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PROCEEDINGS 1 CHAIRMAN EDGAR: As I mentioned when we first began, 2 Item 4 has been deferred, and so that will bring us to Item 6. 3 4 And we'll give our staff a moment to switch out and get 5 settled. Okay. As the record reflects, this is a posthearing 6 7 decision; therefore, discussion is limited to Commissioners and 8 staff. And I also understand that we have an oral modification. And we're ready when you are. 9 MR. TRUEBLOOD: Good morning, Commissioners. 10 I am Frank Trueblood of Commission staff. Item 6 is an arbitration 11 case between Verizon Access and Embarg. This recommendation 12 addresses two issues that the parties have not been able to 13 resolve through negotiations. 14 At the time the recommendation was filed, there were 15 three remaining issues. Subsequent to the filing of the rec, 16 17 staff was notified by letter on July 26th, 2007, that the parties had resolved Issue Number 4. Therefore, staff 18 19 recommends that the Commission disregard Issue 4 in its 20 entirety since the Commission does not need to vote on this 21 issue. Staff is available for any questions. CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Thank you. Commissioners, are there 22 questions on Item 6? 23 Yes, Commissioner Argenziano. 24 COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: Yes, Madam Chair. 25 I have FLORIDA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

1	problems with Issue 1, and I move to deny staff on that issue.	
2	I don't think it should be treated as a long distance call.	
3	I have no problem with the remaining issue, Number 3.	
4	CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Okay. Commissioner, just so I am	
5	clear, what you're expressing is some concern or disagreement	
6	with the staff recommendation on Issue 1, but satisfaction or	
7	concurrence with Issue 5. Is that	
8	COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: With the compensation	
9	portion. I thought it was Issue 1.	
10	CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Okay. And, Commissioner, I am	
11	having trouble hearing you. Can we Mike, can you	
12	Mr. Staden, can you help? I'm having problems hearing	
13	Commissioner Argenziano. Maybe we can, can get the amps upped	
14	or something.	
15	COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: How is that?	
16	CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Oh, that's better.	
17	COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: Is that better?	
18	CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Thank you. Yeah. Thank you.	
19	COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: Okay. I thought it was	
20	Issue 1 where the compensation for interconnection, the	
21	interconnection agreement. Larry, is that correct? Wasn't	
22	it 1? Because I'm looking at it and reading it, it seems	
23	correct. That's the problem I have. It would then be treated	
24	as a long distance call and I don't think it should be.	
25	CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Okay. And the remaining Issue 5	

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5 COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: No problem. 1 CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Okay. That's what I was --2 COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: I'm sorry. Thank you. No 3 problem with that. 4 CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Okay. That's what I was trying to 5 make sure that I was clear. And I would ask staff to please 6 give us some additional discussion. 7 MS. OLLILA: Good morning, Commissioners. Sue Ollila 8 on behalf of staff. 9 Issue 1 concerns the compensation for virtual NXX 10 calls. Staff recommends that the physical end points of the 11 call determine the compensation. Staff is available for your 12 questions, Commissioner. 13 COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: Madam Chair? 14 CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Yes, Commissioner. 15 COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: Thank you, staff. I have 16 no questions. It's just my opinion that it should remain a 17 local call. Using the Internet now and you're connecting, if 18 you have Juno.com and you get a local exchange number, many 19 people rely on that. And the companies use that now, so if you 20 change that to have some kind of tariff or long distance, that 21 is no longer a local call and will be charged as long distance. 22 And I can see that being passed on to the consumer and just 23 don't think it should be. 24 CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Commissioners, any other comments, 25

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questions, discussion?

Commissioner Carter.

COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Madam Chair. Just -- I don't know if I -- maybe I was, had a moment where my brain was on loan to the Smithsonian.

What is the perspective in terms of how would we re-craft Issue 1 based upon Commissioner Argenziano's statement? That's what I'm listening, I'm trying to find -- I don't think I heard that.

MS. OLLILA: Excuse me. Verizon Access proposed that based on where it has facilities, any vNXX call would be treated essentially as a, as a local Internet call; that is, the rate would be the same. Obviously if you wanted to go that way, certainly that would be a proposal that you could accept.

