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1	PROCEEDINGS
2	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Good evening. I would
3	like to welcome everyone to this customer hearing
4	this evening regarding Environmental Utilities'
5	application for a certificate to provide wastewater
6	service in Charlotte County.
7	This service hearing is a very important part
8	of the application process. And hearing from you,
9	the customers, tonight is a very important part of
10	what we consider in the evidence of this case.
11	My name is Gary Clark. I am going to be the
12	Presiding Officer for this evening. Joining me are
13	Commissioner La Rosa and Commissioner Passidomo
14	this evening. We are very interested in hearing
15	your comments regarding this proposed service.
16	I am going to go through a little bit of an
17	overview in a couple of minutes of how we are going
18	to conduct the proceedings tonight. But before we
19	do, we will knock out a few preliminaries.
20	I am going to ask staff, if they would, to
21	please read the notice.
22	MR. SANDY: Pursuant to notice, this time and
23	place has been set for a service hearing in Docket
24	No. 20200226, regarding the application for
25	original certification and rates to provide

1 wastewater service in Charlotte County by 2. Environmental Utilities, LLC. The purpose of this 3 hearing is set out more fully in the notice. 4 COMMISSIONER CLARK: All right. Thank you, 5 Mr. Sandy. 6 Let's take appearances at this time. 7 Environmental. Martin Friedman on behalf of 8 MR. FRIEDMAN: 9 Environmental Utilities. 10 COMMISSIONER CLARK: OPC. 11 MS. PIRRELLO: Anastacia Pirrello for the 12 Office of Public Counsel. 13 COMMISSIONER CLARK: Palm Island. 14 MR. KELSKY: Brad Kelsky on behalf of Palm 15 Island. 16 Ms. Cotherman. COMMISSIONER CLARK: 17 MS. COTHERMAN: Linda Cotherman, Pro Se. 18 COMMISSIONER CLARK: Staff. 19 MR. SANDY: This is Ryan Sandy, and with me 20 this evening is Ms. Jennifer Crawford. 21 And Mary Anne Helton is here as MS. HELTON: 22 your Advisor. 23 COMMISSIONER CLARK: All right. Did we get 24 everyone? 25

All right.

Staff, is there a preliminary

1 matter? 2. MS. CRAWFORD: Yes, sir, we have one 3 housekeeping matter. 4 Mr. Friedman has distributed to the parties 5 the notices, the affidavit of publication of the hearing notice and the affidavit of mailing the 6 7 hearing notice. And if we could go ahead and have 8 those, if Mr. Friedman doesn't mind me just taking 9 it and running with it, go ahead and have those 10 given identification numbers. 11 COMMISSIONER CLARK: All right. What was our 12 next number? 13 MS. CRAWFORD: 48. 14 COMMISSIONER CLARK: Say again. 15 MS. CRAWFORD: 48, and we can make that first 16 one the Affidavit of Publication, 48. 17 (Whereupon, Exhibit No. 48 was marked for 18 identification.) 19 COMMISSIONER CLARK: And the next one is 20 Affidavit of Mail Hearing Notice, 49. 21 MS. CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. 22 (Whereupon, Exhibit No. 49 was marked for 23 identification.) 24 COMMISSIONER CLARK: All right. Any of 25 objections? Seeing none, those are entered into

1	the record.
2	(Whereupon, Exhibit Nos. 48-49 were received
3	into evidence.)
4	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Any other preliminary
5	matters?
6	MS. CRAWFORD: No, sir.
7	COMMISSIONER CLARK: All right. Let me say
8	again thank you to each one of you for taking time
9	out of your schedules to be at this customer
10	service hearing this evening. We certainly
11	appreciate your interest, and we are very
12	interested in hearing directly from you, the
13	customers.
14	I know that some of you are preregistered to
15	speak. Some of you registered by phone, some of
16	you by mail in advance of today's hearing. You may
17	have also noticed that there is a speaker sign-up
18	form that's been provided by our staff when you
19	arrived.
20	If you preregistered by phone, you don't have
21	to sign up again. If you plan to speak today but
22	you have not preregistered by phone or email,
23	please be sure that you have signed up with our
24	staff.
25	This is an official public hearing and will be

transcribed. All the comments you make will be transcribed and will become part of the official record. As such, I will swear each of you in before you begin your testimony this evening.

I would also like to advise you that before you begin your testimony, that once you testify, you are subject to cross-examination by the parties. That is going to be at their discretion. You may be asked questions regarding your testimony by the parties this evening.

We appreciate the professional nature of these proceedings and ask that you do the same. Please be courteous to all parties and customers who are here today.

We understand that there is time of the essence this evening for those that are utilizing the ferry. So during the course of this service hearing, if another customer has said something that you were going to say, feel free to just say ditto, or that you support the remarks made by the previous speaker. There is no need to pile in a lot of redundant testimony on the same thing. If your comments are unique or specific to a certain area, that -- certainly we want to hear everyone that's here tonight, but we also want to be mindful

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1 of your time as well. 2. In addition to sharing your comments here, you 3 may also share your comments with us via mail or 4 email. To contact the PSC by mail, you can use one 5 of our pre-addressed comment cards that is on our website, or you may email it to our commission 6 7 clerk as well. All of that information is found on 8 our website as well. 9 Before we begin with opening statements by the 10 parties, I wanted to ask the Commissioners with me 11 today if they had any comments they would like to 12 make before we started. 13 Commissioner pass. 14 COMMISSIONER PASSIDOMO: Thank you, Mr. Chair. 15 I just want to make a quick comment, really 16 wanted to thank all the customers that came out 17 tonight, but I also want to just acknowledge, I 18 mean, we have received hundreds of comments from 19 customers that were unable to make it. And so for 20 those customers that got -- that wrote in, or are 21 listening in now, we take all of those comments the 22 same amount of weight, and so appreciate 23 participation in any way that you can. 24 So that's all I want to say. 25 COMMISSIONER CLARK: Great. Thank you.

1	Commissioner La Rosa.
2	COMMISSIONER LA ROSA: Thank you, Chairman.
3	And very similar comments is to thank
4	everyone, certainly, for coming, and those that are
5	going to be watching this, or watching a little
6	later today and, of course, participating tomorrow
7	morning, thank you guys for doing so.
8	Maybe, Chairman, maybe you just want to give
9	instructions on where to go. Are they speaking
10	from the podium over there?
11	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Yes. All of our folks
12	that are going to be speaking tonight will be
13	addressing us from this podium. I also will we
14	have three-minute time limit on each speaker. We
15	have a small number that have signed up to speak
16	tonight. If your comments are of substance, I am
17	not going to really, really enforce that. You
18	know, once you get to four to five minutes, I may
19	start waiving at you, beeping or blowing a horn or
20	something, but try to keep your comments in the
21	three-minute timeframe, and we will get through
22	everything accordingly.
23	With that said, we are going to begin with
24	opening statements. And each of the parties is
25	allowed three minutes to address the customers

