the interest, they paid a return to Southern States on it over the years, and to Deltona before that. The Public Service Commission declined to do that.

We have the same situation for a \$19 million profit right now that was in 1994 in Sarasota. That profit was not counted in the interim rate increase that was granted. That was in 1994.

Now, the first thing you ought to do is get the pot right and get all the money in there. They are receiving a return on money they have not invested. The figures that they quote are not real. They are phantom figures on an amount that was not

invested.

The Public Service Commission in the last case -- and I'll give you one example, the Deltona purchase. They paid \$9 million less for the Deltona systems than they were granted in the rate case. That means, right now and since the last rate case, you have been paying not only a return to Southern States on that \$9 million, but you've been paying depreciation to them on \$9 million that they didn't invest. And it's the same situation with Lehigh Acres where they bought it at a bankruptcy sale, like a bankruptcy sale, wrote it down, everything else. They bought a country club, a golf course, a motel, wrote everything else down to about 40%, except the utilities, but left that up there. That's in this case the same way.

making any money, they ought to count all of the money they have coming in and not just be raising the rates of the citizen of the state of Florida. I want to give you a few examples here in Martin County. Now, Tropical Isles is a little different because they were in the last rate case. They want to raise Tropical Isles from 13.33 to -- I think they've asked for 44.27 under the uniform. And if it was stand alone, it

would be 37.77. Either one of those is atrocious. (Applause)

Now, it's supposed to be a fair -- now, the law says a fair, just, and reasonable rate of return.

Now, we ought to put the numbers in. It will give the Public Service Commission the opportunity to make whatever decision they deem right. But I think in the back of their minds they better keep "fair, just, and reasonable" on the top, and that's where they better start.

In Martin County -- now there's been very little change in these numbers as far as population goes, so that didn't drive any of this. A little bit of change, but not very much. Fisherman's Haven, before the '92 case, you were paying for 6,000 gallons of water about \$8.68. If Southern States has their way coming out of this case, you'll be paying \$26.54. That's for water.

Fox Run, before the '92 case would be paying 11.29 for 6,000 gallons of water. And if Southern States has their way -- not that you would necessarily pay it; that's where they've got everybody confused. They have got all the customers fighting with each other rather than focusing on them. What they would want out of the pot from the people of the state of

Florida, they would want to go from 11.29 for 6,000 gallons to 65.98. (Audience response.)

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Now, I'm sure at their little meetings they had, they pointed that out to you, that that's what they wanted to pull out of the pot, and that's what they would get if they got what they wanted. For Leilani Heights for 6,000 gallons of water, they would go from 9.33 before the last rate case to 21.18.

And one thing, I haven't done this in the past, but a lot of these calculations are things that we brought out of the book. So if Southern States has any corrections they want to make to any of my figures, I would welcome it at any time.

On the total revenues for the Company -- and this is what really counts for them. Fisherman's Haven -- I didn't go down the sewer. Let me give you the sewer rates real quick. Fisherman's Haven, 6,000 gallons before the '92 case, 14.39. They want to take the revenue out -- or take your rates up in Fisherman's Haven -- at least that's for the money they want out -- 84.76. From 14.39 to 84.76. That's what they want out of the pot.

For Fox Run, you really are benefiting. You must have gotten an awful lot of good administration from Minnesota Power. From 9.99 before the '92 rate

case, up to 113.88. That's the stand-alone figure for 6,000 gallons. That's what money they want out of the total pot for the state of Florida representing your system. For Leilani Heights, 21.09 before the last rate case, 43.16 is what they would want.

Now, on revenues, which is the real meaningful thing to them, Fisherman's Haven before the '92 case, they were bringing in \$14,367. Out of this case, out of the pot they want 43,570.

From Fox Run before the '92 case, \$15,953 is what was coming in. They now want, paid by someone, \$100,245 from 15,900. Leilani Heights, they were bringing in 62,177, and they want 124,667. That's all for 6,000 gallons of water.

Now, for sewer -- did any of you attend any of their meetings that they had? (Audience response.)

I'm sure they told you all this, didn't they?

(Audience response.)

Oh, okay. I'll finish it up real quick, and they want to hear from you. Sewer systems,
Fisherman's Haven, before the '92 case, bringing in \$21,020. Out of this case they want \$111,129. Fox
Run, you were only bringing in \$10,779. They'll take care of that. They want \$131,114. From Leilani
Heights, we're bringing in \$110,000; and they want

191,000.

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Now, the only point I'm trying to make here is I hope everyone will begin to focus on what's going on here. There is a problem on argument, or different feelings about uniform rates and about stand-alone rates because some customers benefit by one and some customers benefit by others. But who's taking the money out of the system? No matter which rates you have, they get the same money; and I gave you some examples. And it is not just in this county.

Chuluota, a small system of relatively low income in eastern Orange County, their sewer rates, according to their calculations, they should get -- not necessarily from those people, but if not from them, from you -- \$271 a month for 6,000 gallons, sewer. That's outrageous.

Now, the first thing the Public Service

Commission should do is look at these individual rates
and cut down and say, okay, what's a reasonable rate,
and that's the most they are going to get. And don't
have anybody else pay the difference; let Southern

States eat it. If they can run the business to make a
profit after they made a business decision, then it
shouldn't be passed onto the customers and paid for by
the citizens of the state of Florida. (Applause)

We are going to put on a case. We are going to put on expert testimony. And we are going to put on evidence, and we're going to raise these same issues.

Now, I will have to tell you in all fairness, these three Commissioners did not vote in the last case, and they have not voted for the things that I was telling you the Public Service Commission did as far as giving them that higher rate base.

These three have not done that.

We are going to put on a case, and we'll raise these issues again. And we think our case and our evidence is going to show that there should be absolutely no rate increase. Quite the contrary, there should be a rate decrease, get the pot right and start the whole thing over. Thank you. (Applause)

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Ladies and gentlemen,

I failed to mention earlier -- and let me take the
opportunity to do that now -- that the blue
information sheet that was provided to you as you
entered the room, that the last page of that handout
is designed to be detached so that you may, if you
wish to avail yourself of the opportunity, to write
your comments to the Public Service Commission. We do
this because some customers do not wish to come and to

make a public statement. Some wish to just write 1 their comments. And if you wish to do that, you 2 certainly are encouraged to do that. 3 As I indicated earlier, I'm going to ask all 4 of those persons who have signed up and wish to 5 testify, to please stand and to raise your right hand. 6 All persons who plan to testify, who have signed up 7 and plan to testify, please stand and raise your right 8 9 hand. (Customers collectively sworn.) 10 COMMISSIONER DEASON: As I indicated, when 11 your name is called by Mr. Shreve, please come forward 12 to the podium and begin by giving us your name. 13 Please spell your last name, and give us your address 14 and the system from which you receive service. 15 Mr. Shreve. 16 MR. SHREVE: Yes, sir, Marie Levy. 17 (Applause) 18 19 MARIE LEVY 20 21 was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn, 22 testified as follows: 23

FLORIDA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

Is that L-E-V-Y,

WITNESS LEVY: My name is Marie Levy,

COMMISSIONER DEASON:

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ma'am? 1 WITNESS LEVY: L-E-V-Y. 5611 Hemingway 2 Court, Fort Pierce, Florida at Tropical Isles. 3 We've been getting a lot of conflicting 4 stories from SSU, letters and letters. First, it was 5 an increase of \$17. Then it went up to 36. Now it's 6 7 44. They say that they are going to charge us 8 for 6,000 gallons of water a month. Where do they get 9 the 6,000 gallons of use? I only use 1-, and most of 10 the people in the park use 1,000 or 2,000 gallons. 11 12 Can you answer that? COMMISSIONER DEASON: I take it that you are 13 on a flat rate in Tropical Isles; is that correct? WITNESS LEVY: That's right. So they say, I 15 don't know. 16 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Your service is not 17 metered? 18 WITNESS LEVY: No, no. We're on a flat 19 20 rate. COMMISSIONER DEASON: In other words, it's 21 the same amount regardless of the actual usage? 22 WITNESS LEVY: Yeah, 13.33 a month. 23 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Okay. Ma'am, I don't 24 have an answer to that question. I don't know why

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that is the situation. Mr. Feil, do you have any information? 2 MR. FEIL: They are on a residential 3 wastewater-only rate. SSU does not provide the 4 wastewater service to the park. SSU provides only the 5 wastewater service. That's why there's a flat rate. 6 7 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Who provides the water service? 8 MR. FEIL: I believe St. Lucie County does. 9 WITNESS LEVY: Fort Pierce. 10 COMMISSIONER DEASON: That usage information 11 is not available from that utility? 12 MR. FEIL: I cannot answer that question 13 because I do not know. 14 15 WITNESS LEVY: They say that they've done environmental improvements in the park. What 16 17 | environmental improvements have they done? We tried to find that out at the meeting last week. They 18 19 couldn't answer it. They said they put a fence up, they put a new pump in. That doesn't constitute a 250% raise. 21 MR. SHREVE: Mr. Feil would have to answer 22 23 that; I can't answer it. WITNESS LEVY: That's the answers; we were 24

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getting it.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Yes, ma'am. You've indicated the Company couldn't answer your questions at the beginning.

WITNESS LEVY: No, no. They said they put a fence up, they put a new pump in. They were given this plant. They want a fair return on their investment. What investment?

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Mr. Feil, she brings up a good point, and I didn't get a chance earlier.

Mr. Shreve's office had asked for discovery for certain things about the meetings and the correspondence and who they were mailed to. Has the company provided that yet?

MR. FEIL: As I recall, there were two requests, the first was for the information sent to the customers. I have not provided that information yet because I have not had the time to look through it all, but I do have it.

The second request was for advance notice of customer meetings. My understanding is that there are no additional customer meetings planned; however, that does not mean that when a customer group asks for SSU to do a presentation that one may not come about.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Ma'am, to answer your question a little bit, I want to make one thing clear.

We are not here to defend their request; to the contrary, we are here to scrutinize that request.

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And it's not our burden to try to convince you that what they've done is correct. In fact, they have a burden to demonstrate to us exactly what dollars they have spent, what they have spent it for, and to demonstrate to us that it was needed and that those dollars and those expenses were prudently incurred. They have that burden.

They are going to try to meet that burden during those hearings in Tallahassee which I've told you about earlier.

WITNESS LEVY: Okay.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: If they do not provide that information, they fail to meet their burden, then they will not get those expenses. That's what the whole hearing is about.

WITNESS LEVY: I understand that.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: I mean, I wish I could give you some information. I don't have it. We are going to pursue that further in Tallahassee, but it's their burden. And if that information is not forthcoming, they will not meet that burden.

WITNESS LEVY: This is not a regular sewer plant. It's an oversized septic tank with the drain

fields, that's what it is. So where is the big expenses in the environment? The water is filtered out before it goes into the drain fields.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Just out of curiosity, ma'am. You went to one of the Company's customer meetings?

WITNESS LEVY: Yes, right here, last week.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Could you tell me

precisely, you said that they said they had spent more
money because of -- what other justification did the

Company give?

WITNESS LEVY: They told us they put a fence around the septic tank.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Right.

with septic tanks? (Laughter)

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Ma'am, I wanted to ask you, what was the gist of the meeting? What was it that the Company was trying to communicate to you?

WITNESS LEVY: They're trying to mix us all

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up. They were trying to tell us it was all due to environmental. They never gave us a straight answer. We didn't know any more when we left here than we did when we came. (Applause) COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Let me ask you something, ma'am. Has the park grown any in the last

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few years?

WITNESS LEVY: Since they have it, has it grown?

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Yeah.

WITNESS LEVY: Yes, yes. There's been more people come in.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Give me a ballpark. Has it grown 25%? A third more?

WITNESS LEVY: No, no, no. You know we had a recession. We have 225 homes in there now. (Applause)

> COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Great. Thank you.

MR. SHREVE: Hold on just a second, ma'am.

Just so you'll know, we've had a lot of comment about these meetings that Southern States has been holding all over and had some different things come out about them. And Commissioner Garcia in the last meeting, or the meeting before, asked that the Company notify me so I could be there, because there's

no one on the other side, or there to question anything. Commissioner Garcia brought that up, and the Commission asked them to do that. Evidently, the meetings are over, so they won't have that opportunity. But if we could, and if you don't mind, I'd like to straighten out what Mr. Feil's thoughts were on what he was going to provide to us. It was not --COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Maybe if we could finish with this witness, because I agree. And Chairman Deason sort of cut that off. But we should let her finish. MR. SHREVE: Fine. WITNESS LEVY: They kept passing the buck. They had four or five of them standing in the back. And there's one woman in the front, Ida, or something. And she said, "Could someone in the back give this lady an answer?" No, no, no, no, no. That's all we got.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Thank you.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Thank you, ma'am. I appreciate you coming. (Applause)

Mr. Shreve, you had a question?
(Witness Levy excused.)

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MR. SHREVE: Yes, sir. If I recall, when we 1 were talking about the correspondence that had been 2 put out by the Company, Mr. Feil even mentioned the 3 | updating of the discovery that we had out -- it was my 4 understanding they were going to do that -- and it was 5 to cover all correspondence with the customers and 6 7 different customer groups, who it was sent to, and when it was sent, as well as all correspondence to any 8 governmental officials, any legislators, city councilmen, county, or anything like that. I thought 10 that's what we had an understanding on. 11 MR. FEIL: Regarding this case, yes, that 12 13 was my understanding.

MR. SHREVE: Oh, absolutely. Oh, I thought you had just said just the customers.

MR. FEIL: Oh, no, I'm sorry.

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MR. SHREVE: And if it's possible, I'll be glad to go by there tomorrow afternoon and pick it up.

MR. FEIL: I haven't even examined what I've had yet, so I don't know whether or not that's feasible.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Mr. Shreve, obviously, if you can work out an accommodation for Mr. Feil, you can do that.

MR. SHREVE: There are several people, I

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think, that have sent correspondence. Perhaps they could gather it so Mr. Feil wouldn't have to worry 2 about it. 3∥ 4 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Mr. Shreve, you may call your next witness. 5 | MR. SHREVE: Yes, sir. A. Zegel. 6 WITNESS ZEGEL: Pass. 7 MR. SHREVE: Pass, thank you, sir. 8 Mr. Faulkner. 9∥ MR. FEIL: Commissioner, before Mr. Faulkner 10 11 steps up --COMMISSIONER DEASON: Yes. 12 MR. FEIL: I just wanted to mention that if 13 14 Mr. Shreve would like to depose the Company representative who was at the customer meetings, he's of course free to do so. We'll make her available. 16 MR. SHREVE: Well, I think you'd make her 17 available whether you wanted to or not, but -- because 18 we have that right. And we may very well take those 19 depositions, but we will make that decision on our 20 21 own. (Applause) COMMISSIONER DEASON: Mr. Faulkner, you may 22 proceed. 23 24 25

JEREMIAS FAULKNER

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was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn, testified as follows:

WITNESS FAULKNER: My name is Jeremias, J-E-R-E-M-I-A-S, last name Faulkner, F-A-U-L-K-N-E-R. I'm at 511 Thames Bluff Ridge in Tropical Isles.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: You may proceed.

WITNESS FAULKNER: All I want to comment on is percentage figures.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Mr. Faulkner, I'm sorry. Forgive me for breaking in.