There was not, if I might, really any evidence beyond a brief mention at the deposition. And although it is out of the, really the scope of the issue, if, if you're -- if you would like, I could explain a little bit of how, of what might happen if staff's recommendation were to be approved and how it might impact customers.

CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Yes, ma'am, please.
MS. OLLILA: Well, the ISP is Verizon's customer.
And if Embarq were to start charging Verizon originating access
for those vNXX calls that terminated outside the local calling
area, Verizon Access, depending on what kind of contract it has

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1 with the ISP, may or may not pass those calls on and that's -2 those charges on and that's what we don't know. We also don't
3 know what the ISP would do.

COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: Madam Chair. CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Commissioner Argenziano.

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COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: I'm willing to guarantee 6 that that would be passed on to the consumer. There are 7 probably thousands of consumers who use those local exchange 8 numbers for their Internet service now. And without a 9 quarantee that that would not be passed on to the consumer, 10 what we're then doing is adding a long distance charge, which I 11 think the company just can't eat on their own. I think that's 12 going to be passed to the consumer. So without that guarantee 13 of it not being passed on to the consumer or the rates going up 14 15 for the consumer, those thousands, if not millions, of people who are using that type of Internet service now, I'm afraid 16 17 that we'd be passing on a very, you know, what could be a very 18 large -- changing the way things are now, and that's moving towards probably, you know, making it harder or more expensive 19 to use the Internet. 20

MS. OLLILA: And that was the point that the Verizon witness made, that, that the minutes would disappear, that people would find other ways to access the Internet, you know, as opposed to the rate increase.

COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: And, Madam Chair, possibly

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1	then signing up with a pay Internet instead of the free		
2	Internet providers like Juno and FastMail and all those that		
3	are out there now. So that to me is taking away from the		
4	consumer. Thank you.		
5	CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Thank you.		
6	Commissioner Skop.		
7	COMMISSIONER SKOP: Thank you, Madam Chair. And the		
8	question is directed to staff regarding Commissioner		
9	Argenziano's concern.		
10	My understanding with respect to the Commission		
11	precedent on this specific issue is that it is based on the		
12	precedent and just soundly on doing what we've done in the		
13	past; whereas, third parties are free to negotiate to, amongst		
14	themselves to either waive these charges or what have you. Am		
15	I correct to understand that I believe in staff's briefing that		
16	was a point that was articulated that probably hasn't come out		
17	in the course of our discussions?		
18	MS. OLLILA: Yes, you are correct. I mean,		
19	negotiations between parties are something very much apart.		
20	And what the Commission has decided in the past actually does		
21	serve as a guide. Although not in this recommendation but in		
22	others, if staff believes that there's a compelling reason to		
23	change what the Commission has decided, staff would recommend		
24	that.		
25	COMMISSIONER SKOP: And as a follow-up, Madam Chair,		

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1.	just to echo on Commissioner Argenziano's concern, again, this
2	could be an instance where, you know, although parties are free
3	at arm's length to negotiate things, they're mutually
4	beneficial to themselves. Commission precedent could also be
5	used as a stick, if you will, to leverage people to get the
6	desired results. So, again, I do think Commissioner Argenziano
7	raises a valid point even if it represents a significant
8	departure from Commission past precedent. I think maybe, you
9	know, that might be worthy of discussion amongst the Commission
10	as to what we want our policies to be, whether to adhere to
11	precedent, which is, should be given deference, or whether
12	maybe it's time to reconsider where we should go with that.
13	CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Commissioner McMurrian.
14	COMMISSIONER MCMURRIAN: This is where I step in and
15	complicate things, I guess, as usual.
16	I guess, you know, I have concerns about what we're
17	talking about too, and I guess that I have to admit that I
18	hadn't given that as much consideration as I probably should
19	have. And I guess for my purposes it seems like it's going to
20	be rather difficult to kind of get through all that here today
21	and that perhaps, perhaps, I'd just put it on the floor,
22	deferring this item so that we can each maybe have the benefit
23	of talking through this with staff, knowing more detail and
24	getting more up to speed on Commissioner Argenziano's points as
25	she's made them here today and be prepared to give that full