1	prior to beginning tonight's comments. And we will
2	begin with EUC.
3	MR. FRIEDMAN: I waive opening comments.
4	COMMISSIONER CLARK: All right. Thank you
5	very much.
6	OPC.
7	MS. PIRRELLO: Thank you, Mr. Commissioner.
8	Good evening. My name is Anastacia Pirrello,
9	and I represent the Office of Public Counsel. We
10	are a State office independent of the Public
11	Service Commission, which is tasked with
12	representing the public interest on behalf of all
13	the customers of utilities in these types of cases.
14	Our goal is to ensure that in the process of
15	the Public Service Commission considering whether
16	to grant the certificate to Environmental
17	Utilities, any rates and charges to be imposed are
18	accurately reflected by the company, and include
19	only those costs that are shown to be necessary and
20	prudent for this type of wastewater collection
21	system.
22	We are here today to hear your thoughts and
23	concerns about Environmental Utilities' proposal to
24	install sewer lines, and the costs associated with
25	that proposal. If you have questions following

1	these hearings, you may contact our office toll
2	free at 1-800-342-0222. And if you would, please
3	let us know if you intended to watch the hearing
4	this morning via the live stream and were unable to
5	do so.
6	Thank you.
7	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you, Ms. Pirrello.
8	Palm Island.
9	MR. KELSKY: No comments.
10	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Ms. Cotherman.
11	MS. COTHERMAN: No comment.
12	COMMISSIONER CLARK: All right. Ms. Pirrello
13	is going to call your name when it is your turn to
14	speak, and she's going to do so in the order that
15	you signed up. She's going to call three names at
16	a time so that you will have kind of know who is
17	going to be next in line.
18	You have got the list, Ms. Pirrello, and ready
19	to go? Okay.
20	I am going to swear all of you in right now.
21	So if you are here signed up and plan to give
22	testimony tonight, if you would, please stand and
23	raise your right hand.
24	(Whereupon, speakers were sworn in by
25	Commissioner Clark.)

1	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Consider yourself sworn
2	in. You may be seated.
3	When you come to the microphone, please state
4	your name and address. Remember your verbal
5	comments are being transcribed as part of the
6	official record.
7	Ms. Pirrello, will you begin by calling the
8	names on your list?
9	MS. PIRRELLO: The first three customers to
10	testify will be Candyce Cohen, James Bagley and
11	Hannah Stubbs.
12	PUBLIC COMMENT
13	MS. COHEN: It's always fun being first.
14	Hello, Commissioners. Thank you for the
15	opportunity to speak. I am full-time Don Pedro
16	Island resident Candyce Cohen.
17	The EU proposal falls far short, in my view,
18	of the PSC's focus to ensure our services are
19	delivered in a safe, reasonable and reliable
20	manner. I am requesting their application be
21	denied.
22	I will focus my remarks on one fact. Sewage
23	happens, and it all flows downhill into our very
24	special Lemon Bay. Charlotte County has a third of
25	the population density of the counties to our north

1	and south. Our islands do not support highrise,
2	multi-family nor commercial developments. Our
3	delicate environment is at much greater risk of
4	pollution from centralized sewage spills, like the
5	\$50,000 or 50,000 gallons spilled three weeks
6	ago just off island than any low density tank
7	issues.
8	This was not a single nor uncommon event. A
9	few days later, there was 100,000-gallon spill in
10	the county, and last March, a million-gallon spill.
11	DEP pollution notices show more than 120 spills in
12	Charlotte County alone, totaling nearly 6.6 million
13	gallons since 2019.
14	The counties north and south acknowledge
15	sewage spills happen, and have focused on
16	protecting sensitive estuaries by implementing
17	advanced wastewater treatment to reduce excess
18	nitrogen and nutrients in reclaimed water.
19	Charlotte County Utilities should prioritize
20	upgrading to these AWT standards removing the red
21	tide fueling nutrient from wastewater before
22	dismantling low density tanks.
23	Another fact of life is power outages happen.
24	Often unpredictably during hurricane season, but
25	even one 19-hour outage across much of the island

	1	just weeks ago. The low pressure solution proposed
	2	by EU invites disaster on an island without power.
	3	I don't believe EU have adequate resources to
	4	pump non-powered tanks, and I don't find it
	5	environmentally sound on our island to follow one
	6	county's advice to, and I quote, pump the top on
	7	the cleanout and let the sewage flow into the yard
	8	so it doesn't back up into your house.
	9	More thought is needed in providing safe,
	10	reliable and an environmentally sound solution.
	11	Central sewer provided not by a qualified municipal
	12	utility, but rather an inexperienced private
	13	for-profit entity is not reasonable,
	14	environmentally or economically. The nature of a
	15	limited liability corporation providing this
	16	service provides no recourse to the public or the
	17	county for any costly mistakes, and does not meet
	18	basic criteria for clean water grants or other
	19	financing alternatives. EU offers neither a safe,
	20	reasonable nor reliable solution for our community.
	21	Thank you for your attention.
	22	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you very much.
	23	Questions from the parties?
	24	Mr. Friedman.
	25	MR. FRIEDMAN: Ms. Cohen, so by those last
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1	comments, if the central sewer system was run by
2	the County, you would find it more acceptable?
3	MS. COHEN: More acceptable, yes.
4	MR. FRIEDMAN: Thank you. That's all I have.
5	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Any of the other parties?
6	Ms okay.
7	Call your next witness.
8	MS. PIRRELLO: Next is James Bagley, and then
9	Hannah Stubbs and David Stubbs.
10	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Would you call it again?
11	MS. PIRRELLO: Is James Bagley present?
12	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Mr. Bagley. James
13	Bagley.
14	Okay. Next witness.
15	MS. PIRRELLO: Hannah Stubbs.
16	UNIDENDIFIED SPEAKER: Hannah Stubbs is not
17	present.
18	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Ms. Stubbs is not
19	present.
20	UNIDENDIFIED SPEAKER: Hannah Stubbs is not
21	present.
22	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Okay. Next is?
23	MS. PIRRELLO: David Stubbs.
24	COMMISSIONER CLARK: David Stubbs, okay, Mr.
25	Stubbs.
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MR. STUBBS: Good evening. Thank you for the opportunity. It's nice to go second after a well thought out plan, you would notice I don't have notes here, but there is one thing, and again, David Stubbs, 352 South Gulf, I have only been on the island for a year, but a fan of a septic system for quite a long time. Not only does it work well, it doesn't rely on an infrastructure that may be struggling, and the notes that was said, if you easily Google Charlotte County raw sewage, you get a host of information, and one of those was a million gallons.

And I kind of -- I don't want to talk about football, but since it's Super Bowl week, I might do so.

If you were lucky enough to get 50-yard line seats and you were sitting there, maybe row 20, and looking out across the field starting at the 10-yard line on either side right and left, if those were tanks, 10,000 gallon tanks, completely full of raw sewage, that would be a million gallons in the entire field. And if that is released, that's quite a lot of raw sewage being dumped on an elevation of three to four feet above high water

level.

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2. I am not here to debate the fact that 3 Charlotte County does have an infrastructure 4 problem. It's quite obvious that that has been 5 publicized. Being a public official for quite a while, I do realize that one-third of everything 6 7 you read is correct, so I can't rely on that 8 because I wasn't standing in the field when the one 9 million was spilled, but I do remember the one near 10 us near the Post Office that was, and it did quite 11 disruption.

