Pursuant to Section 120.74(1), Florida Statutes (F.S.), by October 1 of each year the Commission must prepare a Regulatory Plan and submit it to the Joint Administrative Procedures Committee (JAPC).

The Regulatory Plan is required to include a listing of each law enacted or amended during the previous 12 months that created or modified the duties or authority of the agency. In addition, the plan is required to include a listing of each statute that the Commission expects to implement by rulemaking before July 1, and any update to the prior year's Regulatory Plan. Finally, the Regulatory Plan is required to include a certification from the Chairman and the General Counsel verifying they have reviewed the plan and that the Commission regularly reviews its rules to determine consistency with the our rulemaking authority and the laws implemented.

2025 Statutory Changes to the Regulatory Plan Requirements

During its 2025 session, the Legislature made changes to the requirements for the Regulatory Plan. In addition to the requirements listed above, these statutory changes impose five new required components for the Regulatory Plan. First, the plan must now contain a list of all of the Commission's rules in effect as of July 1, 2025. Second, the Regulatory Plan must include the Commission's plan to review those rules over the next five years (at least 20 percent each year) using statutorily specified criteria. Next, the plan must include a list of which rules the Commission will review in each of the five years. In addition, the plan must now include a statement concerning compliance with licensing timeframes and other data concerning licensing processing. Finally, if any rules scheduled for review were not reviewed, the Regulatory Plan must include an explanation as to why an agency did not review all the rules it indicated it would.

Approval of the Regulatory Plan

Section 120.74(2), F.S., requires that by October 1 of each year, the Commission must publish the Regulatory Plan on its website and electronically deliver it to JAPC. Also by October 1, the Commission must publish a notice in the Florida Administrative Register (FAR) indicating the date the Commission published the Regulatory Plan on the Commission's website. These have been long-standing requirements and were not altered by the 2025 statutory amendments.

To comply with the statutory deadline of October 1, staff seeks the Commission's approval of the 2025 Regulatory Plan at the September 4, 2025, Internal Affairs meeting. The transmittal letter to JAPC, a draft of which is attached to this memorandum, contains the certification required by Section 120.74(1)(d), F.S. Attachments A though H to the certification letter provide the information required by statute. The list of laws that create or modify the Commission's duties or authority is attached to the certification letter as Attachment A. Attachment B to the certification letter is the Commission's list of laws that it expects to implement through rule adoption, amendment, or repeal before July 1, 2026. The Commission's report that it has no updates to the 2024 Regulatory Plan is Attachment C to the certification letter. Attachment D to the certification letter is the list of all Commission rules in effect as of July 1, 2025. The Commission's plan to review its 433 rules is attached to the certification letter as Exhibit E. Attachment F to the certification letter contains the lists of which of its rules the Commission will review each year over the next five years. Attachment G addresses whether the Commission failed to review any rules requiring review in the prior year's regulatory plan, and there are no such rules. Finally, the Commission's statement that Section 120.80, F.S., exempts it from the licensing timeframes established by Section 120.60, F.S., is attached as Attachment H.

Future Next Steps

Once the Commission approves the Regulatory Plan, the Commission is required to review the rules listed on this year's schedule, as set forth in Attachment F to the certification letter. Pursuant to Section 120.5435(4), F.S., in reviewing each rule the Commission must determine if the rule (1) is a valid exercise of delegated legislative authority, (2) has current statutory authority, (3) improperly reiterates or paraphrases statutory material, (4) is in proper form, (5) is consistent with expressed legislative intent, (6) requires a technical or substantive change or needs to be repealed, and (7) if the statutory citations or reference materials need updating or to be incorporated by reference.

By January 1, 2026, the Commission is required to submit a report to the President of the Florida Senate, the Speaker of the Florida House of Representatives, and JAPC, that summarizes our intended action for each rule reviewed. That action can be to make a technical change, make a substantive change, repeal the rule, or make no change.

By April 1, 2026, the Commission must submit a statement to JAPC explaining and justifying its intended actions for each rule, which must include the assessment of the required factors listed above, and publish any required notices in the FAR.

JAPC then has until July 1, 2026, to review each agency's rule review submissions. For rules for which the Commission is proposing no change or only a technical change, the rule review is not complete until JAPC has certified that the Commission has responded in writing to all material and timely written comments. For rules being substantively amended or repealed, the rule review is considered complete when the Commission timely filed its required notices in the FAR.

Commission staff will bring an item to a future Internal Affairs that will address the proposed plan of action following the rule review required by Section 120.5435, F.S.

Dear Mr. Plante:

The Florida Public Service Commission (Commission) hereby files its 2025 Regulatory Plan pursuant to Section 120.74, Florida Statutes (F.S.).

Section 120.74(1)(a), F.S., requires a listing of each law enacted or amended during the previous 12 months that creates or modifies the duties or authority of the agency. For each law listed under paragraph (1)(a), the plan must state whether rule adoption is required to implement the law, and if so, whether a notice of rule development has been published and the date by which the agency expects to publish the notice of proposed rule. The Commission's report of laws pursuant to Section 120.74(1)(a), F.S., is attached as Attachment A.

Section 120.74(1)(b), F.S., states that the regulatory plan must also include a listing of each law not listed pursuant to Section 120.74(1)(a), F.S., that the agency expects to implement by rulemaking before the following July 1. For each law listed under paragraph (1)(b), the plan must state whether the rulemaking is intended to simplify, clarify, increase efficiency, improve coordination with other agencies, reduce costs, or delete obsolete, unnecessary, or redundant rules. The Commission's report of laws pursuant to Section 120.74(1)(b), F.S., is attached as Attachment B.

Section 120.74(1)(c), F.S., requires an identification and listing of laws that were identified in a prior year's regulatory plan as requiring rulemaking to implement, but for which a notice of proposed rule has not been published. The Commission has no laws or updates to report pursuant to Section 120.74(1)(c), F.S. The Commission's report that it has no laws or updates to the 2024 Regulatory Plan is attached as Attachment C.

Section 120.74(1)(e), F.S., requires a list of the agency's rules in existence as of July 1, 2025; a 5-year schedule to review those rules; and a yearly schedule for the rules to be reviewed each of

the five years. Attachment D contains the list of all Commission rules in existence as of July 1, 2025. Attachment E contains the Commission's plan to review each of those rules. Attachment F lists which rules the Commission will review each of the five years.

Section 120.74(1)(f), F.S., requires an explanation as to why an agency did not review any rules it was required to review pursuant to Section 120.5435, F.S. As Section 120.5435, Florida Statutes, only became effective July 1, 2025, the Commission did not identify any rules requiring review in its 2024 Regulatory Plan. Accordingly, there are no rules that the Commission had identified in its 2024 Regulatory Plan as requiring review for which the agency has not yet completed that review.

Section 120.74(1)(g), F.S., requires a statement by an agency concerning compliance with licensing timeframes. Attachment H indicates that pursuant to Section 120.80, F.S., the Commission is exempt from the licensing timeframes established by Section 120.60, F.S.

Section 120.74(1)(d), F.S., requires the plan to include a certification. Pursuant to Section 120.74(1)(d), F.S., we verify that we have reviewed the attached regulatory plan. We further verify that the Commission regularly reviews all of its rules and that the Commission's rules were most recently reviewed for the period September 1, 2024, through August 31, 2025, to determine if the rules remain consistent with the Commission's rulemaking authority and the laws implemented.

The Florida Public Service Commission Efficiency Committee has assessed select telecommunications reporting requirements and statutory provisions overseen by the agency. This initiative supports the Legislature's broader goal of increasing government efficiency by identifying opportunities to reduce redundancy, simplify statutory reporting, and align regulatory requirements with current industry conditions.

The Efficiency Committee's findings are presented in two parts

Part I evaluates four annual telecommunications reports. It recommends consolidating the Competition and Lifeline Reports, eliminating the RAF Report requirement, and retaining the Relay Report in its current form.

Part II reviews the statute governing pay telephone service providers. Based on current market conditions and the Commission's oversight role, the Committee recommends no statutory changes to s. 364.3375, F.S. at this time.