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consideration. Because at least from my part I haven't, and I 1 would like to give that some more consideration before I vote. 2 CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Commissioner Carter. 3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Madam Chair, I think 4 Commissioner McMurrian was reading my mind. Because still, I'm 5 still uncomfortable with the response in terms of the impact of 6 Commissioner Argenziano's perspective in terms of how it 7 impacts this. So maybe we need to re-craft this. So I was 8 really, I was going to ask Mr. Cooke if he would look at this 9 in totality and see what impact Issue 1 would have on the 10 remaining issues in this case. But I think that maybe given 11 additional time we could probably review this. So I would move 12 13 we defer this case to a future agenda.

14 CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Okay. Commissioner Carter, before 15 we take that up, let me look to Mr. Cooke. I am seeing no 16 critical dates in the information that is before me. However, 17 I do recognize once again that it is posthearing, excuse me, 18 posthearing and, of course, we are limited to the material that 19 is in the record. And I'm going to give Mr. Cooke a moment 20 here.

MR. COOKE: The only deadline that I can think of off the top of my head is there's generally a 90-day deadline after a close of a hearing for us to render an order. I think this happened on May, early May. So May, June, July -- perhaps we can get a waiver of the time frame. And we have on some

occasions gone beyond that time frame when circumstances
 warrant. The way the court looks at it is is there a prejudice
 that occurs to the party? So I think we can defer this, I
 guess, is the bottom line. We may have a 90-day issue, but
 we'll try to address that.

CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Okay. Well, I think what I'm 6 hearing, Commissioners, and, of course, let me know if I get it 7 wrong, but Commissioner Argenziano has raised a point of 8 concern about potential impacts to customers from the 9 information, from the recommendation that is before us. I'm 10 also hearing some other Commissioners express a desire for 11 perhaps the opportunity to look at that issue more closely and 12 to have staff reexamine or at least look at that issue and give 13 us the opportunity for their further thoughts as to that 14 15 potential impact. I recognize, as always, that we try to move 16 forward timely and meet deadlines, but we also want to make 17 sure that we move forward thoroughly.

18 So Commissioner Carter has made a motion for a 19 deferral. You've heard from our General Counsel about the time 20 frame. Are there additional thoughts?

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Madam Chairman, just to be 22 heard on my motion, what I'm suggesting is not an indefinite 23 deferral, but certainly give staff an opportunity to come and 24 talk to the Commissioners individually about the perspective 25 here because this is a consideration, frankly, that I had not

made or even considered. And I think that having the opportunity to consider it in context, I think we could probably be ready for this within the next agenda or certainly within two agendas from now. So that's the context of my motion for deferral.

CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Thank you, Commissioner Carter. 6 7 Mr. Cooke, did you have an additional comment? MR. COOKE: Just that we would try to bring this to 8 9 the next agenda and do this as timely as possible. I also think that if there's an issue of deviating or changing a prior 10 policy, it behooves us to have articulated a reason for doing 11 that, making sure it's based on substantial competent evidence. 12 13 So there's good reason to have further reflection and discussion with staff on this to make sure that you can get to 14 that point. 15

16 CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Commissioners, we have a motion for 17 a deferral in keeping with the discussion that we have had, and 18 the expectation that it will come before us at the next agenda 19 conference with our staff having had a little more time to look 20 at the record evidence that was presented. Is there a second?

CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Okay. We have a motion, we have asecond. Is there any further discussion?

COMMISSIONER SKOP: Second.

Commissioner Argenziano.

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COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: What I would like, I think,

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1	before the next agenda, if possible, from staff is more
2	information on the direct trunk issue that was, I think there
3	was agreement between the two companies. And I'd like to know
4	the status of that and maybe some kind of time frame to see
5	when that could be possible, if it is possible.
6	CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Yes, ma'am.
7	MS. OLLILA: Commissioner, may I ask if you're
8	referring to the facilities that Verizon would, would have in
9	Embarq's okay.
10	CHAIRMAN EDGAR: Okay. Additional comment or
11	question? Seeing none, all in favor of the motion, say aye.
12	(Unanimous affirmative vote.)
13	Opposed? Show it adopted.
14	Thank you to our staff. Thank you, Commissioners.
