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48. Please provide a detailed justification for GRU's decision to adopt each of the reliability criteria identified in GRU's Response to Staff's First Set of Interrogatories, Interrogatory No. 1.

Response

20%:

7

GRU's reserve margin criteria was 20% reserve margin from 1985 through 1996. Prior annual planning hearing reports from the FCG used a one day in ten LOLP criteria. These reports had on average a 20% reserve margin for the State. Since GRU's system has strong ties to the Florida grid and thus has a very low assisted LOLP, GRU adopted the 20% reserve margin as a minimum for its system so that GRU would never fall below the State's reserve margin.

15%:

Over the past years, due to stronger transmission ties to the North and improvements in existing generators and aggressive maintenance practices the projected LOLP values for the FRCC region have improved to the point where it is no longer the driving factor of the amount of reserves required for the region. The projected reserve margin levels are now the driving factor for the amount of needed reserves for the FRCC region. GRU has added and is permitting new generating units which add diversity to the mix of capacity in its System. Since 1997 GRU's reliability criteria has been 15% reserve margin calculated at the annual peak hour. GRU supports the FRCC's analysis of the adequacy of a 15% reserve margin.

Further discussion of GRU's reserve margin criteria are contained in the material sent under separate cover in response to STAFF'S FIRST REQUEST FOR PRODUCTION OF DOCUMENTS TO GAINESVILLE REGIONAL UTILITIES, DOCKET NO. 981890-EU, Item 1. Provide all available supporting documentation detailing the evaluation of and reasons for adopting both currently and previously used electric reliability planning criterion identified in Interrogatory No. 1.