Next Steps

The Commission may direct the Efficiency Committee to transmit this memorandum to the Chairs and staff of the House and Senate committees with jurisdiction over the Commission to inform potential legislative action. The Commission may also direct the Committee to further investigate any of the statutory sections considered in its findings.

Assessment of Reporting and Statutory Requirements Related to Telecommunications FPSC Efficiency Committee

Introduction

As part of an effort to support the Florida Legislature in its broader goal of increasing government efficiency, this memorandum provides an assessment of select telecommunications reporting and statutory provisions overseen by the Florida Public Service Commission (FPSC). This review was conducted by the FPSC Efficiency Committee, which was established to identify opportunities to improve efficiency, whether by streamlining processes, reducing redundancy, minimizing costs, or enhancing overall performance. This review was also informed by findings from the 2024 Performance Audit of Commission Reports conducted by the Office of Inspector General, which evaluated the use, efficiency, and effectiveness of FPSC-issued reports.

This review is presented in two parts:

- Part I examines four annual telecommunications reports to determine whether they continue to provide meaningful value in the current telecommunications environment and whether opportunities exist for consolidation or elimination.
- Part II provides a focused statutory review of pay telephone regulation under s. 364.3375, F.S., including its ongoing relevance based on current industry conditions.

Part I: Telecommunications Reporting Review

Reports Assessed:

- 1. Status of Competition in the Telecommunications Industry, s. 364.386, F.S.
- 2. Efforts of the Florida Public Service Commission to Reduce the Regulatory Assessment Fee for Telecommunications Companies, s. 364.336, F.S.
- 3. Florida Lifeline Assistance, s. 364.10, F.S.
- 4. Status of the Telecommunications Access System Act of 1991, s. 427.704, F.S.

Findings:

1. Status of Competition in the Telecommunications Industry

Background

In 1995, the Legislature found that the competitive provision of telecommunications services was in the public interest and amended the Commission's authority over local exchange companies. The Legislature required the Commission to submit a report annually on the status

of competition, including the impact on service availability, reliability and rates (s. 364.386, F.S.) to the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the majority and minority leaders of the Senate and the House of Representatives.

In 2011, when the Legislature deregulated the telecommunications market, the reporting requirement was narrowed in scope to address the availability and reliability of service provided by the competitive market. For several years, the Competition Report has consistently confirmed a mature and competitive market dominated by wireless and VoIP services, with wireline services decreasing by 95 percent since 2001. The report also includes information on federal and state activities and new developments in the industry that affect telecommunications providers and customers in Florida, as well as brief updates on Lifeline and Relay services.

<u>Findings</u>

Following the Legislature's decision to deregulate the industry in 2011, it can be inferred that competition was considered successfully established, leading to a narrowing of the report's scope. The report continues to provide useful information for policymakers on market conditions and emerging trends. However, opportunities may exist to consider a broader approach that combines related updates, such as Lifeline participation information, into a single comprehensive publication on the status of telecommunications services in Florida. This could help reduce duplication and present policymakers with a more unified view of market trends and evolving issues affecting providers and consumers.

2. Efforts to Reduce the Regulatory Assessment Fee for Telecommunications Companies

Background

Adopted when the Legislature deregulated telecommunications services in 2011, s. 364.336(3), F.S., requires the Commission to report each year to the Governor, President of the Senate, and Speaker of the House of Representatives, providing a detailed description of its efforts to reduce Regulatory Assessment Fees (RAFs) for telecommunications providers. The RAF Report must provide a detailed description of activities that are no longer required; the commensurate reduction in associated costs; the regulatory activities that continue to be required; and the associated costs of those activities.

To develop the initial framework for identifying potential reductions, the Commission engaged an outside consultant. Since then, the Commission has reported on its actions to reduce RAFs consistent with a smaller telecommunications workload. The content of the report has remained relatively static in recent years, largely documenting past efforts to reduce operating expenses and allocate staffing accordingly. The report's conclusion has consistently been that the RAF and staffing levels are right-sized for the Commission's current regulatory responsibilities.

Findings

The report's content has become static, focusing on previously implemented cost-reduction measures and reaffirming that RAFs and staffing levels remain appropriate for the Commission's

reduced telecommunications oversight. As the original purpose of the report appears to have been met, its continued value as a recurring annual requirement may warrant reconsideration.

3. Florida Lifeline Assistance

Background

Section 364.10(2)(g), F.S., requires the Commission to prepare an annual report on the number of customers who are subscribing to Lifeline and the effectiveness of procedures to promote participation. The Lifeline Report is to be delivered to the Governor, President of the Senate, and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Beyond those mandated topics, the report addresses customer eligibly, the application process, service standards, changes and reforms to the program, and funding distribution. The report also serves to highlight PSC actions to expand the number of carriers offering Lifeline, and efforts to minimize waste, fraud, and abuse within the program.

Lifeline is a federal program designed to assist low-income customers to obtain telecommunications service by providing a discount on bills. Florida once had its own state program requiring telecommunications companies to provide an additional Lifeline discount to bills. That state program has since been discontinued. The Commission was also once tasked with verifying eligibility for Lifeline; however, in 2016 the FCC established a national verifier and states no longer have a role in signing customers up for Lifeline. While the Lifeline Report continues to provide subscriber numbers and describes efforts to promote Lifeline, the Commission's role in administering the Lifeline program has decreased considerably from when the report was initially required.

Findings

The report continues to provide subscriber numbers and describes outreach efforts to promote Lifeline as required by Statute, along with other information pertinent to Lifeline. However, information on participation and eligibility is also reported elsewhere, including in the Competition Report. With Florida's role in administering the program now limited, opportunities may exist to consolidate Lifeline updates within a broader telecommunications report.

4. Status of the Telecommunications Access System Act of 1991

Background

Section 427.704(9), F.S., requires the Commission to prepare an annual report on the telecommunications access system and post it on our website. The Relay Report provides operational, financial, and outreach data related to relay services and the distribution of specialized telecommunications devices through the administrator, Florida Telecommunications Relay, Inc. (FTRI). The Legislature also required the Commission to report any proposals for improvement or changes to the system.

The Commission continues to have a significant role over the telecommunications access system, including approval of the annual budget of the administrator and the surcharge paid by local exchange carriers.

Findings

The Relay Report remains relevant given the Commission's ongoing direct oversight of the telecommunications access system. No changes appear necessary at this time.

Part I Conclusion

In evaluating the continued need for each of the reports above, consideration was given to the original intent of each report and whether that purpose has been achieved, or whether current market conditions suggest the need for a revised focus or reporting approach. The Relay Report appears to remain relevant in its current form, given the Commission's ongoing role in overseeing the telecommunications access system. Accordingly, no changes appear necessary at this time.

The original purpose of the Competition Report was to track the impacts of the Legislature's 1995 efforts to introduce competition in the industry. Since the Legislature moved to deregulate the industry in 2011, it could be inferred that competition was viewed as sufficiently established. While tracking the progress of competition may no longer be essential, the report continues to offer valuable insight into market trends and developments. It may be worth considering whether the report's scope should be broadened to reflect the overall status of the telecommunications industry in Florida, including evolving issues affecting providers and customers. Similarly, given the Commission's reduced role in Lifeline administration, the need for a separate Lifeline Report may be diminished. Since a brief update on Lifeline is included in the Competition Report, that section could simply be expanded to include any information necessary to report on Lifeline subscribers, promotional activity, and changes to the federal program that impact Florida.

With respect to the RAF Report, the original objective of aligning fees and staffing with the Commission's current regulatory responsibilities appears to have been accomplished. The report's content has remained relatively unchanged in recent years, with a consistent focus on past cost reduction measures. Moving forward, it may be appropriate to consider whether future updates could be incorporated into a revised Competition Report.

Statutory Implementation Considerations

To implement the potential changes identified in this review, the Legislature could consider the following statutory revisions:

1. Consolidation of the Competition and Lifeline Reports

Current Requirements

• Section 364.386, F.S. requires the Commission to submit a report on the status of competition in the telecommunications industry by August 1 each year.

