1 PROCEEDINGS 2 CHAIRMAN FAY: Great. All right. We're 3 The Item No. 6, Ms. Forrest, you're readv. 4 recognized introduce the item. 5 Good morning, Commissioners. MS. FORREST: Holly Forrest With Division of Economics. 6 7 Item 6 is a recommendation to suspend the 8 tariffs for Duke's proposed new My Energy Plus Program, in order to allow staff time to review and 9 10 analyze the petition on the proposed program. The 11 program seeks to offer qualifying residential 12 customers a monthly flat rate similar to a fixed 13 In addition, this proposed program bill program. 14 would allow the utility to monitor and control 15 participants' usage during peak times through the 16 use of smart thermostats. Staff is available for 17 questions. 18 CHAIRMAN FAY: Thank you, Ms. Forrest. I do 19 not believe I have any participation on this. 20 Commissioners, comments or questions on Item No. 6? 21 Commissioner Clark, you're recognized. 22 COMMISSIONER CLARK: This is the item that T 23 asked to be pulled, Mr. Chairman. I do want to 24 just ask a few questions. I understand we're here, 25 basically on staff's recommendation to suspend the

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tariff in order to give them time to do the necessary review on the final -- before final recommendation comes in. But I do want to take the opportunity to ask the company a few questions, and I think maybe this may give staff some idea as to where I'm going, what I'm thinking in regards to the program.

8 Types of demand response programs always have positive benefits, but there are also some costs 9 10 associated with them. And one of my big concerns, 11 Mr. Bernier, is the cost of the thermostats. These 12 are not typically cheap control devices when they 13 have the ability to take radio communications or 14 some sort of signaling. And then I go back to --15 in the settlement, the rate base that was 16 calculated, are these costs associated with the 17 thermostats going to be incremental to the rate 18 base that will set?

19 CHAIRMAN FAY: Mr. Bernier, you're recognized.
20 MR. BERNIER: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Matt
21 Bernier, Duke Energy. No, sir, these costs for
22 these thermostats are not being moved through base
23 rates or any clause mechanism.

24 COMMISSIONER CLARK: So they're not through 25 any clause. There will be no clause mechanism that

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they're brought back in.

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2 Is the program going to be open and available 3 to people who have their own smart thermostats? 4 Can these be coordinated with other types of 5 thermostats, for example, Nest or something of that nature, that is modified to receive the signal? 6 7 I have to apologize, MR. BERNIER: 8 Commissioner. I truly don't know the answer to 9 that question. It's something that we can 10 certainly work with your staff to get that 11 information. Honestly, just don't know, sitting 12 here. 13 COMMISSIONER CLARK: One of my biggest 14 concerns is how this program affects 15 non-participants. Can you share with us how the 16 costs are going to be spread over the general body 17 of ratepayers? 18 MR. BERNIER: So this is a, you know, 19 voluntary program that is open to any customers. 20 And, again, the caveat that I'm not sure about the 21 thermostat question that you just asked, but the 22 program will have no upward pressure on rates or 23 general body of customers. In fact, the idea is 24 that by managing load during peak monthly times 25 that over time you'll see cost saving, hopefully

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1 that will -- excuse me -- result in reduced rates. 2 COMMISSIONER CLARK: How are you proposing to 3 pay for the thermostats that are going to -- I 4 realize you have -- assume 1,000 that are going to 5 low-income, you got 1,700 that are going to --6 looking for 2,700 total in the program, is your 7 estimate? To start, but it's not -- the 8 MR. BERNIER: 9 program is not capped to the number of 10 participants, but the incentive is for the first 11 1,000. The thermostats paid for by a mixture of 12 donation thermostat providers, some of the various foundations, the company. 13 14 COMMISSIONER CLARK: Has Duke contemplated the 15 actual coincident peak reduction potential that 16 this program has? 17 MR. BERNIER: I do not know the answer to 18 I would assume that the answer is yes. that. I do 19 not have the information with me here today. Ι 20 have to apologize. 21 Can you tell me if this COMMISSIONER CLARK: 22 is going to be -- I assume it's economically --23 it's an economic dispatch program. It's based on 24 what costs are at those particular times. Can the 25 program also be used in a reliability situation?

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1 Can it be used to prevent certain load structures 2 from overloading, that type of stuff? 3 MR. BERNIER: I have to apologize. Give you 4 the same answer that I do not know. That --5 logically that makes sense to me to what you're asking me, that I would think, yes, but I would 6 7 have to get back with the technical folks. I have 8 not had a chance to speak with them. 9 COMMISSIONER CLARK: Okay. And I 10 appreciate -- I saw staff's first set of 11 interrogatories this morning, and you guys were 12 I was kind of going through and I right on target. 13 had about five minutes to actually read over what 14 staff had put together, but I think staff's on the 15 right target with getting us some of the specific 16 answers to some questions on the program. But, in 17 general, in theory, I think that you're -- you're 18 on a good track here as long as I'm comfortable 19 that the ratepayers are protected in such a 20 That's one of the things that I'm going program. 21 to continuously be looking for is how does this 22 affect the entire body ratepayers. 23 Thank you, Mr. Bernier. 24 MR. BERNIER: Yes, sir. Understood. Thank 25 you.

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1 CHAIRMAN FAY: Great. Thank you, Mr. Bernier. 2 And Ms. Forrest or Mr. Coston, if you wanted to add 3 anything to Commissioner Clark's questions, I want 4 to give you the opportunity to do so. 5 MS. FORREST: Yeah. On response to question 6 five on the data request, we asked how they are 7 paying for the thermostats or how they will be 8 funded, and the response was that they will be 9 partly funded by Duke's Share the Light Fund, as 10 well as donations from thermostat partners. 11 CHAIRMAN FAY: Great. Thank you so much. 12 Commissioner, with that, I will entertain a 13 motion on Item No. 6. 14 COMMISSIONER CLARK: Move to approve staff recommendation, Mr. Chairman. 15 16 We have a motion and a second. CHAIRMAN FAY: 17 All that approve, say aye. 18 None opposed. 19 With that, Item 6 passes unanimously. 20 Commissioners, with that, we will adjourn this 21 agenda conference. 22 (Agenda item concluded.) 23 24 25

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
