CHAIRMAN CARTER: With that, Commissioners and staff, we move to Item 10. Give staff an opportunity to get settled in.

You're recognized.

MR. GARL: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Item 10 is the triannual review of the utilities', electric utilities' long-term fuel emergency plans. All the plans have been reviewed from the 15 generating electric utilities, and the only changes -- the majority of the changes are name, organizational changes. And the more detailed list of changes is shown in Attachment A to the recommendation.

CHAIRMAN CARTER: Thank you. Commissioners.

Commissioner Skop, you're recognized.

COMMISSIONER SKOP: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Just a quick question for staff, a general question on Page 3 under identification of specific actions. I guess in that paragraph it describes the general order of specific actions. And I guess I have the dumb question of the day, but I'm going to go ahead and ask it.

In terms of Items 5 through 7 or 5 through 8, if that is the general order in which things will happen, I guess I'm wondering as to why the order is the

way it is for those Items 5 through 8 to the extent that from a Commission perspective we've put a lot of emphasis on demand-side management and other initiatives, and it would seem to me that Item 6 could probably be Item 5, if you would, to where you'd implement interruptible and load management programs before you would reduce voltage or -- and if -- you know, followed by implementing, Item 8, from load curtailment procedures over and above the environmental constraints. So I just wanted to get a little perspective from staff on how that order was arrived at because to me I'm struggling with it a little bit. I think the plans are fine, but I'm a little perplexed by the chronological order of the events that might occur.

MR. GARL: I understand, Commissioner.

Actually it would be speculation on our part as to the order. But it is notable that every one of the 15 plans submitted, that's the order it goes in. The order that it goes in is not specified by rule, statute or anything else.

Just to speculate, you don't want to turn off anybody's power. You reduce the voltage, but you still provide them power, and that's why five would go ahead of six. And then at that point then you start reducing your load by interrupting power followed by a request to

relax some of the environmental constraints that have to go through the Governor to the federal level. And then firm load curtailment as the last step, turning off people's electricity.

COMMISSIONER SKOP: Okay. And, again, I was just trying to rationalize that in light of state initiatives both on demand-side management and environmental activities.

Just one question with respect to the voltage reductions to conserve fuel. What impact, if any, does it have on reliability or potential damage to equipment?

MR. GARL: Not being an engineer, some equipment could suffer possible damage. But each of the utilities has looked at that and they've got any number of engineers working there that understand what lower voltages do to motors and pumps, and at that point in time there's a lot of publicity going out by multiple means letting folks know that this is one of the things that may happen.

COMMISSIONER SKOP: Okay. Well, and, again,
I'm fine with the staff recommendation. And, Mr. Chair,
I'll move to approve the staff recommendation. I would
just ask staff on a forward-going basis to take a hard
look at the order of five through eight, at least for
the money that we're putting in DSM or the incentives

1 that are offered to consumers to have them readily be 2 interrupted when, you know, when it's necessary to do so and they see the benefit of that through the incentives. 3 It would seem to me that that might be something that might be used. Obviously we don't want to see consumers 6 lose electricity. But, you know, if you signed on board 7 for that, then you ought to be on call to do it. And I 8 just appreciate the explanation on that, but I just 9 wanted to get a little clarity. So, Mr. Chair, I'd move 10 staff's recommendation on --11 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Okay. One second. 12 Commissioner Edgar. 13 14 going to second the motion to approve staff recommendation on this item. 15 16