• Section 364.10(2)(g), F.S. requires the Commission to submit a report on Lifeline participation and promotional procedures by December 31 each year.

Proposed Implementation

To reduce duplication and streamline reporting, the Legislature may consider amending both statutes to consolidate the reports into a single, comprehensive telecommunications report.

- The consolidated report would be governed by s. 364.386, F.S. The revised reporting requirement would remove existing requirements to answer specific questions related to market competition, and would be replaced by broader requirements to report on the status of the telecommunications market in Florida. The requirement to report on Lifeline participation and outreach information found in s. 364.10(2)(g), F.S., could be revised to require that information be included in the report submitted pursuant to 364.386, F.S.
- The due date for the unified report could be changed to October 1. This would provide the Commission with additional time to collect, verify, and analyze relevant data while still ensuring that the Legislature receives the information in advance of the regular legislative session.
- The title and framing of the report under s. 364.386, F.S., could be broadened to reflect a more comprehensive review of the telecommunications industry.

Amend s. 364.386, F.S. to:

- Revise the report's title to reflect a broader review of the telecommunications industry.
- Change the report's due date from August 1 to October 1.

Amend s. 364.10(2)(g), F.S. to:

• Remove the standalone Lifeline reporting requirement, and instead reference s. 364.386, F.S. as the location of the unified reporting obligation.

2. Elimination of the RAF Report Requirement

Current Requirements

- Section 364.336(2), F.S., requires the Commission to initiate rulemaking by August 1, 2011, to adjust the RAF to reflect reduced regulatory activity resulting from the 2011 statutory amendments.
- Section 364.336(3), F.S. requires the Commission to submit an annual report by January 15 detailing its efforts to reduce the Regulatory Assessment Fee (RAF) for

telecommunications providers. The report must describe regulatory activities that have been eliminated, associated cost savings, and ongoing regulatory activities and their costs.

Proposed Implementation

To reflect current regulatory practices and eliminate potentially outdated requirements, the Legislature may consider repealing both subsections (2) and (3) of s. 364.336, F.S.

- Subsection (2) may be repealed as a conforming revision. This provision directed a one-time rulemaking to implement RAF reductions following the 2011 statutory amendments. The directive has long since been fulfilled, and the provision is now obsolete. Repeal would remove any ambiguity regarding its applicability.
- Subsection (3) may be repealed to eliminate the requirement for an annual report on efforts to reduce RAFs. This requirement was enacted in 2011 to support transparency during a period of deregulation. The original policy objective has since been achieved, and ongoing reporting has become static.
- If continued transparency is desired, information on RAF trends and resource allocation could be included in the proposed consolidated telecommunications report governed by s. 364.386, F.S., eliminating the need for a standalone report.

Amend s. 364.336, F.S. to:

- Repeal subsection (3) to eliminate the annual RAF reporting requirement.
- Repeal subsection (2) as a conforming change, recognizing that the required rulemaking has been completed and is no longer applicable.

Part II: Statutory Review — Pay Telephone Service Providers

Statute Reviewed: s. 364.3375, F.S.

This statute outlines regulatory requirements for pay telephone service providers, including certification, technical and consumer service standards, emergency call access, and public disclosure obligations.

Market Context

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According to the 2024 Competition Report, the number of payphones in Florida continues to decline. Payphones account for a very small portion of the state's telecommunications infrastructure and are no longer a primary means of public access to communication. In 2004, the largest payphone provider at the time, BellSouth (AT&T Florida), exited the payphone market in Florida. Currently, there are only 20 certificated payphone companies in Florida. This compares to approximately 113 in 2010. Of the 20 certificated payphone companies, half advertise their service to correctional facilities. While exact number of payphones in service in Florida is not available, most are likely located in correctional institutions.

Alignment with Public Policy Goals

The original public interest justifications—such as ensuring emergency access in public places—are largely outdated in light of widespread mobile phone use. Given the shift in usage patterns and the specialized nature of remaining installations (e.g., correctional facilities), it may be surmised that the need for a specific regulatory regime for payphones is outdated and could be repealed in its entirety. However, payphone companies are still providing telecommunications service in coordination with the telecommunications network and still consume numbering resources. If the specific payphone regulations were repealed, we would be left with a regulatory gap with no oversight of specific companies in the market.

Since payphone companies are still telecommunications providers, repealing s. 364.3375, F.S., without further action could result in payphone providers defaulting to classification as Competitive Local Exchange Carriers (CLECs). This would subject them to broader regulatory requirements and potentially higher RAFs—an outcome that may not align with the limited scope and scale of modern payphone operations.

Findings

The current regulatory framework for payphone companies appears appropriate for the service they provide and aligns with the Commission's oversight responsibilities.

Part II Conclusion

The statute governing pay telephone providers (s. 364.3375, F.S.) applies to a declining segment of the market, now largely limited to specialized facilities such as correctional institutions. However, this review finds that the current regulatory framework remains appropriate for the services provided and consistent with the Commission's oversight responsibilities, and no statutory changes appear necessary at this time.

Pursuant to Section 120.74, Florida Statutes, by October 1st, for the Regulatory Plan, the Commission must submit its regulatory plan to the Joint Administrative Procedures Committee, which I will later refer to as JAPC, publish its Regulatory Plan on the commission's website, and publish a Notice of the Regulatory Plan in the Florida Administrative Register.

Historically, the Regulatory Plan, which the Commission is required to do, has identified rules which will be required to do rulemaking, and rules for which the Commission has anticipated doing rulemaking in the coming year. That information is contained in Attachment A, beginning at page one of the packet, and Attachment B, beginning on page seven of the packet respectively.

1	In the 2025 legislative session, the
2	Legislatures substantially amended the requirements
3	for Regulatory Plan. A notable change to the
4	statute requires the Regulatory Plan must now also
5	set forth the agency's five-year plan to review all
6	of its rules, and indicate which rules it will
7	review in each of those five years. That
8	information is contained in Attachment E, beginning
9	on page 23 of the packet, and Attachment F,
LO	beginning on page 24 of the packet respectively.
L1	The Regulatory Plan must also contain a

The Regulatory Plan must also contain a certification executed by both the Chairman and the General Counsel verifying that they have reviewed the Regulatory Plan, and that it fulfills the statutory requirements. The JAPC certification letter is immediately behind the cover memorandum for this item.

The Office of General Counsel will work with the Chairman's office to comply timely with the statutory requirements for filing of our Regulatory Plan. Staff seeks approval of the Commission's 2025 Regulatory Plan, which is comprised of the JAPC certification letter and its Attachments A through H, all of which are included with this item. We request administrative authority to

Access System Act, or TASA. Given the Commission's direct oversight approving both the administrator's budget and surcharge, the committee finds this report remains essential and recommends no changes at this time.

The committee also reviewed the Status of
Competition in the Telecommunications Industry
Report and the Florida Lifeline Assistance Report.
While the competition only includes a brief update
on Lifeline, the two reports do touch on common
subject matter regarding the telecommunications
industry.

Also, given the Commission's reduced role in Lifeline, the need for a separate Lifeline Report may be diminished. The committee has, therefore, identified an opportunity to consolidate them into

1	a single, broader Telecommunications Report. This
2	approach would streamline the Commission's
3	reporting processes and provide the Legislature
4	with a single consolidated report for a more
5	efficient review of the telecommunications
6	industry.

Finally, the committee reviewed the Regulatory
Assessment Fee Report. The original objective of
aligning fees and staffing with the Commission's
current regulatory responsibilities appears to have
been accomplished. The report's content has he
remained relatively unchanged in recent years, with
the consistent focus on past cost reduction
measures. The committee has identified an
opportunity to eliminate this reporting
requirement, which the Commission may wish to
present to the Legislature for consideration.