I do concur with the comments about all the statements from the first speaker, so I don't need to go into that. But I do believe that as a public servant that I really value the fact that you are going to take this to heart, and there was no meetings prior to that says, you know what, there is a bigger entity and a bigger involvement, something going on causing us to have strain because, as a public official, it was my duty to do the best for the community and to make sure that their voice is heard. And it was my opportunity to do due diligence with the funding that I had available to me.

1	millionaires. This is my life dream to get to this
2	island, and I made it. And a lot of these people
3	that are probably in the crowd that will speak next
4	to me are on fixed income. And a lot of these
5	systems are requiring a lot of pain and effort and
6	maintenance, and I know a lot of people in my
7	neighborhood have a hard time getting the VCR to
8	work.
9	I thank you for your time. I value your
10	strength in making the right decisions. Thank you.
11	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you very much, sir.
12	Any questions from any of the parties?
13	All right. Seeing none, next witness.
14	MS. PIRRELLO: Next up is Karyn Flatau, and
15	followed by Craig Baresel and William Lee Roberts.
16	PUBLIC COMMENT
17	MS. FLATAU: Good evening Commissioners. My
18	name is Karyn Flatau, and I live at 9148 Grand
19	Avenue on Little Gasparilla Island.
20	The other speakers, I am ditto with him.
21	We've given up everything to live out on the
22	islands, but they are on the northern end, we are
23	on the southern end. Little Gasparilla Island is
24	almost a different world compared to up there.
25	But my main concern, I am in support of the
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	1	septic. We built our home, we have been on the
	2	island since '87, decided to retire there and build
	3	a home. And we had to put in a ATU, the aerator
	4	system. And since then okay, we have lived
	5	there 12 years. According to well, I will
	6	start. Okay, we've had it pumped out four times.
	7	We have to pay \$820 every two years to have it
	8	inspected. The County has only been out three
	9	times to inspect our system. We pay the County for
	10	the permit, and they are supposed to come out every
	11	six months. They do not.
	12	We have been under water for about four times
	13	now from storms, like, two weeks at a time, under
	14	water, deep water. My septic system then backs up
	15	and drains out into our yard. So you have this
	16	muck. And a lot of the island has the same
	17	problem.
	18	When we signed our original permit, they told
	19	us that if we had the opportunity to connect to
	20	septic, we would be connecting to it just like we
	21	anticipated hooking up to water, and we did well
	22	with the water.
	23	Let's see. Right now my septic needs to be
	24	pumped out. Little Gasparilla Island, we have a
	25	different barge system than the northern end. So

1	when we have them come up come to pump us out,
2	it's, like, \$2,000 to have our tanks pumped out.
3	So we've had it pumped out four times, and right
4	now it needs to be pumped out again. My compressor
5	went out on it. I mean, the problems that I have
6	had with that.
7	Now, they passed a bill, House Bill 375, that
8	says if and I have to have a service contractor.
9	You guys probably know this by law. If my
10	service contractor decides that he doesn't want to
11	come out to the island anymore, what do I need to
12	do? I have to get one of those maintenance entity
13	service permits where I go and get trained to take
14	care of my septic myself. I am in my 60s, my
15	husband is in his 60s. That's the last thing we
16	want to do. So that's a different entity. Four
17	houses are being built around me, all have to put
18	in the ATUs.
19	So I am really in support of the septic. We
20	have a lot of rental homes, a lot more people. The
21	island is growing, and we really have a need for
22	septic. And I thank you for the opportunity to
23	speak.
24	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you very much.
25	Let me ask one before you step down, let me

1	ask one clarifying question. You said you were in
2	favor of the septic, do you mean the center
3	agricultural or
4	MS. FLATAU: The wastewater.
5	COMMISSIONER CLARK: I just wanted to clarify
6	that.
7	MS. FLATAU: Yeah, we need to connect up. I
8	mean, it's yeah.
9	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Okay. I just wanted to
10	clarify that. Thank you.
11	MS. FLATAU: Thank you.
12	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Questions?
13	Commissioners?
14	All right. Next witness.
15	MS. PIRRELLO: After Mr. Baresel will be
16	William Lee Roberts and Brian Goodhead.
17	COMMISSIONER CLARK: You are recognized, Mr.
18	Baresel.
19	PUBLIC COMMENT
20	MR. BARESEL: Craig Baresel. I live at 50
21	Tarpon Way. I am on the northern part of the
22	island, and I am a director of the homeowners'
23	association.
24	And in January of 2021, when we first heard
25	that this was going to be proposed, at our January

1 meeting, we had about 50 people, and I have been 2. told 48, 49 and a couple proxies, okay. But 50 3 people show up approximately, and we voted at that 4 meeting what to do as far as hiring attorneys, and 5 things like that. Three people were opposed to Everybody else that showed up at the 6 fighting it. 7 meeting, and that's a large crowd on our barrier 8 island on the northern part.

Another comment that kind of goes along with that, I am an old believer in money talks. And as an example, our homeowners dues, I think you heard earlier today, was low, but you didn't hear the number. It's 50 bucks a year. A year for our HOH PIE. Yet -- so it's not expensive if you want to join. The donations to fight this since PIE sent out a letter and said, can you please donate to fight, and I say fight, but hire and pay for attorneys, has raised over \$70,000. And again, out of a very small group of people.

Finally, my last comment is the professor that talked earlier today, I thought he was extremely interesting and made some excellent points why the barrier island is different than other areas around Charlotte Harbor, and things like that.

And one of the examples he gave -- and, Mr.

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1	Clark, you, I believe, asked a question about the
2	dynamics of the island, because there is four or
3	five names, was it all connected. And the answer
4	was, well, you can walk along the beach from one
5	end to the other.
6	But a number of years ago, and I don't know
7	the exact timeframe, one of the older residents
8	here may, but I have been there five years. I am a
9	full-time resident. But at one point in time,
10	there was a water divide on that island. It has
11	since, the beach has come up to it, and it might
12	be, I don't know, 40, 50 yards of beach, but other
13	than that, there is a canal then that goes all the
14	way over to the intercoastal waterway.
15	So if that would happen again, the professor
16	made the points about exposed sewer pipes causing
17	much more damage. And I just thought that was an
18	excellent comment.
19	So I am against this particular proposal. And
20	I appreciate your listening. And I would I
21	just, if I could, a full-time I say full-time.
22	Residents on the island, if I could have them if
23	they are against it to raise their hand, because a
24	number of them aren't signing up to speak.
25	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Sure.

1	MR. BARESEL: You also, I know, got the
2	letters, and there is hundreds of them, and 80, 90
3	percent were against, if I do the rough math.
4	Thank you very much.
5	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you, sir. One
6	moment before you sit down.
7	Any questions?
8	I am going to ask that in general, guys, I am
9	not going to call the list, if the Commissioners or
10	any of the parties, when I ask for questions, just
11	yell at me and let me know.
12	Thank you, sir.
13	Next person.
14	MS. PIRRELLO: After Mr. Roberts will be Brian
15	Goodhead, Tom Reinke and Joseph Kroslak.
16	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Mr. Roberts, you are
17	recognized.
18	PUBLIC COMMENT
19	MR. ROBERTS: Thank you very much. And thank
20	you for the opportunity to speak.
21	My name is Lee Roberts. I own a home at 8302
22	Little Gasparilla Island. I rise to speak this
23	evening in opposition to Environmental Utilities,
24	Inc.'s, request for providing sewer services on the
25	island. There are multiple issues that I wish to

express with regard to this proposal.

