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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Item Number 4.

MS. LEE: Good morning, Commissioners. Pat Lee of Staff.

Item 4 on today's agenda is the review of FP&L's 2010 nuclear decommissioning cost study. The last decommissioning cost study for FP&L was reviewed by the Commission in 19 -- was part of a 1998 cost study. Since that time, there have been various stipulations, and the accrual, decommissioning accrual has been suspended.

In the study before you Staff is recommending a zero accrual to continue, primarily due to a decrease in escalation rates, a 20-year life extension on each of the units that has been approved by the NRC, and also a reduction in the estimated costs to reflect reimbursements from DOE as a result of a 2009 settlement concerning on-site storage of spent fuel.

Staff is also recommending an increase in the amortization of end of life material and supplies inventories, as well as the last core of nuclear fuel to be effective at the time of FP&L's next base rate proceeding. Staff is available for questions.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Thank you.

FLORIDA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

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Mr. Butler.

MR. BUTLER: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Ross of FPL is also appearing on this item.

FPL fully supports the Staff recommendation. Thank you again. Staff has thoroughly reviewed our 2010 decommissioning studies.

FPL responded to over 145 data requests in support of Staff's evaluations, as has been very thoroughly reviewed. Staff concluded, FPL agrees, that FPL's annual decommissioning accrual for each of its nuclear plants should remain at zero.

Just to make clear what that means, the annual accruals of zero mean that FPL's customers are currently not paying anything in their electric rates toward decommissioning costs. And that's made possible because the funds that FPL has already set aside, along with the earnings on those funds, are expected to cover the future decommissioning costs under current assumptions about escalation rates and the earnings on the funds. And, of course, those assumptions can change over time, which is why we also agree with Staff that, you know, FPL properly should file its next decommissioning study no later than December 2015, consistent with the Commission's decommissioning rule. And in short, we'd ask you to approve Staff's recommendation. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Thank you, sir.

Commissioners. Commissioner Balbis.

COMMISSIONER BALBIS: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

I just have one quick question, and it really has to do with Issue 3 for Staff concerning the spent nuclear fuel management costs.

It's stated in the recommendation that the U.S. government makes payment to FPL to cover its costs for the management and storage of the spent nuclear fuel. I just want to confirm that the, they're getting reimbursed fully for those costs or, or not?

MS. LEE: Commissioner, it's my understanding that FP&L will be reimbursed for all of those costs as they are incurred.

COMMISSIONER BALBIS: Okay. Maybe the question for Florida Power & Light. Do you feel that the reimbursement rate is, is, is enough to cover the current and anticipated costs?

MR. ROSS: Yes, Commissioner Balbis. The settlement agreement provides that the government is required to reimburse the company for any spent fuel management costs that arise because of the department's delay in disposal of spent nuclear fuel.

Our experience so far under the settlement agreement is that the company has been able to recover

most, if not all, of its spent fuel management costs. The obligation for the government to reimburse the company for those costs continues until the government starts to perform its disposal obligation. So we have very high confidence that most, if not all, of the spent fuel disposal costs will be reimbursed by the government.

COMMISSIONER BALBIS: Okay. Thank you. I have no further questions.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Is that a motion?

COMMISSIONER BROWN: Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Commissioner Brown.

apologize. I would go ahead and support the motion; I just wanted to make a comment. Because this is a unique item that we don't really get to see every few years, so I did want to just indicate that I do support the source of having a dedicated funding source for the removal of spent nuclear fuel. The Yucca Mountain repository, I believe that we all wish that it would come to fruition, and -- but -- and it would provide some level of comfort and reassurance. But there are a lot of moving parts here, and I can acknowledge that, and it's hard -- it's not an easy assumption to accept that there's sufficient funds for this purpose. However, I do believe that

Staff has reviewed, excuse me, reviewed this thoroughly and reviewed the data, the cost estimates, and the project, projected funding, and based on the current figures to date, the company's decommissioning trust fund is adequate. So I would move Staff's recommendation on this item. CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: It's been moved and seconded, Staff recommendation on Item Number 4. Any further discussion? Seeing none, all in favor, say aye. (Ayes unanimous.) Any opposed? (No response.) By your action, you've approved Staff on Item Number 4. MR. BUTLER: Thank you, Commission. (Agenda item concluded.)