Turning to part two of the review, pay telephones. Usage has declined sharply and is now mostly limited to correctional facilities. While the original public interest need has significantly diminished, repealing the statute could result in pay phone providers defaulting the classification as competitive local exchange carriers now come back -- may not align with the limited scope and

1 scale of today's pay phone operations. 2. reason, the committee finds the current framework 3 appropriate and recommends no changes. 4 In summary, the committee's review supports 5 retaining the Relay report as is, consolidating the Competition in Lifeline Reports, eliminating the 6 7 RAF Report and maintaining the Commission's current 8 regulatory oversight over pay telephones. This concludes my overview of the Efficiency 9 10 Committee's first review, and the committee is now 11 seeking your direction on next steps. That could 12 be moving forward to providing this to the 13 Legislature for consideration, going back and 14 further exploring some of these sections of these areas covered, or holding on to this -- these 15 16 findings for future consideration. 17 I am happy to answer any questions. 18 you. 19 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Great. Thank you. And I 20 appreciate you laying that out there at the end 21 really. 22 And, Commissioners, I quess, the question 23 before us, or what's been presented to us is an 24 option we can take, right. And again, going back 25 to what I was saying earlier about the Efficiency

Team and assembling what I think is efficiencies
that we can recommend to the Legislature and they
can, of course, do with them as they see fit. My
hope is that my colleagues will join me in agreeing
that what's been assembled, what's been presented,
would be a resource to the Legislature.

If you could look kind of closely at how this is broken down, really part one and part two, and honestly, that reflects not just the good work of the team, but also Mr. Franks because -- and if you don't mind just kind of, you know, entertaining me a little bit and giving me some detail. asked specifically to look at pay telephones, right. And I think when you and I first discussed this, when I had seen that comment made, my first thought was why are we regulating pay telephones, right? I don't know where they are. My kids have asked me what exactly are pay phones, and I had to go on a hunt to find them. And David has done a great job of educating me and doing his own independent research.

And because that was asked specifically I thought it was important to include as, hey, we did look into this and we are informing that there is reason, of course, hopefully there is enough

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1 background information if they wanted to take 2. additional steps, they could. 3 But I think, you know, we are at least giving 4 the backup of why we kind of landed on where the 5 Efficiency Team was, because it was something that was asked of them, or asked of the agency. 6 7 They filled in the Efficiency Team took those up. 8 gaps, if I haven't missed anything. 9 MR. FRANKS: No, that's correct. I will say 10 that's probably one of the most common questions I 11 get from the Legislature when I meet with members. 12 They are always surprised to find out we still 13 oversee pay telephones. And I often get asked how 14 many we have, and why, and so --15 And then, in addition to that, during one of 16 our budget subcommittees, there was a review where 17 members who are assigned to agencies to look over 18 the budget process, and that was one of the 19 questions we were asked, and it was recommended to 20 explore possible elimination of that statute. 21 that was part of the reason we included that with 22 the report's review. 23 And I think the telecommunication review, as a whole, like you mentioned, would -- was first 24 25 looked into to be able to provide this if we

1	decided, or if the Commission decided to provide it
2	to the Legislature in time for an early legislative
3	session. So this was something we could hit the
4	ground running and start looking at.
5	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: I appreciate that. That's
6	why I asked to fill in the gaps. That's exactly
7	right.
8	And that was kind of our first initial goal,
9	is, hey, let's look at the statute, right. Let's
10	look at, you know, legislative recommendations.
11	Let's give the Legislature enough time to consider,
12	and not necessarily consider the start of session,
13	but consider the start of when we believe
14	committees will start meeting, which I know is
15	literally right around the corner, which is why it
16	was important for us to work diligently to get this
17	prepared for Internal Affairs here in September.
18	So my hope is that, and correct me if I am
19	wrong, David, is that this could be implemented in
20	a memorandum, you know, with Commission approval or
21	with Commission support of informing the
22	Legislature of work that the committee,
23	specifically the Efficiency Team has done on behalf
24	of the agency.
25	MR. FRANKS: Yep, that's right.

1	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Does that make sense?
2	MR. FRANKS: You are right, if we were to move
3	forward, and this could go in different ways. We
4	could break off one part, or provide the whole
5	document, but that would be provided to our
6	committee chairs in our jurisdiction or within
7	our jurisdiction, and the committee staff, just for
8	consideration, just to support their efforts to
9	find efficiencies within the agency, to say we went
10	back looked at these things, and here are some of
11	our findings, and then sort of provide that. Let
12	them decide if that's something they want to
13	explore further.
14	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Commissioners, any
15	questions, thoughts?
16	Commissioner Fay.
17	COMMISSIONER FAY: Thank you, Chairman.
18	I just have a quick question. So it kind of
19	sounds like everybody is saying, we don't know
20	where these pay phones are, and maybe that's like
21	an important question to be asking.
22	I am good sending the report on. I obviously
23	think there is, you know, distinctions between,
24	like, we work you know, I know the agency worked
25	a lot on FTRI and the TASA reform components

1	because the statute mandated that we do so. With
2	this stuff, it's obviously not changing regulatory
3	components outside of the building, it's basically
4	impacting how we get information and produce
5	reports internally.
6	So I am comfortable, I think, forwarding it or
7	in some format. Mr. Chairman, as to how you would

So I am comfortable, I think, forwarding it on in some format, Mr. Chairman, as to how you would want it to be forwarded on. I think it probably would be appropriate to, you know, come from the agency instead of maybe just the committee. I think that's probably the appropriate way to do it.

But I was anything maybe we would have the opportunity to either pull out, or have, like, maybe some more information to provide them on the pay phone side. So in here, we have got the 25 -- there were these 20 certified pay phone companies, and then they compared to 2010, which I appreciate the background. I think the question would be, okay, out of those 20, like, how many have them just in correction facilities, and how many are there out there?

Because I think, you know, the Legislature, if you want to dereg, or maybe change the regulatory structure, because I think under these circumstances, there is the possibility that you

eliminate the regulatory structure, and by doing that, they fall into another category that has more regulation. And so I think we have to be really thoughtful about just that elimination part.

But I think, you know, if there is 100, they probably would want to know that. If there is 100,000, they would want to know that. I don't think there is 100,000, but I really have never I mean, like, it's been probably a seen one. decade since I have seen a pay phone anywhere, and so maybe they just would want to know the numbers of what they are. And I presume we could get that from these providers that -- these 20 standing providers. I think probably wouldn't take a lot to ask them, you know, request a list, how many you have, how many sit in a corrections facility, and then we could space that out and then give the Legislature this information, because I think it would be the first thing I would ask. You know, as a legislator, you can appreciate -- you would want that information probably to decide what would be changed, you know, in the reporting requirements.

CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: The most interesting thing you said you hadn't seen one, and you pointed our that they are all in correction facilities. You

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1	haven't been in a correction facility.
2	COMMISSIONER FAY: That's really appropriate
3	and accurate, Mr. Chairman.
4	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Yeah, I don't disagree. I
5	think I agree. I would ask, right, where, you
6	know, how many are there, and where exactly are
7	they? Do we have I believe they are at some
8	point, the information got limited. Do we have
9	that ability, or at least to guide them in the
10	right direction?
11	MR. FRANKS: We could issue a data request and
12	try to get that information.
13	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Okay. Staff, does that
14	are there challenges with that?
15	MR. BAEZ: I am getting the no, so it's a
16	thumbs up.
17	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Okay. Okay. And it is a
18	limited number of companies, so I think hopefully
19	we can get that, you know, turned around. I don't
20	know if that should slow us down, but I think, at a
21	minimum, we would make that suggestion, or we would
22	make that comment that we have put this out there,
23	and we will obviously turn this information over as
24	soon as we get it.
25	COMMISSIONER FAY: And I definitely don't want

to hold it up, Mr. Chairman. I appreciate, like,
the timing that we are coming up on committee
meetings, and the Legislature had asked about this
previously and they want to, you know, potentially
move on it. I definitely don't want this, like,
one component to hold up what could be done.

But maybe if we were to submit it with the caveat that we are going to provide them with the additional -- we made the data request, and we are going to provide them with that information as soon as we have it, then maybe that would give, from a timing perspective, that would give them this information in a time period they could move if they choose to do so on anything. Whereas, I wouldn't want us to be delayed because these companies don't get that information back to us and then we are already into, you know, a few weeks into November, and suddenly they are just not able to act if they wanted to do so.

