PROCEEDINGS

CHAIRMAN BRISE: At this time we will move on 2 to Item 6. And I think if everyone recalls, Item 6 was 3 something that we were dealing with in December with 4 respect to Gulf and the hearing, and there was a 5 stipulation. So we will ask staff to tee it up, and 6 then at that point we will come back to the Commission. 7 We expect that it will be primarily a Commissioner 8 discussion. Obviously, the Commissioners will have the 9 opportunity to ask questions if necessary, but we look 10 forward to a robust discussion amongst Commissioners. 11 So, Staff -- I don't know -- Caroline? 12 MS. KLANCKE: Caroline Klancke from 13 Commission staff. 14 As you noted, Item 6 addresses Gulf Power 15 Company's motion for approval of partial settlement 16 agreements filed in Docket Number 110138 on 17 December 16th, 2011. This motion is comprised of 18 two partial settlement agreements, namely the 19 stipulation and agreement regarding settlement of 20 certain revenue issues and the stipulation and 21 agreement regarding settlement of certain costs of 22 service and rate design issues. The approval of the 23 motion is contingent upon the approval of both 24 settlement agreements. 25

Staff and the parties are available to 1 answer any questions that you may have. 2 CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: Thank you very much. 3 At this time I'm going to open up the 4 board and see if Commissioners have comments or if 5 we are ready to move on to a motion. 6 Commissioner Balbis. 7 COMMISSIONER BALBIS: Thank you, Mr. 8 Chairman. 9 And I just have a few comments on this 10 11 issue, and a lot of my comments I stated previously when we discussed this proposed stipulation. And as 12 before, you know, I want to state I'm always in 13 14 favor of stipulations. I think that when all 15 parties can come together and agree on an issue or 16 issues, I think we all benefit. But I do have two 17 concerns about this proposed stipulation. You know, in this case I don't believe 18 19 that we do have all parties that are in favor of the 20 stipulation because some those are conflicted out. 21 I mean, we have the Office of Public Counsel who is charged with representing all customers who both 22 23 represent the residential customer and even 24 industrial customers that may be impacted differently, so obviously they are conflicted out on 25

this. And I think similarly the Florida Retail Federation which represents small mom and pop commercial customers as well as the large customers. And, again, those will be impacted differently. So obviously they are conflicted out. So the first concern I have is that we do not have all parties that are weighing in on this.

The second concern is that I understand 8 this is not the first time that the cost allocation 9 10 methodology has been proposed to be changed, and this Commission previously, I believe, in 2002 11 12 denied that methodology after a full review of the 13 record after staff provided the Commission with a 14 recommendation based on briefs by the parties. And 15 there may be compelling arguments that it's time to change the cost allocation methodology, and I'm not 16 17 stating that it is not, but I am uncomfortable with 18 changing basically what this Commission decided in 2002 without a full review of the record, without 19 20 the parties being given the opportunity to provide 21 briefs and staff providing us with a full 22 recommendation.

So I continue to have those concerns. If at the end the day we determine that Gulf's proposed methodology is the best, most accurate allocation of

costs, then we should approve it. But before we 1 possibly shift costs to residential and small 2 commercial customers, I want to be assured that it 3 is the most accurately reflection of the costs. So 4 I continue to have concerns about this, and at this 5 point I cannot support approving the stipulations. 6 CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: Commissioner Brown. 7 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you. 8 And I share a similar sentiment with 9 Commissioner Balbis, but I do have some questions 10 for staff with regard to what is the harm if this 11 Commission does not approve the stipulation today. 12 MS. KLANCKE: I think that staff believes, 13 and as we specified at the hearing, although we are 14 truly in a posture where we are neither for nor against 15 any of -- we have not taken any positions, and we are 16 still awaiting briefs on all seven of these issues. 17 And we have not formulated opinions on them. We 18 believe that it would be extremely beneficial to the 19 Commission to have the ability to review staff's 20 recommendation on these issues. Because of the highly 21 technical nature of many of the issues, it would be 22 beneficial to have not only all of the evidentiary 23 record consolidated in one document for your review, 24 but also to have the benefit of the briefs in which the 25

parties will provide their arguments with respect to 1 all seven of the issues in the settlement agreements. 2 And staff believes that that is extremely necessary and 3 beneficial in the instant case. 4 5 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you. Actually, I 6 have one more question. Ms. Klancke, since the 2001 Gulf rate 7 case, what change in circumstances has occurred to 8 warrant use of the MDS methodology? 9 10 MS. KLANCKE: That question was posed to the 11 utility in early discovery, in particular in Staff's Fourth Set of Discovery, which is part of Exhibit 89 in 12 the record, and the utility declined to provide 13 14 instances indicating a change in circumstances in the 15 record. 16 In addition, at the hearing they did not elucidate any additional change in circumstances, 17 but for the downturn in the economy, which was 18 19 specified by counsel for Gulf. Other than that, 20 staff is bound by the record to advise you with, and 21 staff is unaware of any change in circumstances that would warrant it at this instance that's reflected 22 in the record. 23 24 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you.