> WITNESS FAULKNER: Sure.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: I missed it; I was writing something. What system do you belong to? WITNESS FAULKNER: Tropical Isles.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Thank you. I'm sorry 18 about that.

WITNESS FAULKNER: I would like to comment on percentage figures. They said that a year ago they only had a 3% increase and would like to move up to a 10.32, which is a 7.32 increase, that they'd like to have. Well, in Tropical Isles, we are paying 13.33, and they would like to increase it to 37.73 which is 277% increase. (Applause)

I would suggest that if they need to move from a 3% profit to a 10.32 profit, that they try not to get it all from Tropical Isles with a 277% increase. (Applause)

(Witness Faulkner excused.)

MR. SHREVE: Mr. Coll.

WITNESS COLL: I'll pass, thank you.

MR. SHREVE: Mr. Simpson.

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R. J. SIMPSON

was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn, testified as follows:

WITNESS SIMPSON: R. J. Simpson, 345

Seahorse Terrace, Fort Pierce, Florida, Tropical

Isles. To indicate the interest of the people in

Tropical Isles in a proposed 232% on one formula, I

would just like to take a moment to have the people

from Tropical Isles stand up. (Applause)

There is some concern. One of the concerns is, as I was quoted in the Fort Pierce paper, that the stuff they are taking away, they seem to be dumping back on us. (Applause)

And the concerns that finally -- Ida Roberts

was at the meeting on January 23rd and said the chief financial officer would get ahold of me and explain why the exorbitant rate increase was going to occur. I have not heard.

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I did see that they need \$16,500 to break even, to make a profit. That's not \$30 a month increase, that's for 50. Now, let's get realistic and get some real figures that we can all relate to. The speech that Ida Roberts and her silent staff gave, were like the six blind men and the elephant. Each had a different picture of what the whole thing looked like, and we never did see the whole thing and still haven't.

Now, we realize everyone has to make a profit. We like to, but most of us are on a fixed income. Also, about half of us are not there six months a year, and the base rate every month is not fair. Also, you can't understand how much we use, then why did you charge us for a flow meter that you put on?

MR. FEIL: A flow meter at the plant?

WITNESS SIMPSON: Uh-huh, to tell how much
we use.

MR. FEIL: Probably because we're required to by DEP to monitor the level of the flows.

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WITNESS SIMPSON: Well, you've had a lot of people around there in the last month or two for the first time in months, and I thought it might be tied in to showing how much money you are dumping into our place, excuse the expression.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Sir, could I ask you, what did they put in? The Company put in a flow meter to measure how much wastewater is being produced by --

WITNESS SIMPSON: By Tropical Isles.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: By tropical Isles?

WITNESS SIMPSON: Yes. That was one of the things that Ida Roberts said in the mammoth improvements they've had, which amounts to \$16,000 over the past four years or roughly \$2 or \$3 a month per resident. Hardly enough, yet even with the other, to say, well, we've got to have the \$33 a month increase.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Could you expand on that because another customer spoke. You went obviously to that meeting. Could you expand on what precisely you were told was the so-called environmental improvements made at the plant?

witness simpson: Yes. In fact, I finally got a sheet that tells us what the environmental improvements are, both of them. (Laughter)

On the report we have 20,267 in improvements at Project 2101, that's Tropical Isles. 7,000 of that was done before SSU took over. Since then, there's been -- regulatory mandate, \$3,538, that's the flow meter.

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COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Sir, you don't have to tell me what the Company gave you. I'm just interested in what they reported to you at the meeting. We have all those records.

WITNESS SIMPSON: They didn't know. But there was quite a bit because it was 67% of the 114 million statewide -- was environmental mandate. The two little items here are 25% of what the charge is there. Again, nothing to justify that increase, Mr. Garcia.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: What was the gist of having you all there if they didn't have answers? Was it to get you to support uniform --

WITNESS SIMPSON: Smoking mirrors, I think.

And to impress us about how they're complying with the mandate that they're really interested with public service, that they don't want to charge anymore than they have to. But every time there was a direct question, like amortization and depreciation on a \$450 plant that they got for \$10, suddenly they knew no

answers, and they looked around on the elephant. I'll turn it over to others here. Thank you.

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COMMISSIONER DEASON: Sir, before you go, let me ask a question. They acquired this system for \$10; is that correct?

WITNESS SIMPSON: Yes. (Applause)

That was in 1988, but they are depreciating it based on \$457,000 which somebody in legal counsel's office sent me the ruling of the Public Service Commission that they may do that in order to have large utility companies encourage purchase of small utility companies. But it also didn't say that they shouldn't count that in their profit factor.

Just one thing, and the thing that really bothers us, like what Ida Roberts was telling us about stand-alone and uniform rates, we found the uniform rate wasn't, and the stand-alone rate didn't. We got it both ways coming in here at Tropical Isles. You look at the comparisons.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Sir, let me ask you something. You have lived in that area for quite a while now?

WITNESS SIMPSON: In the area, three years.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: In that last three

years, have you seen any movement by the Company?

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What does the company generally do that is open?

WITNESS SIMPSON: Sends out bills every

month faithfully. (Applause)

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UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: We're there from the beginning, 8.5 years.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: You can't testify like that. You have got to come up here because there's a record being created.

And, finally, I wanted to ask you, if you had to choose between the two rates, just out of curiosity, not that it legally binds us or you --

WITNESS SIMPSON: What two rates?

commissioner Garcia: In terms of a uniform or a modified or a stand alone. Not at the levels that they have them here. Clearly, those rates are subject to investigation, and they're going to be determined from the bottom up, not from --

witness simpson: The only fair rate for the people in Tropical Isles, in my opinion only, with the number of people we have that leave at different months of the year, would be to have a base rate and then to charge a gallonage rate on what they actually use in wastewater. And you say, well, how do we know what it is in wastewater. We will be glad to supply the bills at the beginning of each year from Fort

Pierce Utility showing our water usage and let them go ahead, like many other wastewater companies do, and just take 80% of that and use that as their ERU, their equivalent residential unit computation. We will come out doing that, as near as I can estimate, to about \$18 a month.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Okay. Sir, you stated that at a customer meeting you had a bunch of questions and that the Company didn't answer them. If you would like to ask those questions now, our Staff is going to investigate that. And if you think that they could have relevancy in our investigation of the Company the way you see it, you are more than welcome to do it now. Our Staff will --

WITNESS SIMPSON: No. I don't want to sound like the spokesman for the group. I want you to hear from other people here in Tropical Isles. At the end of the meeting, I will supply you with seven pages of original materials we have gathered from different sources, your Commission, SSU, Office of Public Counsel, the newspaper, and St. Lucie County records, along with a two-page update of things we've just found out today. And one concern, we certainly hope that you'll give much more credence to the people here on fixed incomes that are really concerned than you do

to a letter from the Lieutenant Governor that was 2 allegedly written by the lobbyists for SSU. 3 | (Applause) COMMISSIONER DEASON: Mr. Simpson, could you 4 5 come back to the microphone. I think Mr. Shreve has a 6 question, and I think Commissioner Johnson has a 7 | question as well. 8 WITNESS SIMPSON: I'm sorry. I didn't mean 9 to run away. 10 COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: That's fine. Perhaps my notes are incorrect, but you had stated that there 11| was a \$7,000 improvement that was listed, but that it 12 occurred before the \$10 purchase. Was that correct? 13 | 14 WITNESS SIMPSON: Yes. COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: And what was that 15 improvement? 16 WITNESS SIMPSON: Just "improvements," 17 quote/unquote. 18 l COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: They weren't listed 19 as --20 WITNESS SIMPSON: Let me see is I can find 21 it in my papers here. Capital investment for growth, which probably meant, you know, added for as the homes 23 were moving in there which was at a rapid rate when 24 the park was just beginning. But since then there 25

have only been two for environmental impact. 35.38 for the flow meter; and chlorine scales, \$272. So there was the mammoth environmental impact upon SSU at our place, around \$3800 since 1985.

COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: And that was a document that the Company provided to you?

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WITNESS SIMPSON: Yes, that was provided nicely by SSU.

COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: Thank you.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Mr. Shreve.

MR. SHREVE: Mr. Simpson, I won't be long because I know you want some other people to testify, but in case you don't speak again, I would like to answer a couple of questions. We've had a lot of discussions at the other meetings about these small meetings that have been held by Southern States. Did they give you any indication not to worry about the amount of money, that that had been decided already, or something along those lines?

WITNESS SIMPSON: We were told not to worry about that 44.78 because the Public Service Commission usually only gives 70% of what they ask. (Applause)

MR. SHREVE: At that meeting, did they tell you how to get in touch with our office, or have any comments about our office?

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1 WITNESS SIMPSON: In a bulletin they sent out before, that was obviously written by an attorney 2 and a CPA, confused most of us, and I teach law, so 3 4 that's why I knew who had wrote it, it indicated that 5 that was an option and gave your number in that, as 6 well as it did include this form, the same one that's 7 on the back page of what you gave us today that we 8 could send our comments to the Public Service Commission. 10

COMMISSIONER DEASON: And you received that from Southern States Utilities?

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WITNESS SIMPSON: We received that from Southern States. We also received a notice from the Public Service Commission.

MR. SHREVE: Okay, thank you, sir.

COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: And, sir, the statement that you made with regard to "not to worry about the \$44 amount, that the Commission only gives 70% of the request," do you recall who made that statement?

WITNESS SIMPSON: Ida Roberts.

COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: Thank you very much.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Mr. Simpson, before you leave, you made reference to a -- right here. You made reference to a document, a seven-page document.

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That is something that you put together?

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WITNESS SIMPSON: Yes, and I am leaving a copy of it with your Staff when we leave here tonight.

commissioner deason: To make sure the record is complete because we are making a record here, if you could go ahead and provide that, we will give it a number, an exhibit number, for identification purposes.

MS. CAPELESS: Mr. Chairman, that will be Exhibit No. 47.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Very well. Thank you so much.

WITNESS SIMPSON: This was the original -COMMISSIONER DEASON: I'm sorry, you have
got to go to the microphone because it will not be
picked up.

Now, I have a pink sheet -- several pink sheets and a couple of green sheets.

witness simpson: You have a seven-page report that was drafted from SSU, PSU, OPC, ABC -- I don't know -- and several other groups with the basic data that our residents thought they wanted to have to write intelligent letters. It's a very intelligent group, and they write good letters. And they'll write a lot of them, and they'll keep doing it.

1 Since then, we've gotten additional information. We waited to the last minute to have 21 SSU's chief financial officer call us as Ida promised 3 | he would -- or she. That person did not, so I went ahead and added what I could. Marianne Murray, Fort 5 Pierce Tribune, got some of the information, so we had 6 this two-page supplement. We especially draw your 7 i attention to the last paragraph on that supplement 8 which questions the double charging that SSU does to 9 us and then still can't come up with the facts, yet 10 can come up with the detailed analysis of down to the 11 penny of the depreciation money that they're making on 12 Plant 2101. (Applause) 13 1.4 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Thank you, Mr. Simpson. And for your information, both the 15 seven-page document that is printed on pink paper 16 17 along with the two-page supplement that is printed on green paper will be identified as Composite Exhibit 18 19 No. 47. (Exhibit No. 47 marked for identification.) 20 21 (Witness Simpson excused.) 22

MR. SHREVE: Grace Morris.

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GRACE MORRIS 1 was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of 2 the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn, 3 testified as follows: 4 WITNESS MORRIS: My name is Grace Morris. 5 live at 2318 Northeast 16th Court, Leilani Heights. 6 I'm just a customer. I don't know too much 7 about all these figures. All I know, I'm paying 8 | X amount of dollars to have drinking water put into the house because we cannot drink the water; it tastes 101 like garlic. The toilets are -- that water is so 11 hard. It's horrible. 12 COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Did you say it tastes 13 like garlic? 14 WITNESS MORRIS: Yes. It's horrible. 15 COMMISSIONER GARCIA: That's a first. I had 16 never heard that. 17 WITNESS MORRIS: It's horrible. It really 18 is. And it's so hard, there's so much chlorine. 19 had it tested; they told us don't drink it. 201 COMMISSIONER GARCIA: You had it tested, and 21 they told you not to drink it? 22 23 WITNESS MORRIS: They said there was too 24 much ammonia, too much chlorine, it was too hard.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Do you have a copy of

3	now. I have it home, yeah.

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1 MIKE BUMSTER was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of 2 the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn, 3 testified as follows: 5 WITNESS BUMSTER: Mike Bumster, 6 B-U-M-S-T-E-R. COMMISSIONER DEASON: Ladies and gentlemen, 7 we are having difficulty hearing the witness. Thank 8 9 you. You may need to get real close to that 10 microphone. 11 WITNESS BUMSTER: I live at 2509 Northeast 12 18th Lane, Leilani Heights. COMMISSIONER DEASON: And your last name 14 15 again, sir? WITNESS BUMSTER: Bumster, B-U-M-S-T-E-R. 16 COMMISSIONER GARCIA: You said Leilani 17 Heights, right? 18 WITNESS BUMSTER: Yes. I just have a couple 19 of questions. I've got the same problem she does. 20 don't know if it tastes like garlic, but it tastes 21 bad. I've replaced the insides of my toilet twice since I've been there, two years. It corrodes them 23 up, and they keep running. 24 I just wondered why I moved down here from 25

Ohio. My water bills were approximately the same amount for three months, instead of every month. And they've got to consider on how they keep the water from freezing while they treat it. I was just curious on why it was that much more down here. That is all I have to say.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Well, that's one of the things we are going to be exploring. Not so much what your rate was in Ohio, but the cost of providing the service here is going to be explored. (Applause)

(Witness Bumster excused.)

MR. SHREVE: Thank you, sir. Pauline Rowe.

was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn, testified as follows:

PAULINE ROWE

WITNESS ROWE: My name is Pauline Rowe. I live at 2385 Northeast Rustic Place in Fisherman's Haven. I have lived there for nine years, and I haven't been able to drink the water. You can't even give it to your pets, or they get dysentery. You turn on the faucet, draw on the water, it's yellow. And then they want to have the 6,000 gallon level. I am a

widow, live by myself, and when I first moved in

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there, nine years ago, I used from 17 to 2,200 gallons of water. Now, they have me up using, the last bill, I think was 4,200. So I can't understand this since I am still a widow and living alone.

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As for the sewer, as far as I know, they haven't done too much to improve it. Every time we have excessive rain, the sewer runs out of the manhole in front of my driveway. So I have called them, I think, four or five times over the last nine years for that.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: May I ask you, have they done anything when you call?

MS. CAPELESS: They bring a truck and pump it out. The neighbors have had the water tests that I have not. I don't believe they are here tonight, but they got the same answer as the lady from Leilani Heights; don't drink it.

COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: Ms. Rowe, over here.

On your water usage where you say you don't believe
that you have used any more, but it keeps increasing,
have you talked to the Company? Or have you had your
meter checked?

WITNESS ROWE: No, I think they put in a new meter, and that's when my usage amount went up.