So I don't know how much time -- I guess,

Cayce, do you have any idea how much time it would

take them to respond to this kind of thing? I

mean, do we have any historical numbers or --

MR. HINTON: I think we can probably put a time limit on the data request response --

1	COMMISSIONER FAY: Okay.
2	MR. HINTON: and get it turned around
3	quickly. Then it's just a matter of chasing down
4	the people, which there will be some.
5	COMMISSIONER FAY: Yeah, out of the 20, I
6	guess there might be some of those. Okay, well,
7	yeah
8	MR. BAEZ: They are correctional facilities,
9	after all.
10	COMMISSIONER FAY: Yeah. I would be okay
11	supporting it either way, Mr. Chairman, if you want
12	to send it on with the caveat, or the asterisks, or
13	whatever, we will get them that information, then I
14	would support that too.
15	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: I think we can make that
16	change. Yeah. Excellent.
17	MR. FRANKS: Okay.
18	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Commissioners, any further
19	questions? Thoughts? Comments? Awesome. David,
20	good work.
21	I know when we started this, there wasn't a
22	whole lot of framework, right. So doing something
23	for the first time can be difficult, and I
24	appreciate your professionalism, and not just, you
25	know, what you have done here, but how you stepped

1	up in the agency, I am happy that you are with us,
2	and I am happy that you are taking the role.
3	MR. FRANKS: Thank you.
4	COMMISSIONER FAY: So don't go anywhere,
5	David, basically, the Chairman just
6	MR. FRANKS: Thank you.
7	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: All right. Let's move to
8	our General Counsel's report. I feel like I should
9	introduce you as the General Counsel.
10	MS. HARPER: You can do that.
11	Thank you, Mr. Chairman and Commissioners. I
12	will keep it brief, but we have been busy, so there
13	are a few items I would like to share.
14	First, I would like to recognize Shaw Stiller
15	as the supervisor now for the regulatory analysis
16	section. He is here.
17	(Applause.)
18	MS. HARPER: So he will still continue with
19	the FPL case, but he has moved into my old office
20	and is looking very comfortable in there. We are
21	glad that he is there, so excited to report on
22	that.
23	Also, we have been working out a few other
24	things. We are updating our GCL training
25	materials. We are going to be offering an in-house

1	CLE that Jon Rubottom is going to be offering soon.
2	We are also going to offer some ethics training
3	with the Commission on Ethics, who will be becoming
4	here in December. Susie coordinated that with
5	them.

We have also been playing around a lot with our AI, and sort of reporting internally on that, and what our likes and dislikes are, what we could possibly be using it for. We have HData, as you guys know, and we also have a new upgraded Westlaw that has an AI function that we have been using as well, and just sort of trying to get the swing of that, and that's been fun.

And I met with these good folks here with some legislative staff on our Open Government Sunset review Sunshine Law meetings exception, and that meeting seemed to go very well. So that's up for review, and I am sure David -- David was with us too -- he will report on that at some point, but that was a very protective meeting.

I am still very active and involved with the Energy Bar Association, so I have recruited a couple members to that, and we are planning our next event in March in Atlanta.

I am also attending the FSU luncheon, law

1	luncheon September 17th, so I will be trying to
2	recruit people there as well for possible externs
3	here.
4	So otherwise, we have just been really busy
5	with some upcoming hearings and upcoming dockets,
6	and that pretty much concludes my report, unless
7	you guys have any questions.
8	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Awesome.
9	Commissioners, are there any questions?
10	COMMISSIONER FAY: No Gator bias as you
11	recruit from the
12	MS. HARPER: Could be some of that. I will
13	not discriminate.
14	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Awesome. Thank you. And
15	obviously, a familiar voice and familiar face,
16	Adria Harper, our new General Counsel here at the
17	Commission, so thank you very much.
18	MS. HARPER: Thank you.
19	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Let's move to the Executive
20	Director's report. Mr. Baez.
21	MR. BAEZ: Thank you, Chairman, and good
22	morning, Commissioners.
23	What we have before us today is our draft
24	legislative budget request for the fiscal year
25	'26-'27. As we have had a practice of doing, we do

1	run a pretty flat budget request year-over-year,
2	and this year is no different. We are proposing
3	one issue that you have in front of you, and we
4	discussed this prior with your offices as well,
5	making the rounds. We are proposing an elimination
6	of four vacant positions at this point. We
7	continuously monitor our budget and positions and
8	administrative functions to ensure that our
9	resources are aligned with our needs on a constant
10	basis as best we can, and that we remain fiscally
11	responsible for both to both the PSC, obviously,
12	and the state of Florida, and that analysis is what
13	identifies this opportunity to streamline our
14	resources at this time.

Like many agencies, we have faced challenges, as you well know, in filling vacant positions. And in response, we strategically invest in streamlining processes, whether it's by implementing new technologies. You heard Adria talk a little bit about how they are getting -- familiarizing themselves with the use of AI technology in order to better their processes and make their work more -- or their time more productive at work. Likewise, this extends across the agency, just as an example, and also creating

operational efficiencies to address the staffing shortages. And as a result, that's why we are proposing to eliminate four vacant positions.

This has the fiscal impact of reducing salary costs by approximately 267 -- \$266,000, rounding up. And as to our next steps, our LBR is set to be filed on September 15th, and we are, at the moment, setting up our annual -- our customary meetings with the staff directors of the two, you know, budget subcommittees on both sides on the House and Senate after that meeting, which will be happening at some point very soon prior to filing. And we will be happy to debrief you as to how that goes and pass that along.

One of the things that we obviously would present our proposed LBR, if you are kind enough with your kind blessing, and, again, address whatever our trending shows and what our long-term projections, and we have a -- usually have a very good discussion to try and refamiliarize our staff, the budget staff directors with our long-term, you know, what our challenges are. They are very well versed. We have very good relationships with them over the years, and so it's a chance every year to, you know, in advance of the LBR to try and kind of

2.

1	remind them, you know, get back on their front
2	page, so it all goes well, and I would be happy to
3	report back to you all, whether here or
4	individually on it.
5	What we have here is merely what you have
6	in front of you, I think we have got a handout
7	that's in draft form. It also includes a more
8	detailed breakdown, actually, of our budget
9	categories as they get filed with the legisla
10	with the various legislative committees and
11	whatnot, and the Governor's Office.
12	So if you have any questions, I am happy to
13	answer them.
14	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Commissioners, any
15	questions?
16	I will kind of just maybe open the door on
17	something.
18	So there is not on here is what I am going
19	to, for lack of a better term, say that the
20	Legislature sometimes adds to our budget, which is
21	a
22	MR. BAEZ: Yes.
23	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: which is a general total
24	revenue fee, for lack of
25	MR. BAEZ: Oh, okay. Yes. We are there.