And other than the CHELCO case, has this

Commission considered using the MDS methodology?

MS. KLANCKE: Since the 1980s, this Commission has considered and contemplated the use of the MDS methodology nine times that I'm aware. And with the sole exception of the CHELCO case, we have declined to adopt it, most articulately analyzed in Gulf's last rate case for a myriad of reasons, but most recently we also analyzed this in the Florida Power and Light case, their last rate case, 080677, and we declined to adopt it in that instance, as well.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you.

And, Commissioners, if we are going -- in 12 my opinion, if we are going to deviate from this 13 Commission's practice and precedent, I think we need 14 to do it a fully vetted appealable order that gives 15 notice to the parties and others alike of why we are 16 going to either adopt the methodology or not adopt 17 it. So I'm in support of -- I'm not in support of a 18 19 stipulation.

CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: Commissioner Graham.
COMMISSIONER GRAHAM: Thank you, Mr.
Chairman.

I guess I'm odd man out here. I'm not going to believe, or most of this -- most of what I'm going to have to say was already said before we

broke three weeks ago. I'm of the mind-set that, you know, we need to be allocating costs for what they cost. And if they cost a little bit more to deliver it to the residential, then it should cost a little bit more. If it's less to deliver it to the big industrial user or to the military, I think then it should be a little less.

I mean, I think our job is to make sure 8 that we're going out there truly allocating the cost 9 of service to who we're providing it for. I know 10 there's some talk about economic development. 11 You can believe those numbers or not believe those 12 numbers, but I'm excited about going down this path. 13 And hopefully even if we don't get done it today 14 that we get it done sometime in the near future, or 15 16 at least start trying to see if we can make something like this work. 17

I think Gulf being as small as they are 18 and where they are conveniently located, I think 19 they are a great place to get started or at least a 20 21 good place to test this theory and see how it works. CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: Commissioner Edgar. 22 23 COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Thank you Mr. Chairman. And thank you, Commissioners, for your 24 25 comments and your thoughts.

I know that each of us has spent a great deal of time thinking about these issues and reviewing. We certainly did talk it around and around at the end of the hearing that evening and then the next day. And I know I have, and I know each of you have looked at the record and have met and discussed with our staff since that time.

I go back to some of the discussion that we had those previous times, and I understand the desire for more information always. Sometimes it's that last bit of information that can make the difference. But I do, once again, have a concern about some of the characterization of what is before us. We are talking about very specific and very narrow revenue issues with a dollar value assigned, as agreed to by the parties that are before us, and about a cost-allocation methodology. And I have to come back to some of the comments I made before about a methodology being a methodology, and no methodology being perfect in every situation.

I don't think the methodology that has been used in other cases is perfect in every instance for every cost for every customer in every geographic distribution, you know, the best that could be done. And I think the same of the

methodology that is before us, probably not perfect in every instance, but a rational design that has been supported by, I believe, three expert witnesses that have come before us on the record in this specific case.

And I also do believe, and I am repeating myself I know, but I do believe that the panhandle of Florida and the territory that Gulf serves is somewhat different than other areas of the state. And as a statewide body, I believe that it is very much within our authority and our responsibility to take some of those regional and customer-based distinctions into account. I also do believe that the western panhandle of Florida does compete economically more with other southeastern states than, say, does south or central Florida.

And with that, I do think that it is our responsibility to take all of those things into account. I understand, again, the desire for much of the technical information to be detailed. But, Commissioners, I have great respect and belief in the ability of our staff to write out a specific order per our decision and our direction from the record and the transcripts of the discussion that we have had to date and that we will have again.