(Laughter)

1 COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Ma'am, you should see our engineer before you leave so that he can check 2 that out with you and make sure that the Company 31 4 checks it. 5 WITNESS ROWE: Okay. And I wanted to point out, you know, that I believe that there's a lot of --6∥ in the community where I am, it's not very large. It's a small community. It hasn't grown any. It's probably one of the older communities. It has a lot of retired people, like myself, on a fixed income, and then it has young families. So a widow or a widower 111 living alone isn't going to use 6,000 gallon of water, 12 so I don't believe that we should be responsible for 13 paying 6,000 gallons when we don't use it. 14 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Just a second, ma'am. 15 You are at Fisherman's Haven; is that correct? 1.7 WITNESS ROWE: Yes. COMMISSIONER DEASON: Now, your wastewater 18 rate is based upon a gallonage charge; is that 19 20 correct? WITNESS ROWE: Yeah, right. 21 COMMISSIONER DEASON: And you are only 22 charged for what you use; is that correct? 23 WITNESS ROWE: Yeah, right. But I believe I

it, to 6,000 gallons? 1 2 COMMISSIONER DEASON: I think that may be a 3 | cap of 6,000. I'm not sure, but we can confirm that 4 Ï for you. But, anyhow, I 9 thought that was a little excessive, you know, for the 10| quality of water we are getting. (Applause) 11| 12 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Thank you. (Witness Rowe excused.) 13 14 MR. SHREVE: John Fote. 15 16 JOHN FOTE 17 was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of 18 the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn, 19 testified as follows: 20 WITNESS FOTE: John Fote, F-O-T-E. 21 COMMISSIONER GARCIA: I'm sorry, can you 22 23 spell that again? WITNESS FOTE: F-O-T-E, Fote, Fotay 24 | (phonetic), whatever you want to call me. 1937 25

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years. I have never been to one of these meetings. I think SSU has been taking care of our facilities for 10 to 12 years, and in that time they've wanted the increases. I didn't think it was necessary to come on over to the Commission and the PSC Staff to let them know that I wasn't in favor. I figured if they needed the raise, you know, like all of us, go for it.

I'm here tonight to represent John Fote from Leilani Heights. This should be an easy situation for you three Commission and the PSC Staff. With the show of people in this establishment right now and the way everybody's clapping, your decision should be a null and void, no percentage raise whatsoever. In fact, a decrease, I would vote for. (Applause)

I leave my home at 6:30 in the morning. I get home anywhere from 7:30 to 8:00 at night.

Obviously, I use the bathroom facilities at work, drink all the water I want at work. I get home, I have dinner, and I fall asleep within an hour which means I really don't use, Monday through Saturday, much water at my home or the bathroom facilities.

My wife works full time. She leaves at 8:00, gets home at 5:00. All we use the water for is

to wash the dishes, clothes, obviously, the bathroom facilities. We do not drink the water. I didn't have it tested; I didn't have to have it tested because it's terrible.

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I think, you know -- actually, I forgot what I was thinking. I think it's due to the water that we are drinking. (Laughter)

Basically, I'm just a very simple man. don't have any facts and figures, you know, 10 percentages. Basically, I'm totally confused on what the SSU wanted. I did come to that meeting last week or the week before. I was there for about half-an-hour, and I got up, and I left because I was so confused and so frustrated that I thought, there's no need for me to be here.

This is the time that I need to be here, to talk to you three. Basically, do you three, and you four over here make the decision? (Indicating) Do you vote on this, or is it a separate thing? Do you vote, or do they vote? How the hell do you work this thing? (Laughter)

You guys are separate over there, and you are separate over here. Who's going to be voting here?

COMMISSIONER DEASON: The Commissioners

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vote. This is an advisory staff, they assist the 2 Commission. They make sure we have a full and complete record. They do an independent analysis. 3 And Mr. Shreve, he's an intervenor. He's an advocate on behalf of you. 5 II 6 WITNESS FOTE: And thank God we have him. 7 IJ (Applause) 8 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Yes. Our independent Staff, after the record is complete, the hearings have 9 been held, and after briefs have been filed by the intervenors, they take all that information. And then they make a recommendation to the Commission. We may agree with them, we may disagree with them. It is the 13 Commissioners themselves that actually vote after 14 everything is in, including our Staff's 15 recommendations. 16 WITNESS FOTE: You three right there? 17 That's it, just you three? 18 COMMISSIONER DEASON: There are five 19 20 Commissioners. WITNESS FOTE: Where's the other two? 21 COMMISSIONER DEASON: The other two 22 Commissioners, I assume, are in Tallahassee at another 23 hearing. I cannot tell you what their schedule is. 24

WITNESS FOTE: One more point, and I'll sit

down and keep my mouth quiet.

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COMMISSIONER DEASON: But before -- this is being recorded so there is a transcript available. So all the Commissioners, even though they may not attend this hearing, they have that transcript. And it is part of the record.

Obviously, there are other cases going on at the Commission, other than this one; and sometimes we have to have just a panel of Commissioners hold one of these hearings. When we can, we have all five, but apparently there was a conflict. And that's done by the Chairman's office, Chairman Clark. And apparently it was necessary for she and Commissioner Kiesling to be doing something else today. That's the only thing I can tell you.

witness fore: You don't have to be retired to be on a fixed income. I have been working 32 years, I'm 50 years old; I'm on a fixed income. I didn't get a raise last year, and I don't foresee a raise in two years. My water bill right now and under the conditions that I told you -- you know, we are not home that much. And it's just my wife and I, our kids are up and gone. I am spending \$50 a month. Now, if I was home and retired, I would be spending \$100 a month.

My situation and my idea that I want to extend to you three, if you give them any raise, I'm going to pay them \$50 a month. If you give them 1% or 10%, you pay over and above the \$50, because that's all I have. That's all I'm going to pay. And I'm not 6 trying to make it a joke or trying to get laughs. I'm telling you that's what I have in my budget is \$50, and that's all they are going to get. And if they want to shut my water off, I'll

10 drill a well and pump it in myself. And I'll probably get better water than what they are giving me. (Applause)

You three people, give it some damn good thought here because it's a serious situation here. We just don't have the money. And I'm talking about everybody here, because if they had the money, they wouldn't be here. (Applause)

> MR. SHREVE: Thank you, sir. (Witness Fote excused.)

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MR. SHREVE: Mr. Vincent Yakavonis.

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VINCENT J. YAKAVONIS

was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of 23 the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn, testified as follows:

1 WITNESS YAKAVONIS: My name is Vincent 2 Yakavonis, Y-A-K-A-V-O-N-I-S, 222 Sea Conch Place, 3 | Tropical Isles. 4 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Please proceed. 5 WITNESS YAKAVONIS: Well, I believe Tropical 6 Isles is well represented in what we are standing up 7 for. But there's one thing, a question that bothers 8 me, is those, between 75 and 100 residents of Tropical Isles, usually close down for the summer, that's five 9 to six months. I've been here since 1991. And the 10 first year I got in touch with SSU and questioned why 11 they were charging me all year round, the flat rate. 12 Whereas now the Fort Pierce Sewer Authority -- Water 13 Authority rather, pardon me, when I shut my water off, I don't get charged for those five months or six months we're home. And the rest of us don't. 16 Now, at this time I can't see all of 100 17 people or so that goes away for five to six months get charged for something, not paying for. That's all I 19 have to say. (Applause) 20 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Thank you, sir. 21 (Witness Yakavonis excused.) 22 23 24 MR. SHREVE: Thank you, sir. Carol Sandt. Carol Sandt, S-A-N-D-T. (Audience response.)

CAROL B. SANDT

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was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn, testified as follows:

WITNESS SANDT: My name is Carol, middle initial B as in boy, Sandt, S-A-N-D-T.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: You need to speak directly into that microphone and loudly.

WITNESS SANDT: S-A-N-D-T, 323 Seahorse
Terrace, Fort Pierce, Tropical Isles.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: You may proceed.

wITNESS SANDT: Two weeks ago we received a yellow postcard from SSU. And it seemed pretty much the same as a meeting we had either in May or in September of last year. And, of course, we were going to overlook it. The following day I called SSU, and I asked them about the rate increase. I was told that the interim rate of \$17 was denied by Public Service, but instead they were granted 37.95.

Now, I don't understand if a Company is willing to accept \$17, how the Public Service Commission comes along and says, "Well, no, we won't give you 17; we'll give you 37." That doesn't make too much sense.

And the next thing, I question the

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management of SSU. Some time ago --

WITNESS SANDT: Yes.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Before you get off
that point, the Company told you matter of factly -WITNESS SANDT: Yes, twice.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: -- that they were charging you more than what they wanted to charge you?

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: That we had forced them to --

WITNESS SANDT: More or less.

MR. SHREVE: Commissioner, if we could reach an agreement right now, I'd be glad to agree with you all that they cut everything down to what that request was that they put out there. If that's what they really want to charge, let's go back to that.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: I'm sure the Company can do what it wants in that respect, but we'd have to vote on that, so --

Thank you, go on. I'm sorry I interrupted you.

witness sandt: That's okay. About a year or two ago, we used to pay 26.25 every other month. Then the Company decided to charge 13.13 monthly. So what happened is -- I mean, even by most mathematics, you are losing a penny just on the bill, plus their

postage. So I wonder what kind of management there is in the Company.

at that time? Was it a new management by the Company?

In other words, had they just bought into your system?

WITNESS SANDT: No, no, no. This is since

I've been in Tropical Isles, which is about two years.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Great. Thank you.

WITNESS SANDT: Now, I bought my house in

1993, did not move down until last December. I paid a

bill for one year for a sewer system I didn't use, but

I didn't pay a water bill. Well, Fort Pierce

Utilities did not charge me for water for a year.

Now, if I'm not using the shower services because I'm

not living there -- I'm from New York -- how can a

sewer company charge me for waste when there isn't

any? (Applause)

I mean, we had to pay lot rental. I mean, my house was sitting on this man's lot, so lot rental. That was a use; the house was taking up his property. And for the snowbirds, they are gone six months, they pay sewer. Telephone bills they don't pay; they are disconnected. The same with the water. And I really think and I hope, especially after reading the article in the paper about Lieutenant Governor MacKay, I mean,

it's a little disturbing. But I do thank you for your 2 time. (Applause) 3 (Witness Sandt excused.) 4 5 MR. SHREVE: Thank you. Mr. Cornett. 6

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JAMES CORNETT

was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn, testified as follows:

WITNESS CORNETT: I'm James Cornett, C-O-R-N-E-T-T. I live at 355 Tropical Isles Circle, Fort Pierce.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: What system? WITNESS CORNETT: It's on the SSU system. COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Right, but -- oh, Tropical Isles.

WITNESS CORNETT: In Tropical Isles. haven't got too much to say, but this increase that they are claiming to want, or whatever, or if it's already gotten, I don't know. But it is like Mr. Simpson, the lawyer over here has said, it is 23 outrageous. There is no system as far as I am 24 concerned, the way I look at it. It's whatever they want.

Now, like one other gentleman here said, he's on a fixed income; we are too. We don't get a raise. What little raise we get, where is it going?

A lot of people are on social security. I mean, where is it going? Going right to pay the sewer bill.

I'm on a fixed income. Sure, I'm Federal
Government retirement. I haven't gotten a raise yet.

I'm on a fixed income. I don't make no \$50,000 or
\$100,000 a year. When you are on a fixed income of
\$20,000 a year, you're buying a home, you're paying
lot rent and everything else, everything really mounts
up. We just can't afford that kind of increase.

Now, like somebody else said here a few minutes ago, I can understand a couple of dollars of raising it, that's no big problem. But when you're increasing it, like 200-something percent, that's ridiculous. It's worse than outrageous. And that's about all I have to say, other than what Mr. Simpson says. And I back him up wholeheartedly, and this lawyer over here. Thank you. (Applause)

MR. SHREVE: Thank you, Mr. Brophy (sic).
(Witness Cornett excused.)

MR. SHREVE: Mr. Edward Usuda.

EDWARD USUDA

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was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of 2 the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn, testified as follows: 3 4 WITNESS USUADA: My name is Edward Usuda, U-S-U-D-A. 5 6 COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Move the mike up 7 closer to your mouth. It may be easier --WITNESS USUDA: Is that better? 8 COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Speak right into it. 9 10 WITNESS USUDA: What do you want my address? 2478 Northeast 18th Lane, Leilani Heights. 11 What I'd like to know, in your Southern 12 States, you mentioned reverse osmosis. What is that? 13 Explain that to us. We are all lay people here. We are not water specialists. Can you explain your 15| reverse osmosis? 161 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Mr. Usuda, are you 17 addressing that question to the Company or to the 18 Staff of the Public --19 WITNESS USUDA: The Company. 20 COMMISSIONER DEASON: The Company is over 21 here. 22 WITNESS USUDA: Okay. Can you explain 23 24 reverse osmosis? MR. FEIL: I'm not a scientist, but I'm 25

lawyer. I'll try to explain it to you briefly. 1 2 WITNESS USUDA: Well, it's in your filing 3 you filed. 4 MR. FEIL: Yes, sir. 5 WITNESS USUDA: Well, you ought to be able 6 to explain what you filed. 7 MR. FEIL: Reverse osmosis is a system of 8 treatment whereby water is forced through a system of 9 filters. It's usually reserved for brackish or salty water. Under our filing we're asked that service 10 11 areas that have brackish water and RO plants be categorized in a separate uniform rate. 12 You do not have brackish water in your 13 service area. You do not have RO treatment. 14 WITNESS USUDA: But I'm questioning the 15. answers in your filing that you made. And, you know, 16 17

we are not professional water people. We are lay people, and you should be able to explain what you filed.

> I thought I just did. MR. FEIL:

WITNESS USUDA: All right, so you did now, finally. You say "uniform rates," that's the same as average rates, isn't it?

> MR. FEIL: I would say yes.

WITNESS USUDA: It is. That's like you take

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10 numbers, and you add it up and divide by 10, that's what you've done. You've got, what, 125 water systems here, haven't you? You lost two companies. You lost Marco Island and Burnt Store, right?

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MR. FEIL: Marco Island and Burnt Store are the RO facilities.

WITNESS USUDA: So what you've got here is 125 water systems you consolidated on this hearing. Isn't that right?

MR. FEIL: We refer to them as plants, because --

WITNESS USUDA: Well, plants.

MR. FEIL: Yes. 125 sounds right.

WITNESS USUDA: Mr. Shreve, does the Public Service Commission have enough employees to actually -- counting lawyers, engineers, and so forth -- to actually investigate these systems? Do they have enough employees to investigate these water systems?

MR. SHREVE: I think that is an excellent question, and I have complained the entire time since Southern States started bringing in all these systems. It used to be we'd have one case, one system. You could come in and that was the rate case. You could look at it, you could count, you could see what was

invested.

They say they have enough to do it. I don't think they do. I know our staff does not have enough to really dig in and do the kind of job I would like to for the people. We have to fight almost every step of the way. We've tried to get their income tax return for months now, and the PSC's hearing examiners ordered them to give it. We're still fighting about that because they've taken it on, and we're going to be probably filing our testimony before we even get their income returns.

making is, 150 systems, you can't handle and do a good job. I don't think you can, no, sir. And I'll have to refer to the Staff on that as to what they can do, but I don't think you can go to every one of these systems and look and see whether they really even made the investment they say they have.

WITNESS USUDA: Well, the Commission probably sits back and let's the Company submit, do the work; and they just review it roughly.

MR. SHREVE: Well, they review it, and they try and dig in. I just think it's a tough job.

wITNESS USUDA: But they don't actually make a good investigation, do they?

