Subject: Change of NET metering rules for consumer solar installations

I had solar cells installed at the end of December, 2019. It took the utility six weeks to install the two way meter and connect my solar cells to the grid. With net metering, my estimate is that I will pay off my investment in 8 or 9 years and then start to make any "profit". As investments go, while conservative, there are plenty of more profitable investments that I could have made. The main reason I have made the investment was to reduce my carbon footprint and do a little bit to slow climate change. If there is any question as to if climate change is real and there are consequences, there have been two destructive hurricanes that seem to have brewed up over night, Laura and now Sally this year.

The advantage to the utilities is that I produce excess power during the middle of the day when the air conditioning load is the highest. During peak times, utilities end up running their less efficient peaking units and the costs can be much more expensive. They are getting my power with no investment on their part and at a relatively low cost. If the rules of net metering are changed in the future, turning a consumer investment in solar cells from nominal to poor, there will fewer installations of solar cells. Fine for the profits of the utilities, bad for me and society.
