2	CHAIRMAN CARTER: And when we last left we
3	had called staff up and the parties to come together
4	on Item 4.
5	Staff, you're recognized.
6	MS. CURRY: Kiwanis Curry on behalf of
7	Commission staff. Item 4 is staff's recommendation
8	that the Commission accept the joint settlement
9	agreement between Verizon, the Attorney General's
10	Office, OPC, and AARP whereby to resolve the
11	apparent violations of Rule 25-4.070. Verizon will
12	issue credits to all local residential customers in
13	the amount of \$1.75 million, contribute \$250,000 to
14	the general revenue fund, and provide Lifeline
15	discounts to all eligible customers who request the
16	discount and receive regulated telecommunications
17	service packages.
18	In addition, a letter submitted by the
19	Hispanic Legislative Caucus was placed in the docket
20	file on November 9th. The letter discusses the
21	dispersement of the settlement agreement and
22	requests that the promotion of Lifeline and Link-Up
23	programs be considered. The parties would like to
24	address this issue at this time, and staff is
25	available for questions.

CHAIRMAN CARTER: Okay. Mr. O'Roark. 1 Mr. Beck, do you want to be -- now, you guys changed 2 vour seats on me, so I don't know who wants to be 3 first. Who's on first? 4 MR. O'ROARK: I'm happy to speak up, Mr. 5 Chairman. 6 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Mr. O'Roark, you're 7 8 recognized. MR. O'ROARK: Good morning, Mr. Chairman 9 and Commissioners. De O'Roark with Verizon. 10 Verizon supports staff's recommendation. 11 Earlier this year Commissioner Skop, who was the 12 prehearing officer in this case, strongly encouraged 13 the parties to try to get together and reach a 14 settlement. It has taken some time and a number of 15 negotiating sessions, but the parties were finally 16 able to get together and achieve a mutually 17 acceptable resolution that has a strong focus on 18 consumer benefit. 19 Verizon appreciates the effort that staff 20 and the other parties have made in bringing this 21 matter to a conclusion. Verizon would respectfully 22 request that the Commission approve staff's 23 recommendation. 24 Let me add that with respect to the letter 25 FLORIDA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

that came in last night, the parties were made aware 1 2 of that this morning. We have caucused. Obviously, 3 the other parties and staff can speak for themselves, but my understanding is that all parties 4 continue to stand behind staff's recommendation. 5 However, if it were the Commission's pleasure and 6 the Commission wished to allocate \$50,000 of the 7 \$250,000 earmarked for the general revenue fund and 8 to take that \$50,000 and have Verizon use it for 9 10 Lifeline/Link-up outreach, that would be acceptable to Verizon and my understanding is that would be 11 acceptable to the other parties. 12 13 Thank you. 14CHAIRMAN CARTER: Thank you. Mr. Beck. 15 MR. BECK: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 16 Charlie Beck, Office of Public Counsel. Т 17 agree with what Mr. O'Roark said. We caucused 18 before agenda this morning and certainly if it is the Commission's desire to allocate \$50,000 to the 19 20 Lifeline promotion in Verizon's territory, we're 21 good with that. 22 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Mr. Twomey, good 23 morning. MR. TWOMEY: Good morning, Mr. Chair and 24 25 Commissioners. I'm Mike Twomey appearing on behalf FLORIDA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

of AARP Florida. That's correct, we're in 1 agreement, first of all, with the staff's 2 recommendation that you approve the settlement, of 3 course. And that if you are of interest in taking 4 \$50,000 from the 250,000 earmarked for general 5 revenue, that would be fine by us. Thank you. 6 7 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Ms. Bradley, good morning. 8 MS. BRADLEY: Good morning. Cecilia 9 Bradley on behalf of the Attorney General. We 10 certainly support the settlement agreement and 11 staff's recommendation. We think it provides some 12 benefits directly to consumers that will be helpful 13 14 there. As to this thing that came up yesterday, 15 16 if it's the Commission's wish to do so, we would 17 support that. We certainly support Lifeline and Link-Up. Our only request would be that there be 18 certain guidelines so that we can ensure that it's 19 20 spent for the most useful purpose for Lifeline and Link-Up, and I'm sure staff can come up with some 21 22 guidelines to make sure it is very effectively used 23 and within a reasonable period of time. Thank you. 24 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Thank you, Ms. Bradley. 25 Commissioners, I think that it's an