MR. SHREVE: Well, I think they probably do the best they can, and we do the best we can. But I have a real problem with that number of systems, and I think some of the Commissioners do.

want to, and that's one of the problems. The last case really is not totally over yet. That's still partially on appeal. The Commissioners don't have any control over that. They can't do anything about it.

But I think you have a real problem when you have the same time frame for 150 systems that you would have for one or two.

WITNESS USUDA: Does the Public Service

Commission know how Southern States does their meter

reading in Leilani Heights?

MR. FEIL: Are you addressing me?

WITNESS USUDA: Yes, I'm addressing you.

MR. FEIL: I would assume that they do.

They audit our books, they look through our billing records.

WITNESS USUDA: Well, I'm asking, do you know how Southern States reads the meters in Leilani Heights, the water meters?

MR. FEIL: You're asking if I know how

SSU --

WITNESS USUDA: If the Commission knows.

MR. SHREVE: He's not the Staff of the Commission; he's Southern States. The Staff of the commission is over there.

WITNESS USUDA: Oh, I beg your pardon.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: The Staff of the Commission is right over here where it says "PSC Staff." Maybe you could address the question to them.

WITNESS USUDA: I'm sorry. Does the

Commission know how Southern States reads the meters
in Leilani Heights?

MR. WILLIS: We haven't witnessed them actually reading every single meter, but we have analysts that actually go out and obtain all the billing information for every single customer for every system in this rate case, and that billing information is reviewed for each of the test years up to the projected test year.

wITNESS USUDA: They drive their vehicle around with two men, one keeps the vehicle running and the other goes and reads the meter. Now, you know good and well this is a waste of money and time.

You take Florida Power. They know how to read the meter. One man goes around with the machine, one person only; and they read more meters than

Southern States every will. And Southern States just wastes a lot of money the way they read the meters in Leilani Heights when they run a vehicle and two people. And they keep the vehicle running and ride — there is a lot of money that can be saved in overhead you know. All they're doing is piling up the costs.

MR. WILLIS: You raise a good point, sir.

And I'd like to point out that that's one of the purposes of these customers meetings. That's why they are so valuable, because you, the customers, are there all the time. You are here every day, except for the time period you are not here. But you are a valuable source of information for the Commission to obtain on a daily basis of exactly what goes on in your area.

commissioner deason: What he's telling you, sir, is they are going to look into that now. They didn't know that there were two people, one driving a vehicle and one to get out and read the meter. They didn't know that. They just admitted that, and they are just telling you they are going to look into it.

WITNESS USUDA: Good, that's fine. But let me ask you one more question. If you people were elected instead of appointed, wouldn't you do a better job for the public? (Applause)

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Sir, I believe I do

the very best job that I can, and that's what I am here to do, what I've always tried to do, and what I will continue to do as long as I am in this office.

(Applause)

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I realize that I am a public servant. And it is my job, as I indicated earlier, not to try to take the Company's position; but it is my job to scrutinize their request. Now, I do not have the authority to simply reject a request because it's unpopular. I have a statutory responsibility to look at their request, to make sure if it is reasonable. If it is unreasonable, it is my responsibility to then decline it.

I have to look at all of their expenses, their investment, their operations to determine what it costs for them to provide service, to prudently provide service. And to the extent they are not prudently providing service, I have to make disallowances. That is my job. That is what I'm here to do. That is what I have done in the past. That's what I will do in the future. (Applause)

MR. SHREVE: Sir, over here. And I will say, these three Commissioners were not on the last case. And I think -- I've gone through all these hearings, and I think they are interested, are taking

in the remarks of the people, and paying attention to them. And I think they are going to try and do a good job.

But I had something else I wanted to ask you. You made a good point about the operation of maintenance expenses and gave one example. Southern States Utilities bought Buena Ventura Estates, just outside of Kissimmee, this last year. I mean, they're in the process of buying it right now. It's a very large system. They bought it, and the day they closed -- now, the Company before them had a level of operation and maintenance expenses, a total. The day after Southern States bought it, the operation and maintenance expenses went up \$500,000. That's administrative efficiency. (Applause)

(Witness Usuda excused.)

MR. SHREVE: Barbara Sailors.

WITNESS SAILORS: Pass.

 MR. SHREVE: Thank you. Donald Michaelson.

And I did want to explain, on some of the names, the ones that I have mispronounced tonight, I'm

sorry, but Commissioners Deason and Garcia were the

ones who told me how to pronounce those. The ones

that I got right, I did on my own. Go ahead, sir.

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DONALD MICHAELSON

was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn, testified as follows:

WITNESS MICHAELSON: Jack, you got this one right. Don Michaelson, M-I-C-H-A-E-L-S-O-N, 1703

Northeast 25th Terrace, Leilani Heights. I'm also the president of the Leilani Heights Homeowners

Association. And we're served by SSU in Leilani Heights, which at one time tried to pump the Michaelson family sewage uphill. Remember that, Matt?

MR. FEIL: Yes, sir, I remember that affair. WITNESS MICHAELSON: It didn't work, did it?

MR. FEIL: I didn't see it.

witness Michaelson: It cost you a lot of money, though, didn't it? It did. It cost them a lot of money.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Could you explain precisely, since I'm sure that won't be part of the

filing, what they tried to do and why you think it 1 2 cost them a lot of money. 3 WITNESS MICHAELSON: Well, it did cost them approximately \$3,000, because when you had two sewage 4 5 backups, they were willing to fix it for X amount of dollars; but we would have had to sign a release, 6 which we refused. We then hired our own contractor --7 8 COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Release to do what? 9 WITNESS MICHAELSON: To repair the piping. 10 However, we would then have to sign a release. 11 However, what we did then was to hire an independent contractor who proved with their verification, Ray Gagnon, being the regional manager at the time, that 13 yes, sewage was trying to run uphill. So they had to replace the whole pipe system. They had to buy all 15 16 new carpeting and clean the house. 17 COMMISSIONER GARCIA: And they did that? WITNESS MICHAELSON: They did that. 18 19 Okay. I'd like to ask a couple of questions before we go any further. You're all appointed by the 20 21 Governor, correct? COMMISSIONER DEASON: Yes, that's correct. 22 WITNESS MICHAELSON: And you hire your 23 Staff? 24 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Actually, we don't 25

hire the Staff. We have an executive director who is at the Commission. It is his responsibility to hire and fire the professional Staff of the Commission.

WITNESS MICHAELSON: Okay, fine. And as you pointed out, you are all public servants?

COMMISSIONER DEASON: That is correct.

WITNESS MICHAELSON: Paid with our taxes?

COMMISSIONER DEASON: That is correct.

WITNESS MICHAELSON: Therefore, you are representing us, as well as SSU, in this hearing, correct?

myself representing SSU. I have a statutory responsibility to make sure that their rates are just and reasonable, but I don't represent them, sir. No, if I represent anyone, it's the customers.

WITNESS MICHAELSON: It's the customers. It's the public.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: But you have a publicly appointed advocate who actually represents you, and that's Mr. Shreve.

WITNESS MICHAELSON: And that's Jack. And we appreciate your being here, Jack. I didn't know what your position was, and I would like your address and phone number before we leave here tonight.

MR. SHREVE: I'd be glad to give it to you.

Thank you.

WITNESS MICHAELSON: And I'd also like to

WITNESS MICHAELSON: And I'd also like to compliment the people from Tropical Isles for the presentations they've made. And I would also ask that the people of Leilani Heights take a moment just to stand so I can see who is here. (Applause)

I want to thank you all for attending from
Leilani Heights and Tropical Acres -- (Audience
response) -- Tropical Isles, excuse me.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Be careful, they outnumber you.

WITNESS MICHAELSON: I know that. I'm probably getting daggers in the back right now.

what we've got here is a lot of numbers being tossed about by Company representatives. And a couple of the people that have already spoken have made reference to fixed incomes. And as I look around at people like myself and some others, I see a lot of gray heads, a lot of thinning heads, a lot of dyed hair. How many people here are on social security? Raise your hands.

Okay, we got a 2.3% increase this year, right? (Audience response.)

Southern States Utilities, according to my

calculations, in a letter from Cara Olsen Teasley, run anywhere from 32% to 50%. It's obvious, as some of the speakers have said -- yes, Jack?

MR. SHREVE: That is -- not that you're all -- their water rate increase request, the rates, they have requested that the total rates go up 77%.

WITNESS MICHAELSON: That was the original figure I had, yes.

MR. SHREVE: And the sewer rates they have requested go up 34%. I don't know why they keep putting out that garbage.

WITNESS MICHAELSON: No, that was the original figure I had some time ago in a letter we sent to the Commission with about 284 letters.

However, now I've got another piece of information here, and I come up with anywhere from 32 to 50%. I mean, what we are doing is we are tossing out all kinds of figures here which don't make any sense on the bottom line.

And all I am saying is that we've got to face reality. People have X amount of money. And there's going to come a point in this time when the tax payers are not going to be able to afford any more. It doesn't grow on trees. Thank you.

(Applause)

(Witness Michaelson excused.) 2 3 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Ladies and gentlemen, we've been going now for an hour-and-a-half. 5 sorry? MR. SHREVE: 6 One. 7 COMMISSIONER DEASON: You only have one 8 more? 9 MR. SHREVE: One, and Mr. Simpson. COMMISSIONER DEASON: We try to give our 10 court reporter a break at least every hour-and-a-half, 11| because she's taking down every word that is said, but 12 it's been indicated we only have one more witness. 13 So, Mr. Shreve, if you can call that witness, please? 14 MR. SHREVE: Mr. Smart. 15 COMMISSIONER DEASON: What we'll do is after 16 Mr. Clark (sic), we'll take a short break; and anyone who still wants to testify, if they let Mr. Shreve know during that break, we'll come back. And we'll be here as long as there's somebody here who wants to 20 talk to us. I promise you that. 21 22 RALPH SMART 23 was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of

testified as follows:

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WITNESS SMART: Good evening. My name is Ralph Smart, S-M-A-R-T.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: I'm sorry, I thought he said Clark.

WITNESS SMART: I've been called worse. Seahorse Terrace, Fort Pierce, Tropical Isles with SSU.

I have several concerns this evening, and one is the reason we are all here, is we are very frustrated with SSU.

I find it very hard to believe that the Commission would even accept such an offer from them, to come and bring it before us, that type of increase. Why was it not turned back over to them and asked them to reevaluate that? I feel that's what should have 17 been done with that.

Number two is we were not dealt with properly by SSU. We were kept in the dark. They were dealing behind our back. They made application in June the 28th of 1995, and did not really bring us up to date until later in the year as to what their intentions were. After they brought us up to date on what their intentions were, we were not given the proper information. Had it not been for people like

Mr. Simpson and other residents here who have really looked into this, this would have been shoved down our throat.

Not only that, why do they find it necessary to get Mr. Sharkey to start lobbying in Tallahassee before they brought us up to date on what they wanted to do? Why did they bring politics into this? If the Lieutenant Governor wants to submit a letter okaying this without letting us know, why didn't he tell us this before we elected him? (Applause)

I feel that the people were not dealt with the proper way. I think that letting Mr. Sharkey lobby up there, and then after reading what his association is with the Governor and the Governor's family, we have another what do we call -- Watergate?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Sewergate.

(Laughter)

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witness smart: I personally think when they evaluated the increase that it should have been turned down. That all this taxpayers' money that is being spent for these hearings is totally ludicrous. A 177% to 250% increase, if I walked into work and my boss said to me, "I want to give you a 50% increase" years ago, I would have read the Wall Street Journal to see if he went bankrupt. I don't understand that.

realize you have to go into hearings to evaluate it.

But to go into hearings with this type of an increase,
this percentage, does that sound right, gentlemen,
ladies? I don't think so. I think that someone is
trying to pull the wool over someone's eyes. We might
not get to 177% or 250% increase, but we are going to
get an increase, not that we want to accept.

Why don't they evaluate it the way everything else is evaluated with the cost of living? Every time you get a cost of living, or you get an increase in your social security, everything is evaluated. This came out of a box. I don't under this.

These people are in business to make money. Everyone goes into business to make money. But to try to rip us off like this, and the Commission to sit back and allow them to even present this, I don't understand it. Why wasn't it stopped before it got this far and tell them, Please come forward with something more reasonable because the people cannot afford this. Because politics is involved, because a percentage of the residents in Florida do not vote here. They only come down for the season, and they go back. And the other people around here are old, and

they just very seldom go to the poles." But I'll tell you if this thing passes, they 2 better remember who sent the letter to the Commission. 3 4 That's all I have to say. Thank you. (Applause) 5 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Thank you. 6 MR. SHREVE: Thank you, sir. 7 (Witness Smart excused.) 8 9 MR. SHREVE: Mr. Chairman, could you indulge me just a minute? I wonder if we could have 10 11 Mr. Simpson come back before we break. I'm afraid he might have to leave. 12 13 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Okay. 14 MR. SHREVE: Mr. Simpson, can you come up? 15 EXAMINATION 16 BY MR. Q Well, I'd like to tell everybody here, as far as the uniform rates, as opposed to the stand-alone rates, that's one group of customers against another; and I do have a conflict of interest there. But I very much resent the fact being said that I couldn't do much for you, because we will be

fighting against this rate increase which, to me, is 2∥ the primary problem here. And I very much resent them saying that I couldn't do much for you, or I wouldn't be interested in this. I really do. WITNESS SIMPSON: Mr. Deason, I do have a 5 6 couple of summary comments that some of the people in Tropical Isles have asked I make. But I would be glad 7 to come back in case others are doing it and make it at the end so we could go ahead and have a break now. 9 10 I'll stay. COMMISSIONER DEASON: We really do need to 11 take a break, and I appreciate you making that 12 accommodation. 13 14 MR. SHREVE: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. COMMISSIONER DEASON: We will stand in 15 recess for 15 minutes. JENNIFER Vandien

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was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn, testified as follows:

WITNESS VanDIEN: Jennifer VanDien.

commissioner deason: Before you begin,
ma'am, let me ask, if anyone else has signed up who
was not originally here when we swore in witnesses,
I'm going to ask all of those persons to please stand
and to raise your right hand. Anyone that was not
sworn earlier who wishes to testify this evening,
raise your right hand.

(Witnesses collectively sworn.)

WITNESS VanDIEN: Jennifer VanDien, V-A-N, capital D-I-E-N, 1959 Northeast 23rd Terrace, Jensen Beach, and we're serviced by Leilani Heights.

I am a single mom with two kids, and when I have to make ends meet, it means I have to cut my expenses back. And none of the information that I've seen or, you know, passed through the mail -- and I haven't searched too diligently for it, but I haven't seen it either -- shows me that SSU is cutting their expenses involved in trying to make their profits better. It looks like they are going directly to try and increase their income from us.

So, I guess what I came to say to the Commission is -- Commissioners is I hope that as you all check into this, that you find out if it's really a need they get an increase in their profits, that they are really watching their expenses, because the rest of us have to. I squeeze the backs off of pennies nowadays. And, you know, there's certain expenses you can cut back, but, you know, we're down to the bare minimum. And when they start raising the rates, you know, my budget just won't handle that.

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Now, what I didn't come to say, and after hearing everyone talking, I think I'm going to go get a health check tomorrow. My next-door neighbor gave me this. This is his second or third replacement on his toilet. I fix toilets real well. I didn't know that I was fixing them because there was a problem with my water. I just thought this was what toilets did.