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First, you have asked is there a need for the service. My answer would be no. My property, we have owned our property since 1985, and have a working septic tank that is professionally drained every five to seven years, and we have had no difficulties. We also do not rent our home. It is a family home, which probably adds to us not having problems.

Thus, much like the question asked a number of years ago, is there a need for water service. That standard answer is still no. Some of you may not be aware of the debacle I speak of, but Mr. Mr. Boyer and Gasparilla Water, with the assistance of County Commissioner Treux, changed local planning documents restricting build-up on barrier islands to greenlight Mr. Boyer to taking on all water service on the island.

Now Commissioner Treux and the County

Commissioners have taken a hands-off approach with regards to sewage, washing their hands of the whole affair and pitching it back to the Public Service Commission.

To the question does this utility have the ability and experience to provide the service? Not

that I know of in Mr. Boyer's past history. He, nonetheless, has no experience with development or installation of a massive sewer system such as this.

I would hope this committee carefully filters out some of the subterfuge arguments that hold no merit in this argument that are out there right now and flying on-line. One of those major ones looked at a university study in Florida, on the east coast of Florida, particularly in the Indian River Basin. One of Mr. Boyer's ardent supporters who lives, by the way, in the condos on the south end, is not even affected by this, is out there ardently arguing we need a sewer system on the island.

I am sorry, but to that point, that particular study in the Indian River Basin was accounted for by 1.5 million people in that basin, and in Charlotte Harbor, it's approximately 3,100 people, and this is per the 2010 census in looking at that.

So as we look at Mr. Boyer's recommendations, particularly in the application for the original certificate of authorization for proposed existing system on page 31, there is luring issues for me about the practice for Mr. Boyer.

There are two lines proposed, one in front of

2.

my house, which is a legal easement, and one behind
my house, which is private property with no
easement.

I don't believe that Environmental Utilities will be given the ability to claim, quote, eminent domain as they place lines where they want. For example, the owner of that property already sued a homeowner on my street for merely trimming her tree overhanging his house. She went to court and won a new tree, and I believe a \$6,000 fine paid to her. Suffice it to say, you may probably not go through her property.

This issue points out the most glaring issue with Mr. Boyer. I document separately watching him do things that I feel are inappropriate. He has —this plan does not have criteria in place to make this system work, much less being legal, in quote, taking land as needed in the installation process.

And finally let us address the issue of fairness and proposed changes. Several years ago I argued against the PSC's decision to give Gasparilla Water, particularly this, the highest rate of the State of Florida. The highest at the time was Useppa Island 35.24 for a base rate, Gasparilla Water is 79.75 for a base rate.

Last week we received a letter from Gasparilla
Water that they were required by the PSC to give
back, four years later, part of the increase, 16
cents. That's a slap in the face. That's a
disastrous decision that's the responsibility of
the Public Service Commission.

Now we on the island are preparing for the advent of Mr. Boyer's proposal. I would first and foremost like to ask just outright reject his proposal. The fees he is proposing are outrageous. His homeowners' association hookup fees will be between 13,000 and 30,000, with the expectation it's to be paid up front by the homeowner. This is an astronomical figure, but this ridiculous startup cost is only more exorbitant when you look at the long-term cost.

I have reviewed all utility rates in the state of Florida on the Public Service Commission's website. The proposed base rate for EU sewer is \$112.78 a month. And, again, that's if the system is unused. The closest comparable rate in the entire state is Pine Ridge Management, which is 42.89. The average monthly bill for a homeowner with water and sewer will be \$192.37 if this proposal is approved.

1	COMMISSIONER CLARK: If you would, wrap your
2	comments up, please, sir.
3	MR. ROBERTS: I will wrap up. Thank you.
4	How can this be fair and equitable? It simply
5	cannot. For me, comes back to a lack of oversight.
6	I worked in construction for a number of years with
7	my dad. There is no way we have a bond overseeing
8	this. Any mistakes that's made, he walks away from
9	this problem, we have no background we have no
10	backdrop to pick up on what is going on.
11	Thank you for your time.
12	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you.
13	Questions?
14	All right. No questions, call you recall next
15	speaker, please.
16	MS. PIRRELLO: After Mr. Goodhead will be Tom
17	Reinke, Joseph Kroslak and Roy Petteway.
18	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Mr. Goodhead, you are
19	recognized.
20	PUBLIC COMMENT
21	MR. GOODHEAD: Thank you.
22	First of all, I just wanted to say thank you
23	for letting me speak today, and thank you all for
24	your public service, and God bless you all for
25	having to put up with all of this stuff.

1	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you.
2	MR. GOODHEAD: So I have a list I want to go
3	through to kind of reiterate what the attorneys
4	and I was in some of the hearing today and I
5	just want to kind of touch on some of those points
6	again, so I want to kind of go in order of
7	importance.
8	So the first thing we are going to talk about
9	is the need, right, and I didn't hear anybody talk
10	about what the need is. So the applicant is saying
11	that him and his family grew up on this island, and
12	the reason they are doing this to is to protect the
13	environment, right? So what is the problem here?
14	So there must be a problem, that's why he is making
15	this proposal.
16	So what we heard in testimony today he has not
17	collected one single water sample around this area.
18	He has piggybacked on some of the stuff the County
19	has done already, but those were test results that
20	came out of Charlotte Harbor. How many miles away
21	is that from Don Pedro?
22	So again, where is the need, right?
23	Specifically a need has to have a problem to be
24	solved, and so where is the problem here? There is
25	none. The rest of this talk about financing, et

1	cetera, is all irrelevant if we don't have a need.
2	So why else is this what is the impetus for the
3	creation of this project?
4	And I mean, you guys can come to your own
5	conclusions about money and other things, if we are
6	really not talking about protecting water quality,
7	because we have no evidence that that was ever
8	done. So that's our main thing on the meed.
9	Again, we could come to speculation about why this
10	project is being proposed.
11	The second thing I want to talk about too is a
12	big concern on my mind too, and we haven't talked
13	about this at all. This is about the criminal
14	background for the applicant. And, you know, how
15	that, I guess, got through
16	MR. FRIEDMAN: I object to this line of
17	questions.
18	MR. GOODHEAD: It's been stated as record.
19	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Let's stay away from the
20	character of the individuals involved, if you don't
21	mind. Talk about the subject and your experience
22	and what you know.
23	MR. GOODHEAD: Well, I think it has a bearing
24	on what we are talking about here, right, the
25	history. Anyways

1 MR. FRIEDMAN: He is going to talk about an 2. incident that happened 25 years ago. 3 MR. GOODHEAD: Do I not talk about that? 4 COMMISSIONER CLARK: No. Let's move on. 5 MR. GOODHEAD: So given that we really Okay. 6 don't have a reason, and we can just surmise why we 7 are really here and what we are talking about, 8 right, to me, this is just somebody piggybacked on 9 some of the work the County has done already and 10 put fluff around it, and said, okay, let's go with 11 this. Again, we have no numbers, no costs, right? 12 And the water samples, those are basically useless 13 because they don't come from around Don Pedro 14 Island or Little Gasparilla Island. So it would come down to the technical 15 16 estimate fees, we don't have any of that either. 17 So, I mean, if I answered in testimony today what 18 are the numbers? What is this? What is that? Ι 19 don't know. I am not sure. This is the guy who is 20 supposed to be in charge, and we are going to give 21 him a project like this, and a system to own, 22 operate and manage, and we have no answers. 23 Sure, if I had a buddy at a bank, and he said, 24 oh, no problem, I will give you the money. 25 I went into the bank and didn't know anybody and

