The Objections stated herein are preliminary in nature and are made at this time for the purpose of complying with the five-day requirement set forth in Order No. PSC-98-0813-PCO-TP issued by the Florida Public Service Commission (hereinafter the "Commission") in the above-referenced docket on June 19, 1998. Should additional grounds for objection be discovered as AT&T prepares its Answers to the above-referenced set of interrogatories, AT&T reserves the right to supplement, revise, or modify its objections at the time that it serves its Answers on SPEINT. Moreover, should AT&T determine that a Protective Order is necessary with respect to any of the material requested by SPRINT, AT&T reserves the right to file a motion with the Commission seeking such an order at the time that it serves its Answers on SPRINT.

Rather, these responses will provide all of the information obtained by AT&T after a reasonable and diligent search conducted in connection with this discovery request. AT&T will comply with Sprint's request that a search be conducted of those files that are reasonably expected to contain the requested information. To the extent that the discovery request purports to require more, AT&T objects on the grounds that compliance would impose an undue burden or expense.