In the last two years I've changed mine -- I have two toilets. I've changed them at least four or five times, different parts of the plumbing inside. It wasn't until my next-door neighbor handed me this that it even occurred to me that the water we've been drinking is causing the problems. So I guess I'll have to investigate this myself, but do you want

another exhibit?

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COMMISSIONER DEASON: I'll be glad to take it, and I will give it to the Staff.

WITNESS VanDIEN: The engineer can test it for whatever it needs. Hopefully, I don't have any major health problems because of the water we're drinking, but I really would --

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Seriously, if you want to leave that with us, we'll be glad to take it.

MR. SHREVE: They are lucky so far. A lot of the meetings -- I'm over here -- people are bringing in bottles of water and asking them if they want to drink it.

mean, I can't afford not to drink the water. I seriously live on a very tight budget. I drink the water. You know, it doesn't always taste great. We turn it into Gatorade sometimes and things like that. So, hopefully, it's not a real health hazard, and I supposed that you all's -- somebody's concerned to make sure that the water I'm drinking is not completely contaminated. I suppose that's why I pay my taxes. But I really, really would --

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Let me clarify that because you raised a good point. The Commission does

not set the drinking water standards. That's 2 primarily the jurisdiction of the Department of 3 Environmental Protection and the Health Department. We do have the responsibility, though, to make sure that the utility is in compliance with those standards 5 that are set by other agencies, and that is part of 6 our review when there is a rate proceeding of this 7 nature. 8 So, I quess, indirectly we have a responsibility, but we're not the agency -- the agency 10

with the primary jurisdiction with water quality issues.

WITNESS VanDIEN: Well, again, that wasn't my main reason for coming out. My main reason is, you know, I hope that someone is monitoring how they manage their business if, in fact, we have to pay for their profits if they're not doing a good job at it.

I'm going to have to leave now and get my kids to bed because I didn't pay a babysitter to come out. Thanks. (Applause)

(Witness VanDien excused.)

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Staff, is the next COMMISSIONER DEASON: Exhibit No. 48, is that correct?

MS. CAPELESS: It will be 48 if we mark it.

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COMMISSIONER DEASON: Okay. Yes.

MS. CAPELESS: We could have a description of the toilet part marked.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Well, it will be an exhibit just like all the other exhibits. It will be Exhibit No. 48.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: A lift lever.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: A corroded lift lever.

(Exhibit No. 48 marked for identification.)

MR. SHREVE: Gloria Cherelstein,

C-H-E-R-E-L-S-T-E-I-N.

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GLORIA CHERELSTEIN

was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of 15 the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn, testified as follows:

WITNESS CHERELSTEIN: And I'm from 1970 Northeast 23rd Terrace, Leilani Heights.

I just want you to be aware of the last 20 meeting that Ida Roberts said she called, said that the customers of SSU could be enlightened on what was happening. When I asked her a few questions pertaining to administrative costs, depreciation, and also counsel that would represent the consumers, I was given one answer: I don't know; I don't know; I don't

know; I don't have the answer to that. 2 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Let me make sure --3 ∦ you asked her about counsel that --4 WITNESS CHERELSTEIN: I said, "I'm sure that you will be represented by counsel. Who will 5 61 represent the consumer?" And she said, "I don't 7 know." 8 COMMISSIONER DEASON: She didn't tell you 91 anything about Public Counsel's Office? 10 WITNESS CHERELSTEIN: No. 11 MR. SHREVE: Thank you. WITNESS CHERELSTEIN: That's all that I 12 have. I just wanted you to be aware of that. 13 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Thank you, ma'am. 14 15 MR. SHREVE: Thank you. (Witness Cherelstein excused.) 16 17 MR. SHREVE: Owen Clarke. 18 OWEN CLARKE 19 was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of 20 the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn, testified as follows: 22 WITNESS CLARKE: Owen, O-W-E-N, Clarke, 23 24 C-L-A-R-K-E, 521 Hemingway Terrace, Fort Pierce, 25 Tropical Isles.

My neighbors have pretty well covered the points so far, but I'd like to just emphasize a couple of things.

One of the items that's used to judge the success of a business is its return on capital investment. And as it was pointed out, there was a \$10 capital investment, original investment, on the system on the part of SSU. In effect, it was deeded over and that was a symbolic amount of money. So, in effect, the return on the initial capital investment is almost infinite. And if their accountants can't handle this, we could probably have a bake sale, couldn't we, and raise \$10, give them \$10 back, and then they could call it infinite because that's what it is.

And when they talk about a rate increase, depending on which number you want to use, it runs from 240% to over 300%. How do you equate that kind of a rate increase request to a calculated request for a 30.21% increase in wastewater revenue? Now, this was on the notice of 9-12-95.

Also, I don't have an answer in my own mind as to how we get from the initial proposed interim rate of \$17.05 to the present approved interim rate of 37.95. I kept a file on all the literature and

correspondence I got, and I went through it this afternoon again. And I cannot find any link to show where we went from the lower number to the higher number, and that I don't understand.

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that. The Company filed for an interim increase based upon a uniform rate structure which means that, as the gentleman indicated earlier, it's basically an average; everybody pays the same rates regardless of what it cost each system to provide service. That's the nature of a uniform rate.

There had been a court decision by the First District Court of Appeal concerning Southern States rate structure, which basically overruled the Commission and told the Commission that it did not have the legal ability based upon the previous case's record to implement a uniform rate. We had then to go to a stand-alone rate structure of some sort. The Commission decided to go to a modified stand-alone rate structure. And since that was the court's decision, the Commission made the decision that the interim increase, as well, had to be based upon a modified stand-alone rate structure, which meant that each individual system's cost had to be analyzed within the context of the interim increase.

That is why some systems' interim increase was more than the uniform increase that the Company requested. That is why the Company requested 17.05, and the interim increase went up. That is in spite of the fact that the Commission, as far as total dollar revenues granted to the Company on an interim basis, made substantial disallowances to that interim request.

And I'm not exactly sure, but I would think the Commission allowed approximately half of what the Company requested on the interim basis and total revenue requirement dollars. Is that correct?

My Staff is indicating that that is correct.

But that is the reason. It is a rate structure issue
which caused that disparity.

MR. SHREVE: If I may, Mr. Chairman?

Commissioner Deason is exactly right in what he described. But I would like to add, at the time Southern States sent those notices out to you saying what they were requesting, they knew that they had already been turned down on those rates. So they sent the notice out knowing that that was not what was going to be granted. It's almost like a setup so that the Commission would appear -- and they have said this several times -- that the Commission gave more than

they asked for. They asked for the full amount of 2 revenues, and we objected at the time because we 3 || thought their notice was misleading. And, clearly, you saw the notice, and you can't understand why it comes out the way it does. 5 6 WITNESS CLARKE: It was not made clear at 7 | all. 8 MR. SHREVE: Well, Southern States knew when they sent the notice out. And we objected to it, but 91 they went ahead and sent it. 10| WITNESS CLARKE: Basically, that's all I 11 have to say. We are trusting that you people will represent us properly. But if we don't, we talked a 13 little while earlier about the gray hairs and the dyed 14 hair, what we'll do is we'll let that hair get long 15 again, and we'll get some of the old hippy costumes, 16 and we'll put some placards out. And we'll say, 17 "Hell, no, we won't pay; send our bill to Buddy McKay. 18 Thank you. (Applause) 19 (Witness Clarke excused.) 20 21 22 MR. SHREVE: Mr. Joseph Tucci. JOSEPH TUCCI 23 was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of

the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn,

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testified as follows:

WITNESS TUCCI: My name is Joseph Tucci, and I live at 2289 Northeast 13th Court in Leilani Heights.

I attended that meeting two or three years ago, and I must say we got a 3-to-1 improvement. We had one Commissioner back then, and we've got three tonight. I hope that means we're going to get something done, because I'll tell you something, I keep hearing the same thing over and over again.

A woman here, she brought a vial of that water, and it was yellow, and she complained about it then, and they're still talking about it. So, you see all the capital improvements that they've done and improved the service and the quality, uh-huh.

And then I brought up this question then, and a gentleman alluded to it, but he has not -- still haven't gotten any answer. If you pay nothing for something, what is the return on investment? What do you allow? Gentlemen? How do you equate the return that you are going to give SSU because they are buying out -- buying out, they're taking over systems at no cost. So what do you allow them as a return, as a profit?

COMMISSIONER DEASON: It depends on what the

that has been before the Commission and will be before the Commission in this case. It's an issue as to whether you allow what they actually pay when they acquire a system, or do you allow in their rate base what the net book value of the system was at the time that they acquired it. And the issue, basically, is do you recognize any negative acquisition adjustment? And that occurs when they paid less than net book value for the system.

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Mr. Shreve has historically argued for many years that negative acquisition adjustments should be recognized so that the net effect is when a company pays less than book value, they only get what they pay.

The Commission has established a policy, and that policy was established years ago, to allow net book value. That is an issue that there is some disagreement on the Commission as to what the appropriateness of that is. I assume that that issue will once again be litigated before the Commission.

There are some new Commissioners that, perhaps, this will be the first time that they will have an opportunity to vote on that issue. And what the outcome will be, I do not know. But it is an

issue that will be actively litigated and perhaps that policy will be reviewed again during the context of this case.

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WITNESS TUCCI: Have you ever heard the rationale behind somebody saying, "Yes, we should pay on that basis?"

COMMISSIONER DEASON: On net book value? WITNESS TUCCI: Net book value.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Yes, there are persons who advocate that net book value should be used regardless of what is paid.

WITNESS TUCCI: And what was the rationale?
What's the thinking behind -- why would you say that's a good thing, or it should be done? I mean, what's the rationale?

COMMISSIONER DEASON: The rationale is that that is what was the cost of the system when it was devoted to public service, and that a change of ownership should not change that, that the customers are no better off, no worse off, because that's what their rate base was before there was a change of ownership.

There also is an argument that by not allowing or recognizing negative acquisition adjustments, it encourages utilities, such as Southern

States, to acquire other systems. And there's some 2 argument as to whether that is a good public policy or not a good public policy. But those who advocate that, that is my understanding, that's their rationale.

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MR. SHREVE: Mr. Chairman, may I? And here once again, I don't disagree with anything Commissioner Deason said; and on this issue, he and I have no argument.

As far as the rationale that I see, the law says that a utility is entitled to a fair return on their investment. If they get the system for free or if they pay \$100,000 on a \$500,000 system, then to me, the \$500,000 is not their investment, and they are not entitled to receive both a return on that \$500,000, nor are they entitled to receive depreciation on it, one-twentieth every year for something that didn't even put in. There are many systems.

Now, how does the utility get hurt if they receive a fair return on their actual investment instead of coming out with these phantom figures that make it sound like they're not earning as much as they really are?

I have argued this, and I guess I will until I die or leave this office, and I'm going to keep

doing it because it makes absolutely no logical sense to me. Now, I'm going to step on some toes here, but I'm going to do it anyway because I've been thinking this for a long time.

The Staff of the Commission has always pushed the other side of this in allowing the utilities to have the full amount of the book value. I don't think it makes any sense, and it's hard for us to be able to argue when the Staff has the opportunity to convince Commissioners, when it would be an ex parte communication for me to do that. And someday we have got to do something about that, and that's up to me to try to do it.

But a utility should never pay more than the book value because that's all it costs to put it in service for the people. And that's always been the argument. A lot of people have said, "Well, we don't give them more when they pay more, so we won't give them less when they pay less." That doesn't fit if you really think it through because there are too many shenanigans that can be pulled if you start paying more. So you shouldn't ever give them more than the book value because that's all it cost. And they shouldn't get a return on anything that they did not invest. (Applause)

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WITNESS TUCCI: In the case of Leilani
Heights, the sewer was put in for the benefit of the
developer. He could not sell the lots. And, in fact,
the people who bought the lots paid for the sewer and
the lines that ran up the street and everything else.
So there is no -- what'd you call that? You said
something about the -- oh, what did you say?

COMMISSIONER DEASON: CIAC?

WITNESS TUCCI: You said that we, the consumers, got the benefit of that \$500,000 --

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Oh, negative acquisition adjustment.

WITNESS TUCCI: You said the \$500,000 is what it cost, and we should pay for that \$500,000. But we did when we bought the lots and the houses in Leilani Heights. My bills were \$9 month, which was strictly maintenance when I first bought the house, and that was 15 years ago in Leilani Heights.

So, whoever is thinking about that other thing, Staff, whoever is doing that, I've already paid for, so it should be net acquisition cost. In the case of Leilani Heights, the investment is zero. They took over that for nothing. The guy, the developer, wanted out.

Now, I calculated out -- well, I used this

sheet that they gave me at the meeting last week, that piece of -- that waste of time. I just copied out what SSU is going to get from Leilani Heights on all their various things here, the stand alone, FSC and all the blah, blah. Anyway, it is comes out to about \$300,000 a year. \$300,000, combined water and sewer. Now, I'd like to know where they ever spent anything close to \$300,000 or what have you.

But what I would like to know is -- well, I can't say that 300,000 -- well, yes I can. The FPSC ordered modified stand-alone interim. That's still -- that's \$230,000 for wastewater. That was \$342,000 they are going do get in a year. How much of that is their return on investment?

Oh, this is like last year -- like two or three years ago, nobody knows, and you never get an answer.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: No, we can get you that answer. We may not have it right here at our fingertips.

It would be the amount of the revenue that is basically their net income, or their return on rate base. That's the number that you want; is that correct?

WITNESS TUCCI: Well, I said the 1994

modified stand-alone interim rate comes to \$342,000 they are going to get from Leilani Heights.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Total revenue.

WITNESS TUCCI: Total revenue.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Okay.

right now.

WITNESS TUCCI: And how much of that is

going to be the return on investment, their profit?

COMMISSIONER DEASON: I don't have that

number in front of me. I believe that our Staff

probably has it. I think Mr. Willis is looking for it

If we have it here, we'll get you that number before you leave this evening. And I would encourage you to speak to Mr. Willis. And if he doesn't have it with him right here this evening, I'm sure he will be glad to give you that information when he gets back to Tallahassee.

WITNESS TUCCI: And I'd like to know the rationale for all the base charges. Here again, usually a base charge is capital investment and everybody gets paid, you know, front footage, da-da, da-da. But now, here we are again, Leilani Heights, it cost them nothing. We all paid for it when we bought the lots, and we have got a base charge here of the stand-alone, modified FPSC of \$27.65 combined.

Before you even open the door you are paying \$27. For what? It's not based on usage. I mean, usage is the water, gallonage, and the gallons that go into the sewer. So what's the rationale there? Why are we paying a base charge there?

Of course, this is stand-alone. I can see the combined because we are paying for everybody else's investment. But we don't have it in Leilani Heights. Nothing. Yet, before I even take a drop of water, I am paying 28 bucks. What did I say earlier? Yeah, \$27.65.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: The rationale for a base facility's charge is, as you indicated, it is to pay for the fixed cost of a system. That does not vary based upon consumption or production.

WITNESS TUCCI: In this case it's nothing, though.

commissioner deason: And, apparently, there is a discrepancy between what you consider the rate base to be and what the rate base that was used to calculate the interim rates. And it may result from the acquisition adjustment issue which we just described. But Mr. Willis can also provide you what investment -- the amount of the investment that was used to calculate the \$27.65 base facility charge.