1	said, I don't know, I don't know, to all those
2	questions, they would laugh me out of the front
3	doors, right? They are not going to give me any
4	money.
5	So, again, how do we justify any substantial,
6	you know, merit to this whole project? That's what
7	I would like to know. So we are all waiting
8	closely and listening to you guys. So hopefully,
9	you know, you are constituents, we do thank you for
10	your service, but there is going to be a lot of
11	weight put on these decisions here, again, for us
12	making our own decisions when it becomes voting
13	time about, you know, about this is going to give
14	testimony to the character and/or the motives of
15	the decision-makers in this account here, so
16	COMMISSIONER CLARK: All right. Thank you
17	MR. GOODHEAD: Thank you very much.
18	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you.
19	Any questions?
20	All right. Call your next witness.
21	(Applause from the audience.)
22	MS. PIRRELLO: After Mr. Reinke will be Joseph
23	Kroslak, Roy Petteway and Nick Zakov.
24	PUBLIC COMMENT
25	MR. REINKE: Good evening, Commissioners.
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1	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Mr. Reinke, you are
2	recognized.
3	MR. REINKE: My name is Thomas Reinke, and I
4	am a resident of Don Pedro. And I have to say what
5	I have observed today from this morning's meeting
6	leaves me in total almost denial that this is even
7	taking place, because as I understand it, what the
8	PSC's objective is is to obtain evidence supporting
9	four criteria that must be met, any one of which in
10	its failure to thrive would end the whole process.
11	And from this morning's review of the
12	testimony, the number one primary feature was the
13	need for the service. And if you will recall from
14	this morning, any number of times the evidence was
15	totally lacking. So on the basis of that alone
16	there is no reason to go forward. The whole thing
17	should be knocked out.
18	Beyond that, if you have to find some way to
19	make that worthy, well, then how about the
20	financial capability of the applicant? What
21	what that, to me, was totally lacking as well.
22	It was very nebulous as to how that kind of funding
23	was going to be achieved.
24	And then there is the technical expertise for
25	running a system like this. From what I personally

1	know as having been a resident of Don Pedro for 20
2	years, in talking with people from Little
3	Gasparilla about their water system, which was run
4	by Mr. Boyer, it was almost universal
5	dissatisfaction. So how can we expect any change
6	in his ability to provide for us when he can't even
7	provide for a water system properly?
8	And then the last thing is the fair and
9	equitable rate structure that he proposes. My wife
10	and I have properties in Alabama on a coastal
11	barrier island called Dauphin Island. We have a
12	sewer system. It works very, very well. The rates
13	are really ideal. They put this proposal to shame.
14	And in addition, we have property in the UP of
15	Michigan for another low pressure grinder system.
16	The price for our systems up there are all, again,
17	very acceptable. Really cheap. And they had to be
18	they had to be bored with directional boring
19	through rock, not sand. The easiest, most
20	opportune place to dig is in and, of course.
21	We could get a proper system in sand at no
22	digging up of pavement, just dig a hole, put in a
23	sewer and go for it. We didn't hear any
24	opportunity to do that kind of a system. I think
25	it should have been provided.

1	I think that's about all I can offer, but it
2	just seems to me that you can't get past the need
3	for it. There is no need. There is no need for
4	any of this.
5	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you very much for
6	your testimony.
7	Do we have questions?
8	MR. FRIEDMAN: I do.
9	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Mr. Friedman.
10	MR. FRIEDMAN: Sir, you said you own property
11	in Dauphin Island off of Alabama?
12	MR. REINKE: Yes.
13	MR. FRIEDMAN: And you said it's on a central
14	sewer?
15	MR. REINKE: What's that?
16	MR. FRIEDMAN: Did you say it was on a central
17	sewer?
18	MR. REINKE: It is.
19	MR. FRIEDMAN: And it's owned by the
20	government?
21	MR. REINKE: Well, it's the City.
22	MR. FRIEDMAN: Okay. And then you own one
23	somewhere else as well, on an island somewhere
24	else?
25	MR. REINKE: We have property up in the UP of

1	Michigan that has a sewer that was done through
2	directional boring.
3	MR. FRIEDMAN: But it's on an island?
4	MR. REINKE: It's what?
5	UNIDENDIFIED SPEAKER: On a peninsula.
6	MR. FRIEDMAN: Okay. And it's central sewer
7	as well?
8	MR. REINKE: Yes.
9	UNIDENDIFIED SPEAKER: Yes.
10	MR. FRIEDMAN: Okay.
11	MR. REINKE: And also we had familiarity with
12	a system in Indiana on an inland lake, where they
13	had to do a perimeter system, very much similar
14	with this. And they had there, they had to dig
15	up a paved road in partial, but they did it, and
16	the cost, it was a grinder system. A huge tank was
17	taken and buried in the front yard, and then a
18	lateral out to the street, no problem.
19	MR. FRIEDMAN: Okay. So am I correct that you
20	would not be opposed to this project if it were
21	being done by the County and the rates were not so
22	high?
23	MR. REINKE: No, I may not be. But I surely
24	I they made it made it there the
25	development in Indiana I was familiar with. The

1	development on Dauphin Island and in the UP I
2	wasn't familiar with how it developed. But I, what
3	I do know is that when the grinder pump locks up,
4	for lack of I mean, there we have to have it
5	heaters in there to keep it from freezing, but it's
6	all taken care of.
7	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Any other questions?
8	All right. Thank you very much for your
9	testimony this evening.
10	MR. REINKE: Thank you.
11	MS. PIRRELLO: After Mr. Kroslak, we have Roy
12	Petteway, Nick Zakov and David Cohen.
13	COMMISSIONER CLARK: All right. Mr. Kroslak,
14	you are recognized.
15	PUBLIC COMMENT
16	MR. KROSLAK: Yes. Good evening,
17	Commissioners. My name is Joe Kroslak. I am here
18	to represent my family.
19	We live on we have a house, small house on
20	Little Gasparilla Island Rum Runner Road, 9424. We
21	are new residents there. God blessed us to give us
22	and build our dream. It was a dream for a while,
23	and we were able recently to acquire a home.
24	There is a lot of uncertainty in this
25	proposal, and I am here to announce our objection

of it. A lot of fears of the uncertain, you know,
the cost of this project and all to the homeowners
who are going to be forced to buy a product that we
don't want or need at a price that we don't know,
or can't even afford. And so that's our objection,
our concerns.

There is other concerns regarding the maintenance of these systems, of the upkeep that we are going to be responsible for. Just a lot of concerns as new homeowners. And also our easements, we already have a front road easement. We have a water easement. We have an electrical easement. Now there is going to be another one. Our properties are being chopped up. They are small already as they are.