1	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Okay. So if our request is
2	\$31.3 million, it comes out of the trust fund. We
3	don't receive general revenue dollars. It will
4	approve us for a higher dollar amount to then pay
5	back to general revenue, or to pay back to yeah,
6	to pay back to the Legislature as a
7	MR. BAEZ: What you are asking what you are
8	asking if you can
9	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Yeah, please.
10	MR. BAEZ: restate it is, is the 31 million
11	operating budget
12	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Right.
13	MR. BAEZ: does it include or not include
14	this add-on, this
15	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Yeah, it looks like it
16	doesn't.
17	MR. BAEZ: It doesn't
18	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Right.
19	MR. BAEZ: no.
20	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Right, so what is that
21	dollars
22	MR. BAEZ: This is just operating in-house.
23	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: So walk me through. How
24	does that typically work, and how does that get
25	tacked on? I was just kind of assuming by saying

1	that the Legislature adds on to it, bare minimum,
2	they don't have to give us a higher spending
3	amount.
4	MR. BAEZ: So every year, we provide an
5	estimate of revenues
6	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Right.
7	MR. BAEZ: to the Legislature, or to is
8	it to OPP? I am now, I'm it's to OPP, and
9	based on our based on our in-year, you know,
10	current year projected revenues
11	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Right.
12	MR. BAEZ: that produces that produces
13	an estimated eight percent gross revenue
14	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Right.
15	MR. BAEZ: charge. And so then when they
16	when they give us when the Legislature gives
17	us budget authority to spend this operating budget
18	that we are asking for, there is a true-up, there
19	is an upward adjustment to include that estimate.
20	Again, it's a based on however the numbers
21	have changed by then, but they include our
22	estimate. That does not touch our bank account.
23	That is to say, we don't we don't even though
24	budget authority has been given in a gross as a
25	gross matter, for 34 million, let's say, I think we

1	are roughly at three million now.
2	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Sure.
3	MR. BAEZ: We are only operating with the 31.
4	There is no that three million, or whatever the
5	number, hard number, winds up going, just kind of
6	gets redirected elsewhere.
7	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Go ahead.
8	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Tell me, are those
9	numbers included in the actual LBR document itself?
10	MR. BAEZ: Yeah.
11	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Can you send us a copy of
12	that?
13	MR. BAEZ: As soon as as soon as it gets
14	as soon as it gets filed, we will be able to draw
15	back what was filed.
16	COMMISSIONER CLARK: You don't have a you
17	don't have a copy that you did this from?
18	MR. BAEZ: I know that there is some
19	disconnect between it's filed electrically, as
20	you know, and so it becomes I am unclear as to
21	whether we can work in draft in that until we
22	until we upload. I will get you an answer and try
23	and and try and see if we can get what that
24	what which number exactly are you interested?
25	COMMISSIONER CLARK: The whole thing. I mean,

1	the entire LBR.
2	MR. BAEZ: So we can get that?
3	MS. LYNN: So the sche those numbers will
4	be represented in your Schedule 1. So when we
5	submit the LBR, the non-operating and operating
6	budget authority and request will be in your
7	Schedule 1, so we can get you a draft of that when
8	that's done.
9	COMMISSIONER CLARK: So when do you plan to
10	submit it?
11	MS. LYNN: So it's due September 15th.
12	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Okay.
13	THE WITNESS: And it's not quite done yet. It
14	goes through an audit and a process, because it is
15	a part of the LBR.
16	COMMISSIONER CLARK: So we don't know that
17	these numbers are correct yet?
18	THE WITNESS: Right. Well, they are pretty
19	much correct. So the draft means that once we get
20	all the numbers in and all the reports in, then
21	there may be some tweaks on these numbers, but not
22	significantly.
23	So in during the March months of
24	March-ish, the Legislature asks us what do we think
25	our non-operating costs will be, and so we give

1	them an estimate of \$3 million, and they give us
2	the budget authority based on our estimate. So we
3	get the budget authority to spend the non-operating
4	up to \$3 million, and that's the above the
5	operating costs that you were just mentioning.
6	COMMISSIONER CLARK: And I think the Chairman
7	asked this, but that money is allocated to exactly
8	what, the non-operating dollars?
9	MS. LYNN: It's allocated to spend on
10	non-operating costs, so your service charge to GR
11	and also fees.
12	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Is that, like, our
13	building payments to DMS?
14	MS. LYNN: No. So those are operating costs.
15	COMMISSIONER CLARK: So those are payments to
16	GR. Explain that in a little more detail to me. I
17	get we are just giving them back money, but
18	MS. LYNN: So we are assessed a fee of eight
19	percent of our revenues that we have to pay to GR.
20	We, along with other a few agencies have that
21	same assessment, and it's based in statute.
22	COMMISSIONER CLARK: And they give us the
23	money to pay them back with?
24	MS. LYNN: They give us authority to use our
25	trust fund dollars to pay that back.

1	
1	COMMISSIONER CLARK: It came out of our trust
2	fund
3	MR. BAEZ: It does.
4	COMMISSIONER CLARK: I though we were getting
5	a general revenue allocation.
6	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: No. No. Actually that's
7	the point I was making. It just comes out our
8	trust fund.
9	COMMISSIONER CLARK: You've got me confused.
10	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Yeah. Yeah. It just comes
11	out of our trust fund
12	MS. LYNN: Right.
13	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: and then I think I am
14	hopefully closing your loop here, where does the
15	money go? Do we write a check?
16	MS. LYNN: Yes, we do.
17	COMMISSIONER CLARK: So we are taking 34
18	million out of the trust fund, but 31 million is
19	operating?
20	MS. LYNN: Roughly, yeah.
21	MR. BAEZ: Yes, sir.
22	COMMISSIONER CLARK: So we don't show those
23	why don't we show those dollars? That's, I guess
24	my confusion.
25	MS. LYNN: Well, we show them, but they are

1	just
2	COMMISSIONER CLARK: We are eliminating the
3	trust fund three million a year.
4	MS. LYNN: Right, they are shown in the
5	Schedule 1. So this document, the LBR itself, is
6	based only on your operating costs. So we can only
7	ask for or make adjustments to operating
8	expenditures. So those there is just two
9	separate pictures, two separate buckets, but they
10	are both represented in your full LBR, and we can
11	definitely get you a copy of that.
12	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Mr. Chairman, I would
13	really like for us to have a copy of that.
14	MS. LYNN: Oh, yeah.
15	COMMISSIONER CLARK: I know I remember going
16	through it a couple of years ago, but if you don't
17	stay right on top of it, you kind of forget some
18	things.
19	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: So is it possible let me
20	ask this question, and then I will go back to what
21	I am about to say. Is the Schedule 1 broken down
22	the same way that these categories are, just kind
23	of chart of accounts?
24	MS. LYNN: No.
25	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: It's not, it's different?

1	MS. LYNN: Yes, it's different.
2	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Okay. But the totals would
3	be, like, as you are saying more
4	MR. BAEZ: Approximate, yeah.
5	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Okay. Then what I was
6	about to say was can that Schedule 1 be circulated
7	to us before it's submitted, which is only in 10
8	days, 11 days?
9	MS. LYNN: Yes.
10	MR. BAEZ: I think, yes.
11	MS. LYNN: We will get you a draft.
12	MR. BAEZ: We will get you a draft.
13	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Is that
14	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Absolutely.
15	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: That's cool?
16	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Yes.
17	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: And then, again, sorry for
18	rehashing something. The eight-percent, I will
19	call it general revenue service charge, is not on
20	that LBR. That's something that after review
21	MR. BAEZ: It does
22	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: It is on the there?
23	MR. BAEZ: estimated that estimated
24	number.
25	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Is there?

1	MR. BAEZ: Is there.
2	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Okay. All right. Further
3	questions, Commissioners?
4	MR. BAEZ: Did I get that I want to say it
5	sits at, like, 3.3 now, somewhere around three
6	million, if I am recalling, and that's based on our
7	projection of revenues for the year.
8	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: And as we monitor or, you
9	know, survey RAF fees and the trust fund, that is
10	calculated into it, that assumption is calculated
11	into it?
12	MR. BAEZ: Yes, because it would it would
13	fit into the numbers that impact what the
14	Commission's projections in out years
15	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Sure.
16	MR. BAEZ: for example, how our rev you
17	know, how we see the revenues projecting and
18	expenditures expenditures, again, in a balance
19	sheet sense
20	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Right.
21	MR. BAEZ: you get it would be worked
22	in, because that creates pressure on, if nothing
23	else, on the trust fund balance, you know,
24	generally. So when you are projecting that, yes,
25	the GR component is included.

1 COMMISSIONER CLARK: And that's been, I quess, 2. kind of where I have been going with this, Mr. 3 Chairman, is we can actually have an impact on the RAFs if we can eliminate the contributions back to 4 5 the general trust -- to the general fund out of our own trust fund, we could actually lower the RAFs. 7 Let's keep our own money and operate our own 8 business.

CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Yeah, and that's the angle I was trying to go down to fully understand and digest, is that if we made -- I know this is a budgetary process and not necessarily a policy process, but if we, like, we just sit here in the Efficiency Team and say, hey, we are identifying these things to make us more efficient, in all technicality, identifying that there is a charge that would basically save us money, save our operating, overall operating costs, which would then result in our trust fund, which is ultimately being paid by RAF fees, which are customers, could that -- I quess, where is there room to make that suggestion, because I understood it, and maybe more as a layman, is that the eight-percent general revenue is intended for agencies that are General Revenue funded agencies, maybe. I don't know,

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1	that's not for us that's a policy decision
2	that's not for us.
3	MR. BAEZ: Right, not the expert on general
4	revenue policy, but I think I think you there
5	is a logic to what you just said, right.
6	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Sure.
7	MR. BAEZ: I mean, I think we would all land
8	there, sure.
9	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: I guess, in a perfect
10	world, what I would like to see is us recommending
11	or us pointing out that if this was not charged,
12	that there is a trickle-down effect that could
13	affect us as an operating commission
14	MR. BAEZ: Yeah.
15	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: and the ratepayers in
16	which we serve.
17	MR. BAEZ: Absolutely.
18	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: positively.
19	MR. BAEZ: Well, that's part of that's part
20	of what goes on in these discussions in the, you
21	know, with our budget directors. The catch here to
22	all of this, I mean, is that it is a statutory
23	it's a statutory requirement that's placed
24	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Understood.
25	MR. BAEZ: on this agency and others.

1	obviously, and so now you are talking statutory
2	changes. So it's I mean, while I would agree
3	with you that maintaining it at the forefront in
4	terms of discussion and shining a light on, you
5	know, that, again, the logic of the why is
6	absolutely necessary. In order to make that
7	change, it does involve a change in law which, you
8	know, again, that's a whole other process subject
9	to its own vagrancies.
10	COMMISSIONER CLARK: But not unprecedented
11	MR. BAEZ: No, not unprecedented.
12	COMMISSIONER CLARK: because other agencies
13	have gotten their
14	MR. BAEZ: That's absolutely true.
15	COMMISSIONER CLARK: general revenue
16	requirements lowest
17	MR. BAEZ: There are there are
18	COMMISSIONER CLARK: some have petitioned
19	for none.
20	MR. BAEZ: Yeah. If you look at if you
21	look at just a cursory inspection of the statute,
22	it does include exemptions. Now, a lot of those
23	exemptions and, Commissioner Clark, you probably
24	have the most experience with the example, again,
25	given your experiences, you know, there are

there is trust funds, again, perhaps some managed by DEP, for example, that are created by, like, a gift, you know, of an estate, and so forth. And those trust funds are -- trust funds like of that nature are exempted naturally in the statute.

But, yes, the opportunity is there to have the discussion, and that's something that we would definitely -- we have had and definitely intend on continuing. How much -- how much more volume we want to raise on it, again, is a fair discussion to have culminating in y'alls direction. I mean, obviously it's a matter of everyone agreeing that we should go and pursue a change in law, for example.

CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Yeah. And the way I feel about this is that if one of these items, right, in this chart of accounts, or this breakdown, was to have a certain amount of something that I felt that we didn't need, let's say vehicles, right, that would be an easy one, and said you had to have six new vehicles every year, or something crazy like that, and we didn't use that, I would say, well, hold on, like, we need, you know, the statute says that this is how we utilize that differently, because maybe we don't travel as much, or whatever

1	the reason was at the time has now changed.
2	That's kind of what I feel about this, is that
3	I don't know why it was implemented
4	MR. BAEZ: Who can tell?
5	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: but it's hard for me to
6	sit back and see where there could be a savings to,
7	frankly, in this case, to both the taxpayers and
8	ratepayers, specifically ratepayers in this
9	scenario, and not make an issue, not necessarily an
10	issue, but not bring it to the forefront and say,
11	hey, here is the way how we can be more
12	effective and more efficient with the dollars that
13	we spend and the actions that we take.
14	So I think I am agreeing with the direction
15	you are going, is that I would like to pursue and
16	at least make notice. How we do that officially is
17	maybe what I am a little bit more caught up on.
18	MR. BAEZ: I mean, again, I have we have
19	expressed our intent certainly to continue raising
20	the issue in discussions at the level at which we
21	have access on a daily basis. For us to, you know,
22	for example, to have David, you know, go through
23	the motions and do something in a bit more formal
24	capacity, that, you know, that would take a
25	discussion amongst the Commission and to issue that

1	directive. I think there are a lot of variables
2	that play into that, obviously, and it's always up
3	for consideration.
4	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Is there any variable that,
5	off the top of your head and I don't want to
б	overcomplicate it that you could say that, hey,
7	this could be a challenge for us now, and why we
8	shouldn't consider taking this first steps forward?
9	MR. BAEZ: I think I think that well, I
10	think, like everything, the narrative matters. And
11	I have had this discussion with pretty much all of
12	you in one form or another over this time. The
13	narrative matters, and if it if it were if it
14	presented as, you know, as a sense of urgency, an
15	emergency situation to which this was a piece of
16	the solution, temporary at first, perhaps, you know
17	how things how inertia a works, it kind of makes
18	itself permanent, constant, great, is do we have
19	that sense of urgency? I can't sit here and tell
20	you that that exists at the moment.
21	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: What you do mean urgency?
22	Urgency
23	MR. BAEZ: For instance, if we were so when
24	this consideration conversation, when this
25	eight-percent kind of started gaining a little bit

1	of momentum at least in conversations amongst the
2	executive staff as to how to we were in a much,
3	much more dire fiscal position in terms of trust
4	fund balances
5	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Gotcha.
6	MR. BAEZ: going forward. We remember
7	those days.
8	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: That's what you are talking
9	about?
10	MR. BAEZ: Right. And so at that point, you
11	know, raising the general revenue issue itself, or
12	whether it was that, or it was, you know, turning
13	over the couches for spare change, you know, there
14	is a sense of urgency that drives these, you know,
15	solutions that get proposed.
16	We did have preliminary discussions that
17	didn't really and again, you know as well,
18	perhaps better than anyone, you know, sometimes the
19	climate isn't about talking about that, right. So
20	you have to find a willing listener as well. And
21	so we have corrected that through much hard effort
22	on the part of our, you know, management in general
23	over the years, we have corrected that, and, again,
24	as well, by your blessing to join us in our effort,
25	you know, to rebalance the RAF rate so that they

1	more closely align with the cost causing as an
2	agency in terms of workload and stuff. That was
3	big for us.
4	It continues to our situation continues to
5	improve, not just because of that, but because of
6	external, you know, stuff that's beyond our
7	control. And I won't bore you with the details of
8	that, but it's a long conversation.
9	Having said that, yeah, ultimately, we are not
10	in the kind of dire fiscal issue fiscal position
11	in the out years, right, the two, three, four, five
12	years
13	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: I get it, from a this is
14	all from a trust fund perspective
15	MR. BAEZ: Right.
16	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: and funds available?
17	MR. BAEZ: And so there is nothing that we can
18	point at, you know, directly to say
19	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: I understand.
20	MR. BAEZ: we really, you know, this is
21	going to save us, you know.
22	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: You want to arm wrestle?
23	COMMISSIONER CLARK: And yeah.
24	MR. BAEZ: However, I mean, I think
25	Commissioner Clark's point is well taken, and this

1	
1	is a point that all of you have made individually,
2	mind you. Not to steal Commissioner Clark's
3	thunder, but I think he puts it well. It does have
4	it does have at least a one-step removed direct
5	type of impact into the costs that we pass on
6	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Yeah
7	MR. BAEZ: Right?
8	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: I get it.
9	MR. BAEZ: Right. Now, is it a today it's
10	good, then let's lower it today, and that? Now,
11	that's a different that's a different outlook.
12	If nothing else, it helps keep our trust fund
13	solvent longer with less pressuring.
14	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: And that's the point, see.
15	And that's the urgency that I come from, is that
16	you shouldn't need something to take action. I
17	think that
18	MR. BAEZ: I agree.
19	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Yeah, and that's why I was
20	trying to direct
21	MR. BAEZ: Agree totally.
22	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: what you are saying
23	about the trust fund. And I am not I am not
24	disagreeing with what you were explaining, because
25	I think you were explaining it truly from a trust