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You may disagree with it, and that's fine. But he can show you how that number was calculated.

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WITNESS TUCCI: Okay. Then let me go to the 6,000 gallon cap. You might just as well throw the cap out. If you're talking about trying to keep water -- preserve natural resources and reduce the draw on the aquifer, the 6,000 gallon cap, forget it. You might as well just have one flat charge because you are doing nothing to reduce consumption.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Now, you are speaking on the cap on wastewater billing; is that correct?

witness tucci: Yes. Reduce the amount of effluent going into the ground, back in the ground, I'll change it that way. You said the water aquifer, but the pollution affect. You are not doing anything to encourage less sewage.

commissioner deason: You make a very valid point. Let me point out to you that there are many customers, though, who disagree even with the 6,000 gallon cap. And their argument is that a lot of their water consumption is used for irrigation, washing cars, water that does not enter into the system, and they think the 6,000 gallon cap is too high, that it should be even lower. So those are some of the issues we're going to have to deal with in this case.

wITNESS TUCCI: Well, you know, the average use -- well, the 9,000 gallons they said in the figures they gave us, I guess that includes the sprinklers. I'd agree. I could see somewhere a cap, But 6,000 gallons is just ridiculously low. That's all I'm saying. I agree, sprinklers should be.

Just to give you some more information on Ms. Roberts. I spoke to her again about considering the -- well, that's all right. She was supposed to find out for me where the 6,000 gallon cap came, but she said she couldn't find out.

Then she sent me the amount of money that was spent in the capital improvements in Leilani Heights, and it comes to -- since 1992, \$287,000, which a lot of it is proposed in '96. And that comes to about -- well, if you divide that by five years and you divide it by how many months it goes, it comes to me -- at one time I think I figured about \$6 a month, you might say, would be for capital improvements.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: That would be on a per customer, per month basis.

WITNESS TUCCI: Yes. Somewhere I had it, but it got lost in the shuffle.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: And that's based upon a five-year amortization according to your

calculation?

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WITNESS TUCCI: She said it was from 1991 through '96. If you call these capital improvements -- water services, water services, water services, I don't know what that means; and a fence at the place of another fence.

And a lot of these things, items -- I guess they are capital expenses, electrical panel, an alarm, water services, meters, chlorine scales -- well, anyway, it comes down to about \$6 a month is what it would be for five years. If you want to talk about capital improvements, it came out \$6 a month per customer. Another figure to compare to what they want to charge, that there's no money invested, you know, it begins to be a little ridiculous.

MR. SHREVE: What did they give you as a total capital improvement for Leilani Heights? 287,000?

WITNESS TUCCI: Well, I asked for that, but here's what they sent me. It's "FPSC Plant In Service Additions by Project," from the last rate case through 1996. I asked for the capital improvements, and then she just gave me a list of all these things here.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: What was the total? WITNESS TUCCI: \$287,000.

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MR. SHREVE: Did you notice on there that about 155,000 of it, of the 287 is not in yet, but projected to go in in '96, but it's in this rate case?

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WITNESS TUCCI: No, it doesn't say that on my sheet, no.

MR. SHREVE: Okay. A very, very large part of that is in '96.

WITNESS TUCCI: Now, a figure was quoted tonight that about \$20 million is going to be spent in the next -- oh, next year. \$20 million next year would be spent on capital improvements. Is that the figure you said? Somebody said \$20 million? I did this fast earlier, and I can't remember now. It comes out to -- oh, we are spending \$50,000 a year, this figure that you supplied me, on capital improvements. You say \$50,000 a year. That represents .2 of 1% of the \$20 million.

MR. FEIL: Bear in mind, sir, that \$20 million was a companywide figure.

WITNESS TUCCI: Exactly. I'm saying,

Leilani Heights, and you're going to spend \$50,000 a

year average on us -- which was the average. That

comes to .2 of 1% -- no, .25 of 1%. And this is the

case now for stand-alone versus uniform rates, where

they're not -- they're not spending anything on ours,

so we would really be taking the royal -- thank you, gentleman and madam.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Thank you, sir.

MR. SHREVE: Thank you, sir. (Applause)

(Witness Tucci excused.)

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MR. SHREVE: Betty Critcher.

BETTY CRITCHER

was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn, testified as follows:

WITNESS CRITCHER: My name is Betty

Critcher, C-R-I-T-C-H-E-R. I'm from Leilani Heights,

1840 Northeast 23rd Terrace, Jensen Beach. And I'm

one of those people with dyed hair and retired.

(Audience response.)

I don't really have much to say and that is a rare thing for me. We do have sand in some of our systems. We have chlorine. We have sewer, but they call it sulfur. It still smells like sewer. I don't know how bad it is, I just don't want to drink it, so I buy bottled water.

In August of '95, we had a meeting with SSU, and we asked them for a breakdown of plant by plant or, in particular, our plant, what revenue was arrived

at for the year. They didn't have that. They don't have plant-by-plant revenues. Found out that was true. Then later in the year -- well, January in '96, 3 I did receive the amount of money that was derived. I don't think they really had that up until that point. 5 6 Also, we have just what the other gentleman 7 was talking about, the repairs. And from 1992 to 1996 what they do in the plant, what they are replacing, 8 | etcetera, what I'd like to know who is checking this 10 out and making sure that everything is replaced so

Also, when you vote on this rate increase or decrease, keep in mind that you might be living where we are, and that might have a lot to do with it.

that we know we are getting what we are supposed to be

MR. SHREVE: Thank you.

(Witness Critcher excused.)

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(Applause)

MR. SHREVE: Terry Coffinbarger.

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TERRY COFFINBARGER

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was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn, testified as follows:

WITNESS COFFINBARGER: Terry Coffinbarger.

I live at 1827 Northeast 21st Terrace in Leilani
Heights, served by SSU.

COMMISSIONER DEASON: Could you spell your name for us, please?

WITNESS COFFINBARGER: Yes, sorry.

C-O-F-F-I-N-B-A-R-G-E-R.

MR. SHREVE: That's wrong.

WITNESS COFFINBARGER: Let me look. Wait a minute.

event, although some of the faces do change. It seems like we pretty much come back to almost an annual event. I started, and there's some people here who actually started a long time before I did that have a lot of history. And, also, I'm sure the future will continue to attend the meetings. And there has been some excellent testimony. I'm sorry I was late to miss kind of the first part of it.

I will also say that Mr. Shreve's office has worked diligently with me and been willing to accept

numerous phone calls from me in trying to help provide information as best as possible during the time that I have and been most involved since probably '92. So that office has done wonders for us, and they continue to do so. Had they not, I guess the District Court of Appeals may not have had the opportunity to rule on the last two or three rate cases that have been brought -- that Leilani Heights has been involved with.

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You've heard the water quality which again, as the gentleman alluded to, are consistent problems

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Can't hear you.

WITNESS COFFINBARGER: Water quality is continually a problem, has been at all of the hearings. Capital investment, and I'm not real good with the numbers or the percentages, but we go all the way from a very small percentage to 200 to 300. I think in some cases we were around 500% at one point in one of the earlier rate cases.

There has been an awful lot of money spent on somebody's part over those last years, since at least 1992, defending a rate case to no real avail. We did receive refunds and that is built into the system. If the interim is finally denied or dropped,

that the customers do receive a refund of their dollars and they did during the time which another rate case was being -- another interim rate case was being filed, so that we could go through that process again.

I've asked and am in contact with some our legislators that we look at the process where you all would actually -- before the interim or the rate increase would be granted, that there would be some sort of a process where they wouldn't get the money up front and have to give it back later, but would actually have to prove themselves by some sort of regulation so, in other words, that they would earn the money rather than having to get the money, and then if you don't get to keep it, you have to give it back. I think that would make everybody's life a lot easier. (Applause)

It's already been pointed out that in 1996 of the -- 288, for a rounded number, thousand dollars are going to be spent or have been sent in Leilani Heights alone. Unfortunately, I don't have Tropical Isles' numbers here. There's also some astronomical numbers that are shown for Fox Run. But of that \$288,000, approximately, as Mr. Shreve has said, \$155,000 is projected -- budgeted expense. As I look

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at it, about 60,000 of that is actually regulatory mandate. Everything else is a quality of service which we've already addressed.

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So I would ask that the Public Service Commission to find a way to more effectively minimize the legal expense or the staff expense that goes into defending the rate cases, and find a way that maybe they could go back to the legislators and assist them in understanding what is going on. Because, again, since 1992, I have no idea what kind of dollars have had to pass through budgets for the Public Service Commission. I have no idea what has been budgeted as far as SSU is concerned. I have no idea what Mr. Shreve's office has to expend of his budget in defense of this particular type of rate case for SSU. there's also been private counsel that's been hired and I'm sure has been in front of you all, over this rate case, and I know previously Mr. Twomey alone, as I refer to him.

Again, there's no reason for SSU to do anything but to continually come back to you and ask you for another rate case, and then you all have to wade your way back down through that. It seems like it would be a more effective process if we could find a way not to do that.

The water quality, if they had actually been 1 delivering on the promises that we would not have the 2 3 water that we would want to smell in the jar, the toilets we didn't want to use, the bathes we didn't want to use, the bottled water expenses that the 5 l customers were having, if they had actually addressed 6 those things, there's probably a lot of people here 7 | 8 that would not be quite as upset with the Company as they are. But they are not receiving treatment as a 9 customer. They don't want to join in with SSU; they 10 want to fight them even if there might be a realistic 111

Were they to actually address the quality of service and the customers' needs and desires, the customers could become advocates rather than -- what do I want to say -- the other way.

increase that would be involved, because they don't

feel like they're being taken care of.

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So that's all. Again, I don't want to belabor all of those things.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Let me just say this, and I should have said it earlier, because I always make a point of saying it. If you ever have a problem with the Company, and you call them up, and you don't feel that they are taking care of your particular need, there is a number on this blue sheet on the

front page, it's a 1-800 number. And I'm sure many of you are aware of this -- you call up that number and you file a complaint with us. It takes a minute or two of your time, and they get the specifics, and our staff will be back to you, as well as the Company, with a resolution to that problem. But if you are feeling at some point that the Company does not take care of your need or your particular problem, please call us. That's what the number is there for.

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WITNESS COFFINBARGER: Commissioner Garcia, this isn't personal, but there are probably people in the room, at least from Leilani, that we have addressed, talked with Staff, matters have been investigated, but you have again heard in this public hearing tonight, most of those same people with the same complaints that they had at some point in time. And it may continue to be minimized. They may reduce as time goes on, but this is over a four-year process at that point in time, also. And it would seem that if the expenditures are actually being done to increase water or enhance water quality service, the end result is it's not netting out. It's not coming to the customers. So they will, the Public Service Commission will listen to you. They have investigated. The net results is that it seems like

you all become inundated.

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And, again, I go back to the process of interim rate increase cases. If you could spend a little less time having to prove that the Company's desires are actually what should be the best for them and the customer, and then maybe could address some of those other things, it would be easier for you, understanding that you don't regulate the quality of the water standards, and so forth. Those people are also, unfortunately, extremely stretched as well.

Our plant in Leilani has always been -- I shouldn't say has always been -- during this four-year period of time, in particular, is operating at max capacity. I think in wastewater there's not a great deal of a buffer area there. And in water quality the courting problem seems to be either a mechanical or a system that other systems don't necessarily seem to have.

Martin County Utilities, back in 1992, the customers were paying a larger base rate for wastewater and for water. They were also paying actually a higher rate, not substantially, but a higher rate. But at least they felt like the product that was being delivered to them was usable. So that I wouldn't have spent since 1988 on a monthly basis to

keep a water cooler and a water supply and so forth for my family to use. And, in fact, we have four animals in our house. And three out of those four animals won't drink the tap water.

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Again, I appreciate you all coming back out here. This meeting has been at least a lot more interactive and a lot more positive, I think, for everybody that's been here. So it's kind of nice to see that. But, again, not to belabor, but please, please try to find a way to stop spending the money to defend the rate increase and giving the money up front so that you can give it back if they don't deserve it. But we can't stop the filing to come back in, so that we go in and pay more money, and then hoping we're either going to get it back or we're going to have to defend it. With all of those revenues, probably we wouldn't need to have a rate increase at this point in time. That's all I have. (Applause)

MR. SHREVE: Terry, I just wanted to say how much I appreciate your help over the years, and I know how much time you have put in these cases for the last several years on behalf of the people. And I really appreciate the help that you've given us in representing them.

WITNESS COFFINBAKER: Thank you very much.

20	COMMISSIONER DEASON: Thank you.
21	WITNESS DAMPF: I want to address the
22	October 17th storm here in Martin County. We live on
23	the furthest western point of Leilani Heights. It is
24	the first road to the entrance going east.
25	Our road was flooded, has been flooded many

times, which is not SSU's problem. We had

two-and-a-half feet of water in our home and lost our

home. During the storm, SSU disconnected the water

system. We live on the lowest elevation road in

Leilani Heights. No one in Leilani Heights knew that

the water had been turned off until they flushed their

commodes and the commode did not refill.

My girlfriend called me. We found and solved the problem. They took water from their pool and put it in the tank. The commodes that were flushed in the rest of Leilani Heights ended up in our sewage system pipe that then became a septic tank for the entire development.

During the storm, the sewer pipes burst.

Our home and the other five homes on our block were flooded with water in the home, had sewage in them. Six days later when the water receded from our block, 13th Court, they had a septic company come and drain the pipes. No place else in Martin County had their water systems turned off but Leilani Heights. They said on the telephone to me at 10:00 at night that it had been ordered by the state as an emergency, that they were even doing it to Hutchison Island, which they were told not to, whatever water authority controls Hutchison Island, that the fire department

would not allow it.

Our home was flooded and we lost a tremendous amount. Had our home, which had electricity, caught fire, we would have lost the whole thing along with every other home in Leilani Heights.

They were unsympathetic. On the telephone I was told that this was ordered by the state or county officials. I ended up getting cut on metal floating in the water to get into my home to get clothes so I could go to work and ended up with blood poisoning from the fetus that was -- or whatever, feces, in the water. Ended up in the hospital. I don't think SSU is serving us very appropriately, nor do I care -- think they care they're serving us appropriately. Thank you, if you're done.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Ma'am, if I could ask you, could you speak to our engineer before you leave tonight?

WITNESS DAMPF: I have called the Public Service Commission.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Do you have a case filed on this?

WITNESS DAMPF: No, I do not. I have all kinds of mail from the state on it. I'm a school teacher. I haven't got time to be bothered with it.

But when a utility does not care about the people that 1 2 they service, they do not belong in business. 3 (Applause) 4 MR. SHREVE: Thank you. 5 (Witness Dampf excused.) 6 7 MR. SHREVE: Gerrie Fossler. 8 GERRIE FOSSLER was called as a witness on behalf of the Citizens of 9 the State of Florida and, having been duly sworn, 11 testified as follows: WITNESS FOSSLER: Good evening. My name is 12 Gerrie Fossler, 2268 Northeast 16th Court, Leilani Heights. I am a former president of the Leilani 14 Heights Homeowners Association. Nice to see you 15 again, Mr. Shreve. 16 MR. SHREVE: Good to see you. 17 WITNESS FOSSLER: I think my term of office 18 was in during the 1989 to 1991 discussions and fight 19 that we did. 201 To refresh you on the history, our 21 wastewater plant -- our sewer treatment facility and our water treatment facility, according to the county 23

24 commissioners and all the discussions we've had thus

far, we have a very bad system. Like someone else

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mentioned, the thing is totally max'd out, has been for years.