So these are our concerns, and I just bring this before you as the weight of this decision rests on your shoulders. I just ask for your compassion, your consideration of this matter, the understanding of it. And, please, don't bring this on us. I just ask for your mercy and compassion on it.

And thank you for the opportunity and your consideration, and God bless you.

25 COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you very much.

1	Anybody have any questions?
2	All right. Next.
3	MS. PIRRELLO: After Mr. Petteway is Nick
4	Zakov, David Cohen and Jane Kebe.
5	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Mr. Petteway.
6	PUBLIC COMMENT
7	MR. PETTEWAY: Good evening. My name is Roy
8	Petteway, and my wife and I have owned a home on
9	Little Gasparilla Island since 1983. We are at
10	9744 Little Gasparilla Island.
11	I am here tonight to ask you to deny the
12	request to install sewer on Little Gasparilla
13	Island by Environmental Utilities. Little
14	Gasparilla Island is a very unique island. There
15	may be few others like it in the state. We have no
16	bridge to our island. There is only a barge
17	service, and it runs when the owner decides to run
18	it. We have no roads, only sand paths which do not
19	run the length and the width of the island
20	completely. Some paths run for a while, then go
21	across private property with the owner's consent,
22	and sometimes not. There are no cars on the
23	island, except for a couple of vehicles contractors
24	use. We are not a subdivision or a neighborhood on
25	the mainland.

We have native plants that have been here for generations. There are gopher tortoise nests, bald eagles nesting, ospreys, bobcats and many other native Florida wildlife on the island who would be disturbed by the installation of sewer lines.

The type of sewer system proposed is a grinder tank system. This system is a low cost to install but high cost to maintain for the residents. The power on the island is sketchy at best. When the power goes off, which is frequent, it may stay off for an hour or 12 hours or more. You just never know.

To keep the raw sewage from filling in the tank and backing up into our homes, we will have to have a generator run the pump for the grinder tank to keep it going. I can only imagine the sound of 400 generators running to keep sewage flowing on our island.

I don't know if any of you have ever been to our island, but I would invite you to take a tour of our island with me. You can see for yourself the barriers that are present to install a sewer system on a bridgeless barrier island. I would be glad to meet you and drive you around the island on my golf cart to let you see for yourself.

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1	I respectfully request you deny the petition
2	of Environmental Utilities, a company that I
3	understand has no experience in wastewater service
4	to install a sewer system on Little Gasparilla
5	Island. Thank you.
6	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you very much.
7	Any of questions?
8	No questions.
9	Next speaker.
10	MS. PIRRELLO: The next three following this
11	speaker will be David Cohen, Jane Kebe and Andrea
12	Illiano.
13	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Mr. Zakov.
14	PUBLIC COMMENT
15	DR. ZAKOV: My name is Dr. Nicholas Zakov. I
16	am a retired eye surgeon, biology major and a
17	rational environmentalist. I have had a
18	relationship with Palm Island for 40 years. My
19	neighbors right there have been with me 40 years
20	and more.
21	Basically somebody else made the statement
22	that this is a solution without a problem. That's
23	my concluding statement. And I respectfully thank
24	you for considering this very seriously and giving
25	it all the thought that you can. I normally speak

at medical meetings, although I just retired and I

am enjoying Palm Island.

The current system is working well. I was surprised somebody mentioned it is not working.

The Department of Health inspects the system. We get permits, Martin Septic happens to be my private provider. A few months ago, they found that my aerator system wasn't working, and the tank was somewhat squished because it's a 12 -- 11-, 12-year old system. I just finished installing a new system. It cost me \$13,000 for the system, plus 2,500 to 3,000, I lost track, bringing the -- emptying it, of course, and bringing big equipment to dig it up and put it up, so this was the ferry fees.

So I am totally, totally not understanding, except this being a money making proposition, which it is, it is not -- it's not a County function or something else -- the hookup costs on top of this \$20,000, or whatever I just paid, and it works, but there is a lot of new homes that spend the same amount of money and now we are going to be asked to spend 10 to 20 or more thousand dollars to hook up to the new system. There is then the bill proposes exorbitant. Most people on our island are either

completely retired or snowbirds that don't have extra income. They are relying on their current income.

Additional electric equipment will be needed to maintain our systems. There will be need for some tree removals, easement. There is no pay over time plan, which I think is ridiculous, and a mandatory hookup. We are a little bit sick, I think, at this day and age with masks, mandatory masks and mandatory issues, and hopefully they should be also considered.

There is no grandfathering of my brand new septic system that I just spent \$13,000. There is no contract and no single point of general oversight. There is disruption of traffic. is, our ferry system in the morning, when people leave the island to go to work, kids go to school between three and four, five o'clock within people come back, people from the resorts that leave the island, it's already stressed. And with having people there for months and months and years maybe creating this system, it will be a total disaster on the ferry system. There is no provision, really system maintenance emergencies. And what's the lifespan of the equipment?

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1	Environmental concerns. I just got this beach
2	nesting season is here from Sarasota County, okay.
3	We have people monitoring turtle nests, volunteers.
4	I am an environmentalist. Zoning will be changed.
5	Can you imagine a McDonald's or Motel 6 or Motel 8
6	there abiding by this light situations, and you
7	will have a humungous additional septic system on
8	the coast.
9	Potential sewer spill on the beach
10	intercoastal is a definite possibility, and
11	respectfully ask you to very seriously consider
12	this and deny this proposal.
13	Thank you.
14	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you very much.
15	Any of questions? Mr. Friedman.
16	MR. FRIEDMAN: Yes, sir.
17	Isn't it true that when you got your permit to
18	construct your sewer your septic tank, that it
19	included a notification for you that when central
20	sewer was available, you were going to have to
21	connect.
22	DR. ZAKOV: I am not aware of that. No.
23	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Any other questions?
24	All right. Thank you, sir.
25	DR. ZAKOV: Thank you.

1	MS. PIRRELLO: Following Mr. Cohen we will
2	have Jane Kebe, Andrea Illiano and Gerry Illiano.
3	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Mr. Cohen, you are
4	recognized.
5	PUBLIC COMMENT
6	MR. COHEN: Thank you.
7	My name is David Cohen, and I am a full-time
8	resident of Don Pedro Island at 8 Pointe Way. This
9	unsolicited bid by an LLC with both a demonstrable
10	lack of actual experience of the proposed system at
11	this scale, and a vague financial capability.
12	There is no actual study proving the need for
13	servicing on these islands. However, there are
14	many studies by the governmental agencies
15	previously mentioned showing that the biggest
16	danger that we have for sewage runoff and spills
17	comes from central sewer waste.
18	The estimated cost has been touched upon, but
19	I am going to put a personal note on this. I am
20	estimating a personal cost of approximately \$400 a
21	month for sewage alone, as I have seen no planned
22	allowance for landscape watering. What else has
23	not been planned as part of this application? No
24	plan to assist in proposed hookup fees and other
25	required improvements. No plan to take into

consideration the condition of new or properly
maintained septic systems, and no plan for
compensation of easements not currently in place.

There is more. There is no plan to cover costs dealing with endangered species relocation. No environmental study has been done to determine the construction impact the proposed project would have on these fragile barrier islands, which is home to, or on the migratory route of many endangered species, land, sea and air beasts.