And I do believe, and I know that we have 1 done that before, and I do believe that if this 2 Commission, a majority of us were to decide to support the stipulation, that the discussion that we have had would absolutely provide for a full and 5 thorough order that absolutely, should it need to be appealed or should somebody desire to, would provide 7 the basis for that and for any parties to 8 participate and for it to be clear and for the 9 background to be there. 10

I have a great deal of respect for 11 precedent. I think that if you were to look over my 12 13 voting record in the seven years I have been here 14 that that would be clear, but I also believe that it is the responsibility of the five of us, with the 15 information that we have, and recognizing that 16 things do change over time, to make a decision in 17 every issue with the best information that we have 18 before us. 19

20 So the point that it would be a change in methodology, as has been pointed out, I recognize 21 22 that change in methodology, but I believe that 23 precedent should be persuasive, but that every situation should, of course, be examined for its 24 unique circumstances. And I think that the 25

agreement that has been posed to us is a reflection of some of those changed circumstances and the expert witness testimony that we have in the record before us.

So with that, I would ask that we, again, as we are here, we have all day, not that we need all day and we all have other things to do and things going on downtown that I know we are interested in, but while we are gathered together, I think that the five of us can make a good solid strong decision, and there may not be a need to just keep kicking this can further and further down the road.

CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: Thank you.

I have a question for FEA. During my time 16 here FEA intervenes, but seldomly is there a strong 17 18 intervention as there is this time. So if you can 19 talk to me a little bit about the benefit that this particular stipulation would have for the military 20 21 in that region, and talk about the impact of this stipulation with respect to the military in that 22 23 region and what that means more globally from your perspective to the region. 24

25

MAJOR THOMPSON: Yes, Mr. Chairman.

Northwest Florida has six of the largest 1 bases in Florida that are represented by Tyndall, 2 Eglin, Hurlburt, and then the Navy bases are 3 Eqlin -- or, I'm sorry, the navy bases are 4 Pensacola, Whiting, and then Panama City. So we 5 have six very large bases represented within 6 Northwest Florida, and those bases do all their own 7 distribution. However, we still pay for the 8 distribution costs that are associated with the 9 nonMDS system. So that is one of the big issues. 10 The other issue is the cost of service, 11 the distribution service, that the MDS would save 12 thousands and probably tens of thousands of dollars 13 for mission responsibilities for each base, and this 14 would be very supportive for the bases in this 15 region to increase the mission, increase the 16 sustainability of the bases in this Northwest 17 Florida and to increase the population of troops in 18 that area, as well, which would help economically in 19 that region. 20 CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: Thank you, Major Thompson. 21 MAJOR THOMPSON: You're welcome. 22 CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: This one for me is 23 particularly challenging. I think that there is some 24 real benefit potentially in accepting the stipulation. 25

And I think I have some caution in me that I'm a bit concerned about, as some of my fellow Commissioners have expressed, with respect to having a completely articulated recommendation coming from staff and looking at the pros and cons of MDS in this particular case.

But I'm not sure if, with more time, if staff would get us to a different position with respect to the information that is there than we are today. And maybe staff can clarify that for me.

MR. WILLIS: Commissioner, with my discussions with my staff, you're aware of certain areas of the MDS methodology which we think there may be some flaws with. But within the record, there's nothing that I know of to resolve the flaws that we saw in that that we would outline in a recommendation, if that answers your question.

18 CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: So to be clear, even if we 19 were to get a fully vetted recommendation from staff, 20 there would be nothing new in the record and whatever 21 issues that exist today would still exist a few months 22 from now. So we would have to work through those 23 issues anyway, if we were to sort of backtrack into it.

24 **MR. WILLIS:** That is correct. The only 25 difference between what you have today and a

recommendation is you would be able to look at the recommendation and decide for yourselves whether those are material enough for you to say no to the MDS methodology. And that's a decision you have to make when you have got a fully vetted recommendation is whether or not that was something that was material enough for you to say no. If it wasn't, then you would go ahead and adopt the MDS methodology.

CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: Okay. So, therefore, it's 9 really -- the decision boils down to are you confident 10 in the information that you have before you right now 11 versus having a more synthesized set of information 12 presented before you? And then it becomes a decision 13 of whether you agree with the methodology or not for 14 this particular case. Would that accurately describe 15 the situation that we are in right now? 16

MR. WILLIS: I believe so. It comes down to whether or not you, as a Commissioner, all five of you have enough information in the record now to make that decision.

> CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: Thank you. All right. Commissioner Graham.