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When I became president of the homeowners association, I did so because there was a horrible problem in my home of hydrogen sulfide gas being emitted from the sewer treatment facility into my home. There had been a number of people in Leilani Heights who had fought this problem for a number of years since the beginning of the development to no avail. We fought and fought and fought. Southern States would not do anything. They would not lift their little pinkie to care about any of our problems.

When it got so bad that I was ill from the hydrogen sulfide gas in my home and I could neither sell my property nor give it away, that I was forced to become president of the homeowners association in order to be able to improve the situation in order to one day sell my house. I have noticed some improvement since our fight. I believe they finally decided to get a surge tank. I almost had a nervous breakdown over this thing before this happened, though. Many people moved out into Pinecrest Lakes before this happened.

They had collected money through the years on our bill every month, and yet they were ignoring

our desperate requests.

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COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Was this Southern States Utilities?

WITNESS FOSSLER: Southern States took over the syste -- I don't have the date, but I think it was

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: Ballpark, it doesn't matter.

WITNESS FOSSLER: About 12 years ago. And my fight was during '85 -- '90, '91. My fight was with Southern States Utilities, yes, sir.

COMMISSIONER GARCIA: They were billing you separately to provide -- I'm sorry, what did you call it?

WITNESS FOSSLER: They were billing as they are doing now, but the thing of it was we had so many problems, and they would not listen. They wouldn't send anyone out.

So, okay, we fought this thing. And they were in violation of many of the environmental agency's mandates, and I had to go do a lot of research to prove that they were in violation and surely they were. Mr. Shreve is aware of all this. But we had been paying our bills every months and we had been begging for years.

Okay. I would like to thank Southern States Utilities for giving us a gentleman by the name of Mel Fisher. He has proved to be much better and much more diligent in his desire to serve our needs. But the water that everybody has been describing to you is a definite problem. Both of my toilets have been stained beyond repair. A friend of mine tried to put something in them to remove the stains, and they are just absolutely horrible. You should see them; it's a mess.

The water quality fluctuates. It goes from -- we go from being extremely overchlorinated at times, where you get in the shower and all you can smell is chlorine, to where there doesn't seem to be much chlorine. We are having the same problems, it seems to me, with the water facility that we've always had.

I represent all of the single moms in

Leilani Heights who have been through a lousy divorce,
a really terrible divorce. My housekeeping skills
have gone down. I don't do near as much laundry. I

don't have a husband in the home anymore. My bills
are still up in the mid-60s. I'm not refilling my

pool right now. The only thing I'm doing is watering
my grass to keep the lawn green so that my neighbors

don't absolutely come out of the house and shoot me if my grass dies.

By bills are up there. I can't collect support from my husband who is out of state. I'm financially destitute, and it's really tough to even pay the bill I've got now.

Southern States was forced after our fight to make some improvements, mainly a surge tank that they had never given us. But in the middle of our fight, they were allowed to put the school onto our system. Then they wanted to put the post office on our system as well, and we fought that, and the post office had to get their own septic tank. It was a really hard battle. People were collecting money from us and just not caring how we had to live.

The people from Leilani Heights -- I've been there 19 years now. I'm probably one of the oldest residents. Like I said, its been a struggle year after year. And I do thank Mel Fisher and Southern States for giving us him.

As far as the equipment and the figures,
Mr. Shreve, you are right about the figures. Since I
have gone through this divorce, I'm sorry to say I
have not kept up with a battle with Southern States or
anyone else, and I've not been involved in a lot of

I do know that from time to time I still do this. smell the hydrogen sulfide gas. I know that it is 3 much improved from the past. We don't smell it all the time like we used to. I know the grounds, they have done some upgrading. I know they have worked on the ponds, and they have done some things in our system.

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Our system is a very bad system, and it's a very difficult system for Southern States to keep balanced out since we are so max'd out. We have approximately 400 homes, I believe, in Leilani Heights. Like I said, it is a difficult system.

Now, I do oppose the interim rate increase. I always have opposed that; I always will. I don't know of anyone else who gets by with being able to collect money on an unfounded basis. I can't go to work and get a job and collect a paycheck, unless I first perform my task and do it properly.

I understand that this is a system that is allowed by law for these utilities. I understand that the state does not want to go into the business of buying these very bad sewer treatment facilities and water systems. So we understand the bureaucracy that's involved. We understand that you have an obligation to consider any rate increases Southern

States requests.

will get better.

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I'm trying to understand the workings of the difference between the uniform rate and the stand-alone rate. My gut instinct tells me, since I've been so closely in the fight with Southern States for better quality of our systems, that I would really like to see -- if I'm going to pay \$65 a month and now maybe up to \$90 month, or whatever it is going to turn out to be, I'd really like to see some improvements in my subdivision so that I don't have to smell the hydrogen sulfide gas anymore and that the water

Mr. Shreve pointed out, I believe, if I'm correct, that they want 287,000 -- is that right, Jack? 155,000 they are saying will be spent in the year 1996. That means prior to 1996, if I'm correct, then 132,000 has been spent already. If the system was so terribly out of compliance with the EPA and all the other environmental agencies and they only spent 132,000 up to this point, I can't imagine how they're justifying \$155,000 in the year 1996. I would like to see someone actually go out and -- maybe a separate evaluation team -- someone to go out and see what the needs of this particular plant are, and see if you can actually justify what they are stating.

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I just got this from Betty Critcher, they say a backflow prevention device. I don't know and haven't been keeping up with how many of the things they are stating on here are actually going to improve the quality of the water or the quality of the sewer.

I don't know that the quality of the sewer can be very much improved. It's just a really bad system. You can ask all the county commissioners that have been involved in any of these rate cases in these previous years, and they will tell you we've all agreed in the County Commission meetings, our system is just really terrible.

Valve replacements, \$11,900 for valve replacements. I would be interested in someone taking me out and explaining to me how these improvements are really going to affect the homeowners.

They've already spent 132,000. And like everyone has told you, I can definitely guarantee if you come to my house and look at my toilets, there is something wrong with the water. I've been drinking it, too. I don't know.

When we get up here -- and I understand this and I hope everyone else understands this. When we get up here and we tell you how bad the water system is or how bad the sewer treatment facility is, then

actually we are telling you that they may need more money to be able to justify more improvements and repairs; but I think that really needs to be investigated very well.

I'm opposed to such a large increase. I believe at this point -- I mean, if I can understand this correctly, you know, if we get stand-alone rates on like the water as adverse to the sewer, then we are going to do better on one than on the other.

I really think I'm against the uniform rates at this point for the reasons I've stated, that our money really needs to fix our system. And I don't want to be paying or struggling like crazy and I don't know how successful I'd be to pay more than the \$65 a month I'm paying. But if I'm going to be pay upwards of \$65 a month and I've already greatly reduced the water facilities that I'm using, I don't want Southern States to have the freedom to take my hard-earned money and the little bit of money that I'm struggling with and ship it down to another county to fix their facility, and then we sit up there and our water is still bad forever.

I wish I had been more involved. I wish I could have been more involved. I wish I didn't have to come and just get involved at the last minute like

this with some last-minute figures.

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You will have to find it in your hearts and in your minds. You'll have think about your own situations. You've heard everyone. You hear all these people on fixed incomes. It is a nightmare. Our husbands are losing their jobs. Our husbands and wives are getting divorced. None of us are hardly making it. I'm on food stamps. The only money I get right now is about \$407 a month for SSI for my son. That's what I'm living on. I just got my house out of foreclosure and I'm losing my car.

I ask you to please, if Southern States can actually justify to you Commissioners that they have done well with the \$132,000 that they have already spent, and you can have a separate investigating team go out and justify an increase, please understand our needs as well and our living conditions and what we can and cannot afford and try to balance it out to come up with something very fair. I'm very much opposed to giving Southern States this type of increase or this amount of increase. It seems to be very much excessive to me.

I'm not against Southern States making a profit, and I'm not against Southern States upgrading our facility. But like I said, you are going to have

to way it out very carefully in Leilani Heights 2 because I don't know how much they can actually upgrade that system and what the specific needs are. 3 4 I thank you for your time. (Applause) 5 MR. SHREVE: Thank you. 6 Chairman, that's the last signature we have. 7 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Thank you, Mr. Shreve. I want to thank all of you who came out from 8 your schedules and joined us this evening. I want to 9 again apologize for the cramped quarters that we met 10 in this evening. We did not anticipate such a large 11 turnout, but I'm sure that is an indication of the amount of interest and concern that the customers have 13 14 in this proceeding and this request. MR. SHREVE: Mr. Chairman, we have one more 15 person who would like to speak. 16 17 COMMISSIONER DEASON: Oh, I'm sorry. MR. SHREVE: I think Mr. Simpson wanted to 18 19 wrap up or something. 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Secondly, we hear all of these statistics, and statistics will tell you anything if you torture them long enough. And some of these have been highly tortured. And it seems to me that with the staff SSU has, if they would do more of trying to cut out the type of public relations that they are now operating, which seem to be failing miserably, that has one of the lowest regards of any utility company in our area, and instead concentrate on coming up with a very clear answer about how much does it cost to haul stuff away, wastewater away from our area.

Instead they choose the best alternative,

Tropical Isles, a base rate. Why? They don't want to

use a gallonage charge there because if they use a

real gallonage charge, we would pay nowhere near the

amount because we don't use the water that much, we're

gone, many of us are gone half the time. So please,

somebody, give us the straight stuff, so to speak, on

what our costs are. We would like to have that.

SSU, their information sessions, rather at Tropical Isles and here at the other places and last week, they have been vague, inconsistent, incomplete; and when they did get technical, they weren't sure

what they were saying when asked that.

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SSU claims Tropical Isles has its high rate because it has such a small number of residences. Yet on that long list, there are parks with much fewer residences and a lower rate.

Again, the word "uniform" does not mean average. Uniform rate is what they want to set and charge and what they think they can get by with and then it will become an average for us. But it is not an average based on what we should be paying. So let's be careful of our terms.

we seem to be -- you're double-dipping, SSU seems to be doing it from what I hear tonight, amortizing and depreciating, setting aside a capital improvements fund on something that they didn't have in the first place, charging a hookup fee for new places, yet at the same time I understand they have a reserve fund to fund three years of hookups down the line. They are coming at things two ways. They are charging, they are inflating, they're billing their cost, and, sure, a 10% return on the fund is fine. But I have a hunch that the 10% is on a highly inflated cost value, might be nearer 30 or 40% income. And please -- I know you are checking the books, Commissioners, check them carefully.

1 For example, very recently we're told that they do a lot of things with their operational cost. 2 It's a high operation cost for Tropical Isles. Just 3 4 in the past few months we've seen the trucks around. 5 And I think they'll give you those cost figures of the past few months as typical, when before if a Southern States Utilities' truck was in there, it was probably 7 8 lost. (Laughter) Again, I hope government in the sunshine 9 could get into sewers -- it's going to be hard to 10 do -- and see what's going on here. But, as your 11 bosses, your taxpayers, thank you for being so kind 12 and understanding, and take the morning off. 13 14 (Applause.) COMMISSIONER DEASON: Thank you, 15 16 Mr. Simpson. As I was indicating, I appreciate everyone 17 coming out this evening and sharing your thoughts with us. We do appreciate it very much. And with that, 19 this hearing is adjourned. 20 21 MR. amortization = the process of spreading original investment (capital outlay) costs over a period of payments.

- ERU = equivalent residential unit meaning SSU estimates a residence will use a certain number of gallons per day of drinking water (dw) & wastewater (ww); currently, 250 gallons per day, year-round, for drinking water with 80% 100% wastewater ratio.
- * How does SSU use this in setting Ti's rate?
- Is the ERU set on 12-months occupancy (which is not the case in TI)?
 - FPSC = Florida Public Service Commission, an appointed body which is to protect the public interest against unfair rate requests by monopolies such as utility companies. It has the right to audit books & other documents & to hold hearings. Complaints about PSC should be sent to the Governor.

MHP = manufactured/mobile home park.

modified stand alone = see "stand alone".

OPC = Office of Public Counsel is a state advocate for public interests. Attorney Jack Shreve from OPC is scheduled to be present at this hearing.

PSC (see 'FPSC')

resident = one who lives in a MHP whether or not he/she owns the land.

SSU = Southern States Utilities, the company which handles Ti's wastewater. (ph. 800/432-4501) (Ft. Pierce Utilities supplies Ti's drinking water.)

stand alone rate = is based upon SSU "determination of revenue needed to collect on capital improvements and rate base divided by the number of customers" which 219 in TI. (SSU report rec'd. 1/29)

2. Background Highlights

About this time, TI "gave" the ww plant to SSU (#2101). 1987

A report from SSU's Ida Roberts rec'd. 1/29/96 shows:

- (1) SSU 'bought' the system in 1988 from Shackett & Spizizen.
- (2) the price was \$10.00 but assets at the time were less amortization & depreciation still =

\$457,467.29 \$341,787.61

{ It is interesting to note here that costs are to the penny, while

SSU reps. said on 1/23/96 that "exact cost allocations weren't feasible".

1990 SSU received a rate increase. (SSU meeting; 1/23)

- 1992 SSU's requested uniform increase approved by FPSC but blocked by 2 clients' lawsuits. 1st DCA told FPSC to review procedures & cost allocations. An interim uniform rate of \$17.05/month was suggested.
- 1992 A FPSC ruling (#92 FPSC 2:409), in effect, said that large utilities are to be encouraged to acquire small systems at no or minimal costs so as to provide better services to the people of the State, thus the buyers would be allowed to amortize the full, original construction price of the system regardless to price paid. This apparently allows a utility company to amortize costs it didn't pay and still charge a fee for capital improvements, whether made or not!
- 1994 SSU claims it lost \$500,000 (Ida Roberts, Stuart meeting, 1/23/96)
- 1995 While PSC review of the court order is in process, SSU comes back to PSC with a request for "stand-alone" rate increases which PSC ok's & is effective at the end of Jan. 1996.
- During PSC review of court order, SSU comes back to PSC with request for "stand-alone" rate increases which PSC ok's & is effective Jan. 1996. [Why did PSC do this? How much influence was MacKay's letter? (See 3c)]
- 1995 SSU report on TI Plant #2101 improvements (rec'd. 1/29/96 from Ida Roberts, SSU)
- a. Total of \$20,267 divided by the 219 TI residents shows a capital improvements to the existing system of \$92.54 per household over 10 years or \$9.00 a year!
 - b. \$6,950 of the \$20,267 or 34.3% was done before SSU "bought" the system.
 - c. Of the \$20,267, only \$5,649 or 27.9%) was by 'regulatory mandate' compared to 64.7% statewide (see next item below)
- 1995-96 SSU sends a series of memos to clients about need for increasing fees which, to TI residents, sound like SSU hasn't had a fee increase in years,
 - a. plus most of the increased costs are caused by state & US environmental laws; \$75m of \$116m (64.7%) since 1992. (SSU meeting 1/23/96)
 - b. It is noted that an inflation adjustment is made regularly to bills without prior warning. While minimal, they do add up.
- 1996 -- Jan. 30-31. Lt.Gov. MacKay's office has promised to fax a copy of the letter sent to PSC regarding SSU's financial health. L.G. MacKay calls it an "inquiry". (See Pt.3c, below.)