One of the scariest pieces to a project of this magnitude that's missing is there is no provision for overall project oversight. No planning stated quantifiable project goals or quality standards that have to be met. Each of the several agencies involved oversees only their specific parts of the project and only through their particular lens.

Professionally, I have been in charge of quality assurance processes for more decades than I care to remember. The difference between small highly specific oversight and oversight by a person or agency with a combination of deep experience and operational integration knowledge is the only way to prevent completely otherwise unforeseen

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1	disasters.
2	What else? No plan to deal with ongoing
3	maintenance in emergency situations. This has been
4	touched upon by other people, but a slight twist
5	here is if there is a prolonged power outage, you
6	are looking at up to, if this is completely filled
7	out, 600 people on a bridgeless barrier island
8	struggling to find fuel to maintain these islands.
9	As I am sure you are very well aware, anywhere
10	in the state of Florida, after a hurricane hits,
11	not only is electricity out, but fuel shortages
12	come and go. We are already struggling to be able
13	to provide for lights, refrigeration and medical
14	equipment for a much smaller subset of people.
15	For these issues I mentioned and many more the
16	others have spoken to, or will speak to, I stand
17	opposed this happen.
18	Thank you for your time.
19	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you very much,
20	questions.
21	All right. Thank you for your testimony
22	today.
23	MS. PIRRELLO: After Ms. Kebe will be Andrea
24	Illiano. Jerry or Gerry Illiano or David Kirk.
25	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Ms. Kebe, you are

1	recognized.
2	PUBLIC COMMENT
3	MS. KEBE: Thank you.
4	Well, thank you everybody tonight, everybody,
5	please, for your attendance and for your interest.
6	As my name is Jane Kebe. I live at 18 Palm
7	Drive on Knight Island, and I have lived there I
8	have owned the home for 10 years, and I have lived
9	there full time for six years.
10	I worked as an environmental engineer for over
11	20 years, specializing in wastewater design and in
12	hazardous waste. In my graduate studies, I had two
13	semesters specifically dedicated to wastewater
14	treatment design and biological unit operations,
15	then I applied this knowledge that I gained into my
16	career.
17	I can attest that wastewater design,
18	construction and operations requires a substantial
19	training and education and significant amount of
20	hands-on experience. After reviewing Jack Boyer's
21	any used curriculum vitae, I do not believe they
22	have the experience, they don't have the education
23	and the technical expertise to construct and
24	operate this proposed of sewer system, and I
25	believe that their application should be denied.

1	And thank you for your time and consideration.
2	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you very much, Ms.
3	Kebe.
4	Any questions?
5	Next witness.
6	PUBLIC COMMENT
7	MS. ILLIANO: Good evening. My name is Andrea
8	Illiano, and I live at 46 Tarpon Way on Palm
9	Island. We have been residents of Palm Island
10	since 2008, and since 2014 full time.
11	Both my husband and I, he will speak next a
12	little bit further than I will, but we are both
13	certified in maintaining our septic system with the
14	County, and we have maintained that system very
15	thoroughly faxing our sludge levels and all of the
16	other information that was needed to satisfy the
17	environmental needs of our home and county.
18	We feel our system works excellent. We have
19	had no issues with it. And I feel this is just
20	something that is totally uncalled for. We have no
21	need to do this. As I said, we have been on the
22	island since 2008 with no problem whatsoever.
23	We are a very environmentally conscious
24	family, always fighting for water quality. This
25	has nothing to do with water quality or adding to

1	the needs for our environment to be kept safe.
2	So, again, I am going to ask you to deny this
3	permit, as there is no need for it. Our systems
4	have been working beautifully, and the County has
5	certified us. And having lived in New York and
6	Long Island for most of our lives, we dreamed about
7	being able to own a home with water in our back
8	yard and the love of boating, which we do
9	immensely, and I want to maintain that love and not
10	have things impinge upon it and take away the
11	beauty of our island with no necessity for it.
12	Thank you for your support on this.
13	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you.
14	Any of questions?
15	All right. Next speaker.
16	MS. PIRRELLO: Following the next speaker, we
17	will have Dave Kirk, Cheryl clause and Lisa Haney.
18	PUBLIC COMMENT
19	MR. ILLIANO: Good evening, Commissioners. As
20	you can see, my wife and I, we have lived together
21	for a long time. She kind of covered everything
22	that I was going to say.
23	But I was an electrician in New York and I
24	worked pollution plants, and I will tell you, it's
25	not a fun job. All I know is that our system works

1	very well. We need to pump out maybe once every
2	four years. We have an aerobic system, which is
3	like a small pollution plant that actually blows
4	air into the waste tank and it lets the liquids go
5	into a leach field. The leach field absorbs the
6	water, you maintain your roots, you have no
7	problems.
8	I think that the sewer system would create a
9	devastating situation for our island. I think that
10	the that we would have that we really don't
11	need it. I think our septic systems are fine. So
12	I would just like to add that.
13	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you very much for
14	your testimony.
15	Any questions?
16	All right. Thank you for being here tonight.
17	Ms. Pirrello.
18	MS. PIRRELLO: Following Mr. Kirk, we have
19	Cheryl Klaus, Lisa Haney and Barbara DeYulio.
20	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Mr. Kirk, you are
21	recognized.
22	PUBLIC COMMENT
23	MR. KIRK: Howdy. Dave Kirk, 24 BayShore
24	Circle.
25	Against the whole concept of it a for-profit

1	utility. Against the removal of the septic
2	systems, and just couldn't imagine the electrical
3	systems involved with providing the pumps. I mean,
4	if you are on the island, it's kind of reluctant to
5	even have a light switch below floodplain, and then
6	the amount of failures that could occur. And then
7	you think of all the generators that would be
8	you know, the system would probably have a
9	generator backup system. I can tell you that
10	generator failures, they will be great for a few
11	years, but it would be, in a flood situation, it
12	would be terrible. All of them would have to be
13	above floodplain, and I couldn't imagine what that
14	would look like.
15	So against, and ditto for everybody else.
16	COMMISSIONER CLARK: All right. Thank you,
17	sir.
18	Any questions? Mr Mr. Kirk, Mr. Kirk,
19	would you come back, please? We have one question.
20	MR. FRIEDMAN: One question. You are talking
21	about the generators. Wouldn't it be possible for
22	the utility to have a mobile generator to go around
23	and assist in that situation?
24	MR. KIRK: Yeah, but I haven't seen them do
25	that yet.