COMMISSIONER GRAHAM: Well, since we've heard from everybody, I think we can get it started. And I will make the motion to approve the stipulation in its

entirety as stated in front of us. 1 CHAIRMAN BRISE: Just to let the 2 Commissioners know, I will not make it a practice to 3 second. So if a second is required, somebody else will 4 have to second it. 5 Commissioner Edgar. 6 COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Mr. Chairman, all those 7 buttons up there --8 CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: I know. 9 (Laughter.) 10

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: I will second the 11 motion. You know, I understand and respect the caution 12 that some of my fellow Commissioners have expressed, 13 but I do believe for myself that with the past couple 14 of weeks that we have the additional time to meet with 15 our staff, to review the record, and I have gone back 16 over some, not all, some pieces of the transcript from 17 discussion and questions and answers from the parties 18 and from our staff. And from all of that information, 19 I am comfortable that we have had good information, 20 good discussion, that we understand the issue that is 21 before us. And so with that, Mr. Chairman, I will 22 second, which would have the effect of supporting that 23 we adopt the two stipulations that are before us. 24

COMMISSIONER BALBIS: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. And, thank you, Commissioners. And, you know, I just want to stay few things.

First all, I agree with a lot of the 6 comments that Commissioners Graham and Edgar have 7 made, and specifically that there is no perfect 8 methodology, and I recognize that and I agree with 9 that. And also, Commissioner Edgar, about the fact 10 that precedence does not always bind our hands, and 11 I think that this Commission specifically has gone 12 against precedence. But, again, for me personally, 13 I'm comfortable with doing that when I have enough 14 information to be comfortable that if we are going 15 against previous decisions that we have the same 16 amount of information that the previous Commission 17 did. 18

But just to follow up with, Mr. Chairman, the question you asked staff. One of the things that I would like to see in a full recommendation that would help me make a decision on this methodology is specifically, you know, what are the effects on each customer class. I mean, we have heard from industrial, we have heard from the

executive agencies and the military, but to Commissioner Graham's comments on economic development, you know, what is the effect on small commercial customers? Is that the bulk of the customers? And, you know, I know that the majority of jobs in this country are mom and pop small businesses. You know, what will the effect on those be? And if we are going to take into account economic development, I would like to be more comfortable with the full effect of this from that standpoint.

You know, so recommendations should include information on the effect on all customer classes. More technical issues. What is the effect of using average pole sizes versus the smallest pole size in determining the minimum distribution cost? I mean, that's the type of information that I would need in order to support a change.

And, again, I have not made a decision on the methodology. I always want to get a more accurate methodology, as Commissioner Graham said, I mean, however it plays out. If that is a more accurate way and increases here and lowers there, that's fine, and let's have the cost-causers pay more. But I need that information in the

1	recommendation in order to make that decision, so
2	with that I cannot support this motion.
3	CHAIRMAN BRISÉ: Thank you.
4	Commissioners, any further comments?
5	Okay. At this time we will
6	Commissioner Edgar.
7	COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
8	I'm still trying to get back used to buttons myself.
9	One of the reasons that, for my own
10	analysis, I was not convinced and remain unconvinced
11	that a more detailed written recommendation will
12	really provide us with more information than we
13	already have is because of the interrelatedness of
14	every issue. When we are looking at potential
15	cost-recovery, past, current, and future, and are
16	trying to set those correct and accurate revenue
17	numbers, every discreet issue impacts all of the
18	other issues when it comes down to the numbers. And
19	to try to synthesize that thought, there are, you
20	know, other issues, those that we will take on some
21	of the other hundred-plus issues that are part of
22	this case that will impact the cost impact of any
23	one decision or of any one issue. And other issues
24	and decisions that we will make when the rest of
25	this docket comes before us, I believe have a great

likelihood of mitigating any impact that this methodology would have on some of those other service consumer groups.

So when we try to parse out the individual impact and say a dollar amount, I think that that is somewhat of a hypothetical construct until we know and we make all of those other votes. And I know that this Commission and our staff will look very, very, very carefully and will scrub all of those numbers. And that probably there is a great likelihood that there will be an impact on some of the revenue requests that have been made. In other words, we will probably reduce or disallow many of the requests.

15 And with that in mind, again, I remain 16 unconvinced that a full -- you know, we had the 17 opportunity to ask for a written recommendation the 18 last time we were here, and we decided to bring it back before us without one. I think sometimes -- I 19 20 think, again, that each individual issue, to assign 21 a dollar value on that, not knowing the larger 22 picture, could perhaps be somewhat misleading. And I do believe that there is a great likelihood that 23 24 any impact might be mitigated.