3. Questions/statements to PSC.

- a. We understand that PSC's purpose is representing the public interest in fair prices which an open market permits in private business,
 - (1) but utilities, usually necessarily, are monopolies & must be regulated.
 - (2) PSC must be sure that any utility operates efficiently and "downsizes" as necessary as private businesses have done recently, such as AT&T.
- How has PSC done this as far as SSU is now concerned?
- b. While public utilities must be allowed a profit and a right to receive increases in light of inflation and increased costs, has PSC
 - (1) fully investigated SSU's management costs, in comparison to other Fla. utilities?
- (2) reviewed SSU's amortization schedule of capital outlay into monthly fees where the dw/ww plants were given to SSU or sold to SSU at a substantial discount? [Reported examples: TI, Fisherman's Haven (Martin Cty.), Kissimmee, & Deltona.]
- * (3) reviewed the quality of information given by SSU to its customers in light of the criterion that it is sufficiently understandable so that an informed response can be made?
 - (4) looked at SSU mailings to TI customers.
 - (a) No clear explanation of the need for a cost increase was given.
 - (b) No adequate explanation has been made of differences between "stand alone" "uniform" rates.
- c. We are particularly concerned about the following from the <u>St.Lucie News</u> (1/27/96):

 TALLAHASSEE --- A utility lobbyist drafted a letter signed by Lt.Gov. Buddy MacKay and sent it to state regulators shortly before they considered a \$12.3 million rate increase for Southern States Utilities.

MacKay sent the letter to Susan Clark, chairwoman of the Public Service Commission, last month, expressing concern for the company's financial health two weeks before the PSC voted on the company's request.

Public records show MacKay's letter was supplied by Southern State's lobbyist, Jeff Sharkey, a Chiles-MacKay supporter and a former business associate of the governor's son.

The action astounded Public Counsel Jack Shreve, who represents consumers in rates cases before the PSC.

"In my 18 years as public counsel, I've never seen a utility in the state of Florida try and influence a decision by the Public Service Commission like this," Shreve told the <u>St.Petersburg Times</u> Friday.

- (1) Betty Critcher (1-334-4862) & Louise Corcoran (1-224-9579) of Leilani Hts. (Martin Cty.) were concerned about this letter & called MacKay's office. A spokesperson, Kim, said it was "only an inquiry".
 - (2) I requested a copy of the letter (1/29) & it was to be faxed to me "before 2/1".
- (3) In light of the letter, if received & once we read it, the following questions might be asked:
 - (a) Does SSU or its officers & lobbyists make major contributions to Chiles & MacKay's campaign funds?
- (b) Was PSC informed that SSU's lobbyist wrote MacKay's letter?
- (c) Did PSC respond to the letter?
 As an inquiry?
 If so, what was said?

3. Questions/statements to PSC., cont'd.

- d. TI residents strongly urge FPSC to be sure that "information" released to customers by utilities such as SSU be clear to the average citizen/consumer; be complete, & that the utility be held responsible for not supplying such data.
 - (1) SSU visited TI in July; about 15% of the residents were available for the meeting.
 - (2) SSU's 1/23 meeting: one handout; an explanation of how Fla's environment has forced SSU to ask for a raise in fees. No one was available to answer engineering or accounting questions. (1/23)
 - (3) At SSU's 1/23 meeting, Ms. Roberts promised that responses would be delivered to all questions prior to the 2/1 PSC hearing. Some items were received on 1/2/9.
 - (4) She also indicated that the Chief Financial Officer would call & explain TI's inexplicably high increase. As of 1/30, no information has been receive by phone or mail. Why?
- e. Has PSC considered SSU's use of ERUs in mobile home parks where at least half of the residents are gone several months each year. TI has @ 50% occupancy June November.
- (1) We understand that SSU's ERU used in computing drinking water (dw) / waste water (ww) residential usage is set at dw use of 250 gallons/day with 80% to 100% of that as the ww estimate. Is this correct?
 - (2) TI's estimated usage is significantly less.
 - f. It is understood that rates & their increases cover:
 - (1) amortization of capital costs of plant at original cost, not SSU purchase price;
 - (2) estimated maintenance & operation costs;
 - (3) changes to meet environmental regulations;
 - (4) reserve fund for an emergency like a major fire, &
 - (5) for SSU, a 3-year impact fund reserve for new residences & businesses.
 - (6) Questions:
 - (a) Is the above list of factors correct & complete?
- (b) Why should amortization of the plant's cost be included when the plant was given to SSU? This is separate from a maintenance fund.
- (c) Why should current residents pay SSU's cost of providing for new customers?
 Why isn't this included in new customers' charges as impact fees, especially since
 - SSU charges new customers a hookup or start-up fee?
 - (d) How much & how often is the rate increased for inflation? (TI rates have increased slightly during the past two years.)
- * g. What specific improvements has SSU made to Plant 2101 at TI {Requested at 1/23 mtg; promised before 2/1; not received as of 1/30/96}
- * (1) Reportedly, a flow meter was one improvement made by SSU to 2101. If so, what does this show in terms of ERUs <u>each month</u> at TI?

3. Questions/statements to PSC.

h. SSU's current request for increases wastewater rates in Fla. average \$5.68 per month or \$68.20 a year. This \$5.68 or \$68.20 = 50.7% increase in 3 years -- far above any data we have on cost of living factors.

- i. Further, SSU's proposed increase for TI is from \$13.33 to \$44.27 per month!
 or a jump from \$159.96 to \$531.24 per year -- an increase of 232.1%!!
 (1) This is 7 TIMES HIGHER THAN THE NEXT HIGHEST PROPOSED INCREASE!!!
 WHY???
- (2) Ms. Roberts and aides (1/23) said this might be due to the smallness of the number of residents served (219). Yet, 2 parks in Martin Cty. are smaller and have much lower rates requested. WHY???
 - (3) PSC approval of SSU's requests would make TI the highest in wastewater basic service, by far, with the second highest SSU rates proposed at (\$17.59 per month) or \$211.08 per year which is 152% higher.
 - (4) . Four of the 21 areas covered under the SSU proposals would receive an average reduction of \$2.81 per month which would put their rate at \$17.21 or \$17.59 per month. How are these justified in light of the confiscatory increase requested for TI by SSU?
- * (5) How are these proposed rates justified under either the uniform or stand-alone rates?
- j. Following the 1992 remand to PSC, an interim rate for TI was proposed at \$17.05.
 - (1) How was this set?
 - (2) Why isn't it being considered now?
- * k. What is PSC's schedule of activities regarding this increase following this hearing?
- I. What steps may the homeowners' associations take if they are not satisfied with PSC's decision?
- * m. Some have been told that PSC gets a small percentage of utilities' rate increases for its own operations. Is this true? If so, can't this cause a conflict of interests?

- * 4. Conclusions should be mentioned, too.
- a. TIHA unanimously supports this appeal to FPSC.
- b. It will actively consider further appeals if FPSC allows any major increase in rates.
 This would include seeking greater assistance from OPC & FMO and making appeals to courts and the Governor.
- c. We believe that SSU has used the old mushroom approach in management of rate increases;
 - (1) at least, representatives have used another management style of "when in doubt, mumble", in answering questions.
 - (2) PSC must cut through the "needs" & "costs" presented by SSU and find out the real need.
 - d. Ida Roberts, SSU representative at the Martin County meeting of 1/23/96, indicated that SSU didn't expect to get its full request; that 70% of a requested rate increase was the maximum PSC had ever granted previously.
 - (1) In other words, the request for rates seems to be like bargaining for a used car except in language the customer doesn't understand. Thus, can it be assumed that SSU inflated its request!
- (2) If so, by how much?
- 4. Follow-up suggestions should be given to one of the TIHA officers.

a. On the handout (SSU 1/23/96) comparing 3 Martin County Parks & TI as to stand alone, modified stand alone, & uniform rates, TI is always set the highest. If SSU had its preference -- "uniform" rates, TI would have a rate that is double that of the 3 in Martin County. (\$44.27 compared to \$22.33 in SSU report of 1/12/96)

* Why??? TI is not the largest nor the smallest park.
It isn't the only one which gave its plant to SSU.
Upkeep has been less at TI than state-average figures given by SSU. (1/23)

- * b. Why can't SSU, w/ PSC & OPC prior review, come up with a clear & complete statement of what
 - (1) its real costs are for a given park based upon true usage &

(2) project rate increases needed clearly

(3) rather than having meetings at which vague cost concerns & factors are mentioned.

The combination of these three items plus incomplete information in letters sent to customers hardly builds customer confidence in either SSU or PSC.

- * c. TI was assured that TI reps would be called by SSU's Chief Financial Officer (CFO) to explain TI's exorbitant, recommended rate of \$44.27. This did not occur.
- (1) <u>Ft.Pierce Tribune</u> (2/1/96, p.A2) cited SSU's Tracy Smith who said:

 * (a) SSU needs money to pay for over \$100 million in expenses for compliance with environmental mandates.

Ida Roberts (1/23 meeting) said it was \$75 million.

WHY, AGAIN, ARE DIFFERENT FIGURES GIVEN?

* (b) TI plant had a loss of \$13,000 in 1994 & 1995 plus an estimated loss of \$16,500 in 1996.

WITH 200, 250 & 300 TI RESIDENCES FOR 1994, 1995 & 1996 RESPECTIVELY, THIS IS A CLAIMED LOSS PER RESIDENT OF ONLY:

1994 = \$65.00/year or \$ 5.42 per month. [\$13,000/200] 1995 = \$52.00/year or \$ 4.33 per month. [\$13,000/250]

1996 = \$55.00/year or \$ 4.58 per month. [\$16,500/300]

* (2) HOW COULD PSC GIVE AN INTERIM INCREASE OF \$24.62 TO \$37.95 PER MONTH WHICH IS HIGHER THAN 2 OF THE 3 FINAL RATES SSU REQUESTED FOR TI? [\$36.86, \$37.73 & \$44.27.]

[From Jan. to Aug. 1996, when PSC is to set final rates, the total increase is \$196.96 per TI residence or 4 times SSU's claimed shortage.]

c. Comparing Ft.Pierce Util Auth. (FPUA) monthly rates for residences like TI, it is a base of \$ 9.25 per month (\$111.00/year) plus \$ 3.30 per 1000 gallons used. thus only a minimum charge of \$ 9.25 applies when residents are gone. For many homes, this would average only a little more than SSU's current rate.

PSC is strongly urged to carefully examine wastewater charges of other utility companies. It seems Lt.Gov. MacKay's 'inquiry' said the same thing

in a different way!

. . . .

d. 1988-1995 depreciation/amortization of #2101 = \$115,679.88 (This includes "CIAC" which SSU didn't define.) (1) Over the 7 years, this is equates to an annual 16,535.70 (2) With 300 units, TI resident's share per year = 55.09 (3) Or (divided by 12) a monthly share \$ 4.59

- What accounts for the rest of the \$44.27 SSU wants to charge TI? Certainly not the \$4.50 per month to make up for losses.
- e. It appears, although no clear explanation was received from SSU's Chief Financial Officer, as Ida Roberts indicated (1/23/96), that SSU in its various rate plans for TI is

(1) doubling income by getting amortization/depreciation of a plant that

cost it only \$10.00.

(2) using part of the high rate to put away a reserve fund for new hook-ups while still charging those residences a start-up fee.

(3) blaming environmental/health mandates: 64.7% in FL; 27.9% in Tl.

(2) using political influence & vague information to get PSC to approve unjustified & unexplained rates.

f. TI notes that

(1) it has been unable to get any clear cost figures for its plant though requested and promised (1/23 meeting).

(2) SSU information has generally been vague, inconsistent, incomplete and too technical even for SSU reps. to understand (at 1/23 meeting).

(3) SSU's need for a special, exorbitant rate at TI is not born out by amortization, depreciation, environmental compliance or operating-loss data.

- (4) SSU claims TI has to have a high rate because of the few residences, yet smaller parks have a lower recommended rate.
 - (5) SSU's proposed rates tend to double up or expand basic data; e.g.,

(a) amortizing & depreciating a plant that was given to SSU while

charging to develop a reserve fund for capital improvements.

(b) setting a high estimated usage rate (ERU) then holding it for the full year, although @50% of residents are gone for many months a year.

(6) SSU has put little into repair & environmental compliance at TI.

- (7) SSU's definitions of "stand alone" & "uniform" do not hold true when TI's recommended rates are concerned; TI is not "uniform" with other parks, and the "stand alone" rate is not justified by SSU's cost figures.
- g. PSC MUST REQUIRE SSU TO GIVE ACCURATE, CONSISTENT DATA INSTEAD OF CORPORATE MUMBLING & MUSHROOM MANAGEMENT, AND THEN SET RATES ACCORDINGLY!

THE AMOUNT OF EXPENSE SSU HAS USED TO DEFEND HIGH RATES SHOULDN'T BE PASSED ON TO THE CUSTOMERS!



A copy of the list of SSU customer names and addresses used to print the mailing labels for customers in the aforesaid counties is attached hereto and marked "Exhibit B." "Exhibit C" attached hereto, is the presorting report printed from SSU's Information Services Customer Address Files to prepare the mailing.
- 5. On January 2, 1996, my staff and I machine postmarked the labeled envelopes containing copies of Exhibit A and hand delivered the envelopes to a representative of the United States Postal Service for delivery.
- 6. Attached hereto and marked "Exhibit D" is a copy of the relevant page of SSU's Office Services' Postage meter logbook. The logbook is used to record mailings from SSU's Office Services Department. Exhibit D contains information pertinent to the aforementioned mailing, to wit: on January 2, 1996, SSU mailed 7,342 total batch items, which included mail fitting the description "Martin" and "St. Lucie" for the Stuart service hearing. I personally made this entry into the logbook, and the recordation therein coincides with my personal observation.

PURPOSE

The purpose of the service hearing is to allow customers and any substantially affected person an opportunity to present comments and information to the Commission about the utility's quality of service, the proposed rate increase, or other matters related to the rate case or the utility. The utility is requesting that customers served water under conventional treatment methods be classified as a separate and distinct service classification from customers receiving water service from reverse osmosis facilities. Under the utility's proposal, the base facility and gallonage charges assessed to customers will be uniform within each service classification. All wastewater customers are included in one service classification and would be charged the same base facility and gallonage charges. The utility's application indicates that the utility has or will have placed nearly \$100 million of additional water and wastewater plant into service since 1992 and through the period ending December 31, 1996. The application also indicates that the majority of these plant additions were required by environmental laws, rules or regulations. The utility's requested service availability charges include charges for meter installation, main extension, service installation, plant capacity, and allowance for funds prudently invested (AFPI). These charges will only be assessed to new customers who connect after Commission approval of the charges. Existing customers will not be assessed service availability charges. Plant capacity and main extension charges for water treatment are classified by conventional and reverse osmosis treatment methods. The utility proposes plant capacity and main extension charges which are uniform within each water service classification. The utility proposes only one service classification for wastewater service, and the plant capacity and main extension charges proposed for wastewater are uniform.