1	MR. FRIEDMAN: But there is not a sewer system
2	out there yet, is there?
3	MR. KIRK: No.
4	MR. FRIEDMAN: Okay.
5	COMMISSIONER CLARK: All right. Thank you,
6	sir.
7	All right. Next speaker.
8	MS. PIRRELLO: After Ms. Klaus is Lisa Haney,
9	Barbara DeYulio and Linda Miklos.
10	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Ms. Klaus, you are
11	recognized.
12	PUBLIC COMMENT
13	MS. KLAUS: Good evening. My name is Cheryl
14	Klaus. I live at 540 South Gulf Boulevard on Don
15	Pedro Island in The Preserve.
16	I have already sent in my letter in opposition
17	to this proposal by Environmental Utilities. I am
18	just here to reiterate, in case you didn't read it,
19	that I am opposed to this proposition for all of
20	the four reasons that need to be met in order to
21	issue such a permission to build.
22	I just cannot imagine digging up a barrier
23	island full of protected gopher tortoises, et
24	cetera. I suppose you have never been to the
25	island, so you have no idea what a big sand

1	beautiful island this is, how environmentally
2	sensitive it is, and there is really no need for it
3	in the first place, need for a septic system, or a
4	sewage system out there.
5	So thank you for your time. Again, I am just
6	voicing my opposition.
7	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you very much.
8	Questions, anyone?
9	All right. Next witness.
10	MS. PIRRELLO: Following Ms. Haney, Barbara
11	DeYulio, Linda Miklos and Laura Gruneiro.
12	PUBLIC COMMENT
13	MS. HANEY: Hi. My name is Lisa Haney. I
14	live at 58 Tarpon Way, and I am here to support
15	residents and also ask for the denial of the
16	application.
17	I can't imagine how overly invasive this would
18	be to our island. I am emotional about the animals
19	that we protect, and the amount of disturbance for
20	something that we don't need is just ridiculous.
21	That's what I have to say.
22	COMMISSIONER CLARK: All right. Thank you.
23	Any of questions?
24	All right. Next witness.
25	PUBLIC COMMENT

1	MS. DEYULIO: I am Barbara DeYulio. I live at
2	1 Pointe Way on Don Pedro Island.
3	All I have to say is we do not need this. We
4	do not need a sewage system. Our island, if you
5	have ever been there, is the most gorgeous place in
6	the world, and this disruption of our beauty and
7	our nature would just be devastating to our island.
8	So I am hoping that you will deny this proposal.
9	Thank you.
10	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you.
11	Any questions?
12	Okay. Ms. Miklos.
13	PUBLIC COMMENT
14	MS. MIKLOS: Hi. I am Linda Miklos, and my
15	husband and I live on 40 North Gulf. And I am
16	requesting that you deny EU's proposal for a
17	permit, and I just want to say I have dittos for
18	everybody, David, and Jane, and Cheryl, and
19	everybody.
20	Our island is just a special place. We come
21	and go in golf carts. And if we need to go off the
22	island, we use a ferry. So there is all kinds of
23	disruption with if they decide to put a sewer
24	system on, we wouldn't be able to get on the ferry
25	forever.

1	There is no need for it. We didn't ask for
2	it. We got little or no incomplete information
3	on it. We haven't been proven any technical
4	support that they have any technical expertise, and
5	the rates are just exorbitant.
6	But my I guess the little thing I want to
7	add is why are we doing this? Who is it
8	benefiting? We on the island are completely happy.
9	We moved there for our dream, and knowing that we
10	are on a septic system, and we are all really
11	conscious of the environment and want to keep
12	everything the same, all of the animals, and the
13	water, and just the whole environment, and who is
14	this benefiting? It's not benefiting us. The only
15	thing I can see is the only ones who need a better
16	sewer system is the resort, and maybe they are
17	benefiting by spreading the cost to us, and that's
18	just not fair.
19	So that's what I have to say. So I request
20	you think about all of our letters, and all of our
21	points, and deny EU the permit. Thanks.
22	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you very much, Ms.
23	Miklos.
24	Questions?
25	Thank you. You are excused.

1	MS. PIRRELLO: Everyone who has registered to
2	speak is lined up here. If you wanted to speak and
3	you have not filled out a speaker form, please do
4	so.
5	COMMISSIONER CLARK: I have I have a Laura.
6	MS. PIRRELLO: Yes, she's right there.
7	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Okay.
8	PUBLIC COMMENT
9	MS. GRUNEIRO: Hi. I would also like to thank
10	you for giving us the opportunity to come here to
11	oppose a central sewer system on the island. My
12	name is Laura Gruneiro, and I have a home at 421
13	Kettle Harbor Drive. And one of the reasons that I
14	think we all love the island is its rural nature,
15	and the environmentally conscious residents take
16	great pride in trying to preserve that, and I don't
17	see any need to come in and put in a sewer system
18	that I agree is going to cause massive disruption
19	to the existing wildlife, plants, gopher tortoises,
20	et cetera. And I certainly don't want to see that
21	type of infrastructure supporting more higher
22	density development, condos and high rises.
23	And I also wrote a letter, and I don't have
24	too much else to add. I think everyone's
25	presentations were excellent, and I just wanted to

1	be here in support of the opposition and just
2	formally state that I would like you to please deny
3	the request by EU.
4	Thank you.
5	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you very much.
6	Any questions from the parties?
7	All right. Ms. Pirrello.
8	MS. PIRRELLO: That's everyone that we have
9	registered. Is there anyone else who wished to
10	speak?
11	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Anyone else that would
12	like to sign in to speak?
13	Sir, are you requesting to speak?
14	MR. KNIGHTEN: Yes.
15	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Okay. We got a staff?
16	MS. PIRRELLO: Call Art Krighten Knighten.
17	COMMISSIONER CLARK: I will get him.
18	Just state your name again, please.
19	PUBLIC COMMENT
20	MR. KNIGHTEN: Art Knighten, 130 Bocilla.
21	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Mr. Knighten were you
22	sworn earlier?
23	MR. KNIGHTEN: Yes.
24	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Okay. You did swear,
25	okay. Thank you.

1	You are recognized.
2	MR. KNIGHTEN: Okay. I want to thank y'all
3	for coming out on this terrible night. It really
4	it is.
5	But one thing I did want to touch on is that
6	irregardless of everything else, if you tear up
7	every septic tank on that island and truck it off
8	the island to somewhere else in Charlotte County,
9	or somewhere else, I can't imagine how many
10	hundreds of dump trucks are going to have to go
11	across that ferry system. I mean, that's just one
12	small aspect of what's going to have to happen with
13	this system if it's approved.
14	And like everybody has said, we have enough
15	trouble getting on and off the island at times.
16	Sometimes it's great. Sometimes it's not so great.
17	But, I mean, you are looking the other
18	construction equipment coming on and off, but just
19	the dump trucks, the hundreds and hundreds of dump
20	trucks, because you got hundreds of septic tanks,
21	and, you know, it might take two, three, four dump
22	trucks to get that off the island, and then bring
23	more dirt on to fill it up.
24	That's all I wanted to add. Thank you.
25	COMMISSIONER CLARK: All right. Thank you,

1	sir.
2	Any questions?
3	All right. Thank you very much.
4	Does that conclude?
5	All right. I believe that concludes everyone.
6	Did everyone that signed up get an opportunity to
7	speak? All right. Great. Very good.
8	Thank you again for taking your time out of
9	your schedules to be here. I promised you we would
10	get you in time to get on that last ferry home,
11	right, so that was one of our objectives tonight,
12	to be able to get everybody home.
13	We thank you again for your participation in
14	the process. We look forward to continuing to read
15	the comments that are continuing to come in via our
16	website. And with that said, Commissioners,
17	anything that you have before we go?
18	All right. We will reconvene tomorrow
19	morning, I believe 9:30 a.m. for the final customer
20	service hearing.
21	Thank you very much.
22	(Proceedings concluded.)