opportunity for us to do something good. 1 Commissioner Skop did a good job as prehearing 2 3 officer on that. He encouraged the parties to 4 settle. Usually when you do that no one gets what they want, but it ends up being a pretty good deal. 5 And I think that with the letter from the Hispanic 6 caucus requesting that some of these funds be set 7 aside to spend for Lifeline awareness in the Verizon 8 9 territory is a good idea, and I think that anything 10 we can do to increase the percentage of our Florida citizenry in the Lifeline program as well as 11 increase the knowledge of the program is going to 12 better serve the less and the least of us. And I 13 think it's a good idea; I'm very supportive of it, 14and I look forward to us having our discussion on it 15 16 and moving forward. 17 Commissioner Skop, you're recognized. COMMISSIONER SKOP: Thank you, Mr. 18 19 Chairman. 20 And I also echo your comments and

appreciate the letter from Representative Bovo in the Hispanic caucus. Just one follow up on that request to staff in relation to earmarking \$50,000 of the proposed settlement going to the general revenue fund. To address Ms. Bradley's concerns,

what safeguards could be put on that to ensure that the money is prudently spent to promote Lifeline and Link-Up within Verizon's service territory to benefit the constituents in those areas as well as what efforts does Verizon already have to do or requirements in terms of promoting it. So I'm trying to understand the benefits that might enure from adopting the request.

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9 MS. SALAK: Verizon is required to already 10 do some outreach that's specified by 364.10 with 11 other agencies and other places. Under the federal 12 guidelines, they are required to advertise and do 13 outreach, also. So this would be additional funds 14 that would be available for outreach in this case.

We have had monies earmarked for outreach before for two other companies and they set up what are called community service funds. Basically, in those cases we have reporting requirements and a sign-off of any expenditures by OPC. So OPC would virtually have to approve of their expenditures.

COMMISSIONER SKOP: And I think that addresses the concern. I think that's adequate protection, OPC signing off, and I think that's a great suggestion to promote Lifeline and Link-Up. And to Mr. O'Roark, I appreciate the effort of your

company to work with the parties and achieve a
 favorable settlement for consumers of the state of
 Florida.

MR. O'ROARK: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN CARTER: Commissioners? Commissioner Argenziano.

COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: Is \$50,000 -- I 7 mean, \$250,000 is a drop in the bucket for GR 8 anyway. I mean, is there anybody objecting to maybe 9 putting more into the advertising of the Lifeline, 10 more than 50,000? In today's market of advertising, 11 12 50,000 doesn't get you very much. I don't know if it throws a monkey wrench into anything, and I'm not 13 trying to do that, I just don't know what the 14 differences are. Because when you look at 250,000 15 in general revenue, I mean, that's kind of a joke. 16 17 That doesn't do much to general revenue.

MS. SALAK: I can only tell you -- and I think the parties will have to address that. I can tell you that during our negotiations that was an important point for some of the parties, that some money go to general revenue. They would have to address it themselves today whether or not it should go to Lifeline or GR.

COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: I mean, is there

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a reason that it wouldn't be more money going to 1 more awareness so there wouldn't be any doubt that 2 the proper advertising of the program were out 3 4 there? I mean, what is it going to do for GR? Ι guess I'm just looking at it on a bigger picture 5 thinking that 250,000 -- I would rather see 50,000 6 go into GR and the rest for advertising the program. 7 CHAIRMAN CARTER: That's a good idea. 8 MR. BECK: Commissioner, if it's the 9 10 Commission's desire to spend more of that money 11 toward that we would have to caucus separately. Ι 12 mean, we have all agreed to support the agreement. It's unanimous. If there would be a change we would 13 have to meet to discuss that. It is whatever the 14 15 Commission's pleasure is. COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: I don't want to 16 17 stall anything or throw a monkey wrench. 18 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Would that give you guys heartburn if the Commission were to recommend an 19additional amount to gc to marketing versus the 20 200,000 into GR? 21 22 MR. BECK: We would simply have to meet. 23 I think some of the principals would have to concur and we would have to get -- if that is your desire, 24 25 we would need to meet separately and discuss whether

we would do that.

COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: And, Mr. Chair, 2 it just seems that there has been -- I mean, even 3 through the letter from the caucus that there seems Δ to be still an awareness -- a lack of awareness by 5 some people out there about the program. I know it 6 has been moving along and it's doing better, but 7 obviously there is some concern, and I just didn't 8 know. And really knowing how much 200,000 means to 9 10 general revenue, I thought perhaps -- but, you know, it is up to the will of the Commission and the 11 12 parties. 13 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Commissioner Edgar for a 14question. 15 COMMISSIONER EDGAR: When I reviewed this when it it first came in to us, and I'm pleased to 16 17 have a settlement put forth to us, so I thank all the parties and, of course, our staff for working 18 together. But the question that immediately hit me, 19 20 which I think is similar to what I'm kind of hearing 21 is why a portion to general revenue. And I'm all 22 for good funding for general revenue that is used for good things, but realizing that the initial 23 24 complaint was for injuries to customers, why a 25 portion of a settlement to general revenue and what

FLORIDA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

is kind of the philosophy or the basis of that, as opposed to something that goes more back directly to the customers in one form or another.

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4 MR. BECK: Commissioner, had this case 5 gone to hearing, the Commission's sole authority would have been to fine the company, so any outcome 6 of the case would have been to general revenue 7 funds. What we did is we agreed that 1.75 million 8 would go to customers instead of that, and then 9 10 parties agreed that 250,000 should go to general 11 revenue. So what the agreement does is shifted it to customers more than it would have -- the 12 13 Commission could have done had it gone to hearing.

14 Settlements are important. And one of the 15 provisions of the agreement, and this is fairly 16 standard in settlements, is that no party to the 17 settlement will request support or seek to impose a 18 change in the application of any provision of this 19 settlement agreement.

20 **COMMISSIONER EDGAR:** I understand that, 21 Mr. Beck. I was just wondering what the thinking 22 was behind an amount, whatever amount, to general 23 revenue.

24 MR. BECK: Well, other than all of it 25 would have gone to general revenue had it gone to

FLORIDA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

hearing, and we allocated the vast margin of it to customers instead of that, but we felt a portion should still go to general revenue. If it is the Commission's desire for us to do something different, we would be glad to meet and do that. But it would simply -- I don't think we can negotiate in front of the Commission and reach an agreement in that manner.

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CHAIRMAN CARTER: Well, we certainly don't 9 want to derail the hard work, and we sincerely 10 11 appreciate the efforts of the parties. And I think 12 that just the mere fact that you have agreed to put 13 50,000 among the -- all of the parties have agreed to the 50,000, I don't want to lose that. I would 14 15 rather have that, but like Commissioner Argenziano 16 said, you know, \$200,000 in a \$60 billion budget, 17 you know, don't move the needle that much. I mean, 18 I'm in favor of the agreement, but I would hope if -- I don't want to derail it, but I wish that we 19 20 could give more to the Lifeline program. And I'll 21 tell you up front, I'm a cheerleader for Lifeline, 22 so that's where I'm coming from.

23 MR. O'ROARK: Mr. Chairman.
24 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Mr. O'Roark.
25 MR. O'ROARK: Given what the Commissioners

are saying, I wonder if you might give us one minute 1 to caucus. And rather than have this -- it sounds 2 like the Commissioners might prefer to see some more 3 money go to the Lifeline fund. Verizon is prepared 4 to suggest something right now to the three persons 5 sitting immediately to my left, and I think in a 6 minute we could probably figure this out. 7 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Let's take a break, 8 Commissioners. We'll take five. 9 10 (Off the record.) 11 CHAIRMAN CARTER: We are back on the And when we last left, Commissioners, we 12 record. 13 gave the parties an opportunity to kind of have a little council. 1415Mr. O'Roark, you're recognized. MR. O'ROARK: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 16 17 The parties did confer briefly, and what we would be willing to do is split it 50/50, 125,000 18 for Lifeline outreach, 125,000 to the general 19 20 revenue fund. 21 CHAIRMAN CARTER: Outstanding. 22 Outstanding. Thank you very kindly. Commissioners, why don't we close this out 23 before they change their mind. 24 25 Commissioner Argenziano, you're recognized FLORIDA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

for a motion.

2 COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: I move staff on the new recommendation of the splitting 50/50, and 3 that's my motion. 4 CHAIRMAN CARTER: She moves staff with the 5 understanding that the 250 -- instead of going to 6 7 general revenue, 125 will go to the Lifeline awareness program and 125 will go to the GR. 8 9 Commissioner Skop. 10 COMMISSIONER SKOP: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I would second the motion. And just, if 11 I heard staff correctly, that Public Counsel will be 12 signing off on -- okay. Thank you. 13 14 **MR. BECK:** (Indicating yes.) 15 COMMISSIONER SKOP: So I second the 16motion. 17 CHAIRMAN CARTER: And that is consistent with how the program works now is that OPC has to 1819 sign off to make sure that there is integrity in the 20 program, and I feel very comfortable knowing that.
