Thank you for the notices regarding the hearing on 5/12/98. Please accept this letter as our input to the hearings, in lieu of an appearance.

There were several issues presented at the hearing in Altamonte Springs in March of this year. Some of the issues we would like considered are:

- 1. SOHA is not opposed to re-use or the customer cost associated with it, as long as health concerns and reasonable cost accounting methods are employed. As previously pointed out, the engineering firm representing Sanlando stated in depositions (unrelated to the re-use issue) that the cost was underestimated by at least \$700,000.00. We feel that this should be disclosed to the rate payers and not have a "surprise" increase as a result of the true-up. It is not a true-up, but a known misrepresentation of facts. Our support for the re-use plan results from what we believe will be a positive environmental impact on our community as well as the Wekiva River and its surrounding areas.
- 2. Cove Lake System which is completely within the area of SOHA, is the recipient of the discharged effluent from Sanlando, and as a result, our lake system is a "phosphorus cesspool" is the written words of one of the DEP officials. This results in phenomenal problems for the Association and residents. As a result of pending litigation with Sanlando, negotiations were instigated between SOHA, Sanlando and the DEP. The goal of these negotiations are:
 - A. Saniando will clean up the lake system.
 - B. Phosphorus discharge levels will be reduced to approximately background levels (which is not acknowledged on page 12, para 2.
 - C. Discharge amounts will be reduced approx. 50% as a result of reuse. The discharge presently enters the Wekiva River, an OFW, and impacts not only the downstream water levels but also the nutrient loading. Not only will SOHA and its' residents benefit from the above 3 items, but also the Wekiva, as acknowledged on pg. 14, last para. of 4/30/98 memo.

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- 3. The DEP has stated that it will support Sanlando's request for a rate increase for the clean-up and plant modification costs. SOHA has agreed to support the rate increase if the above results are accomplished. With this in mind, we believe that the re-use rate increase should be delayed and a request (if approved) for re-use and clean-up of the prior discharge area be combined, to more fairly and adequately disclose the more accurate future rate increase. Under Florida Statute 367.0817(3) rate increases for re-use are authorized and should, therefore, extend to clean-up of abandoned discharge areas.
- 4. SOHA is not a community of 200 residents as stated on page 12, para. 2, line 5; rather it is a community of 1400 residents with approx. 200 living on waterway areas. All are served by Sanlando Utilities Corporation and represent a very substantial portion of total serviced customers and dollar revenues.
- 5. SOHA realizes accepts and embraces the concept of reuse and all the benefits associated with it. However, we make the following observations pertaining to specific staff recommendations contained in Memo dated 4/30/98:
 - A. Sanlando should be afforded the availability of recovering costs associated with re-use - as any business has the right to recover capital investment costs. These recoveries should not necessarily be limited to projected future over earnings, although such overearnings could and should be a consideration during the "true-up" process.
 - B. Current and future rate payers, other than the proposed four re-use customers, should not subsidize private industry by paying a rate increase imposed for the purpose of providing water to those four "customers" when, in fact, private enterprise customers will be receiving that water for "zero rate" as currently recommended by staff. Although all four "customers" now draw water from permitted wells, we submit there are still costs involved in the current process; i.e., electric, maintenance, etc. Under the proposed staff recommendations, water delivery would truly become "free" to these businesses.

We sincerely thank you and your entire staff for the opportunity to express our positions on this matter.