1	fund perspective.
2	MR. BAEZ: Yeah.
3	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: I understand that. But for
4	me, the urgency is that we should always be running
5	as sharp as we possibly can. And kind of similar
6	to my note earlier, is that it's hard for me to
7	know about something and not be pointing it out.
8	And at the end of the day, the Legislature, they
9	are in control. They make the laws. They ponder,
10	they go through decision-making and discussions and
11	debate, and do their own, obviously, independent
12	research as they feel necessary. I hope to be an
13	extension and resource to them as an agency.
14	So I think it's I think it's bestowed upon
15	us to pursue this, frankly, to point this out. And
16	if there is other reasons, so let it be. That's
17	fine. I can live with we live with all the
18	decisions they implement as they see necessary.
19	But I see this as something saying, hey, I do think
20	we need to take the extra effort. I do think that
21	we need to point this out.
22	I don't know why historically this has done or
23	not been done, or why other agencies have maybe
24	lowered and are at different numbers than we are,
25	but I think that this is our part of our

1	responsibility because I think we know it best,
2	personally.
3	MR. BAEZ: No disagreement from me. I mean,
4	look, my low level OCD won't allow me to accept in
5	my mind, can't square in my mind why, you know, an
6	agency such as ours, that has that's 100-percent
7	trust funded, and we have the funding mechanism,
8	think of what you may, to have those operations,
9	now all of a sudden has to become a revenue center
10	outside of the normal normally understood
11	revenue mechanisms for to fund general revenue.
12	That again, that's the logic that doesn't square
13	with me.
14	However, that, to me, is an argument in
15	principle. That, to me, is an argument that
16	doesn't have a yeah, it's patently not fair to
17	use, but there is no, you know, what who is
18	getting like, who is where's the blood, you
19	know?
20	I agree with you. I think it allows us to
21	it might allow us to better nail down, you know, a
22	number, because now we are only operating now
23	you all are actually blessing an operating budget.
24	Now you can now it's meaningful to say, hey, we
25	are too high here, too low there, whatever the case

1	may be, because you are doing it free of this thing
2	that you no one can control, no one here anyway,
3	can control.
4	My prayer to you is just really is to if
5	that's something that you want to pursue, then I
6	think we would need, like, some direction to if
7	more than what I am describing to you, you know,
8	kind of keeping the discussion alive at the level
9	in which we can access. If to go beyond that means
10	putting things in writing, on the record with
11	direction and going and pursuing a change in law,
12	and that, you know, fine, happy to we would be
13	more than happy to pursue it, but I think it takes
14	clear direction. That's a Commission thing.
15	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Sure.
16	Commissioner Clark.
17	COMMISSIONER CLARK: And I think it's right.
18	I think, you know, subject to the entire
19	Commission's agreement on this concept, it's
20	something I have been long, long discussed
21	pursuing.
22	I think it's a twofold approach. I think we
23	can instruct staff, if we are in agreement, to
24	begin having those conversations, that we want to
25	pursue this. And I think that it's a twofold

1	approach, Mr. Chairman. I think your efficiency
2	committee, I think this kind of plays right into
3	what they are doing, and the alignments they have
4	already began looking at some of the specific
5	efficiencies. This is this is as good as it
6	gets. I mean, these are substantial numbers of
7	dollars, and coming back from the committee's
8	perspective with an exact recommendation to the
9	Commission in time to get in front of this
10	legislative this legislative committee that's
11	coming up, I think it would be very appropriate. I
12	would highly encourage us to pursue it.
13	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Commissioner Fay.
14	COMMISSIONER FAY: Yeah, I mean, I would just
15	add, conceptually, it seems worth discussing. I
16	mean, I would be interested, to your point, if the
17	Efficiency Committee looked at it. I would be
18	interested in to know, okay, well, what agencies
19	are solely trust fund, right, that don't have GR?
20	And I didn't know there were agencies exempt
21	from this. So hearing that is new information to
22	me. So if there are other agencies that already
23	are not in this category, then, to your point, the
24	reasoning behind that might be very valid and
25	consistent with the way our agency is structured.

1	I mean, as a legislative agency, we are probably
2	already different in a lot of ways, and so that
3	discussion is probably worth having.
4	I mean, to Braulio's point, when he mentioned
5	this to me, I thought conceptually, our budget
6	looked like it was in pretty good shape, and so
7	looking at that, I think, well, why would we pursue
8	this? But I think hearing what you and
9	Commissioner Clark presented today, there is
10	probably some valid components to look at, is this
11	where's the downstream impact? Like, who
12	where is it actually impacting, and why are we
13	doing that? And then, to your point, giving the
14	Legislature the ability to decide what they would
15	want to do with it, but I would, like, I think we
16	are just giving David all kinds of work here.
17	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: In the back of my mind, I
18	keep thinking, poor David, we are about to bring
19	him forward, or at least tell him, like, hey, this
20	is the direction we want to go.
21	COMMISSIONER FAY: Yeah, but that would be
22	information, like, I would be absolutely interested
23	in as to who doesn't pay the current, you know,
24	eight percent, or whatever, and how we correlate to
25	that, and, you know, that sort of thing. So that

1	information is readily available, like, I would
2	love to know that.
3	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Uh-huh. Okay. Excellent,
4	and I am agreeing with both Commissioner Clark and
5	Commissioner Fay.
6	Anybody else?
7	Commissioner Passidomo Smith.
8	COMMISSIONER PASSIDOMO SMITH: I will say, we
9	have had discussions, and I have said the same
10	thing over and over. I just yeah, and I like
11	the way the both of you put it in the efficiency
12	aspect. It just makes a lot more sense to me. And
13	I think, you know, if you kind of monitor the tone
14	of the Legislature right now, I think they would be
15	really amenable to something like that. I think
16	that that's something that they are interested in
17	as well, is, you know, we want to save, you know,
18	taxpayers money. We want to be an efficient
19	government, and I think that we generally pride
20	ourself the state prides itself on being that
21	way, so
22	And I do think, Commissioner Fay, I think that
23	information is already available, we have talked
24	you have it.
25	MR. BAEZ: It's somewhere.

1	COMMISSIONER PASSIDOMO SMITH: I'm sure you
2	got it, you know, like, in a file, like ready to
3	go. So there is ways to, you know, to make an
4	argument as to why that could apply to us as well.
5	MR. BAEZ: And I just want to be clear. When
6	I said that there is exemptions out there, they are
7	targeted exemptions. I don't want to imply that
8	there is any agency specifically, although there
9	may be one, I just don't know of it.
10	COMMISSIONER FAY: You said there is agencies.
11	COMMISSIONER CLARK: I think Ag has a
12	six-percent.
13	MR. BAEZ: They have a they've got a
14	lower
15	COMMISSIONER CLARK: They've got a lower
16	MR. BAEZ: Yeah.
17	COMMISSIONER FAY: Not exemption.
18	COMMISSIONER CLARK: And I was clear on that
19	one. I said there are some who have exemptions and
20	some discount.
21	MR. BAEZ: Having a department discount
22	well, obviously, there is some there may be some
23	flex there as well, even within the concept. So we
24	will explore them all. And to be clear, I mean, I
25	think just by this discussion alone, I feel

personally as comfortable as I have ever felt to be
able to talk about this with, you know, our
cohorts, in a wider sense, you know, downtown.
Again, to me there is a clear distinction running
an agency bill, or having a legislative a
full-on legislative effort is a little bit
different in my mind than this that we are saying
is, like, yes, let's keep let's keep sounding
the bell, you know, let's keep ringing the bell,
and to keep talking about it and see if we can't
get some rule, start doing that, you know, we will
renew our efforts as soon as possible, hopefully in
time. I mean, again, if we get a willing, you
know, if we get a willing friendly ear, there is no
telling what can be accomplished now in time for
session.
CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: So let's do this, are we
Commissioners are, we good? Any further thought?
Specifically to this, or to this service fee,
it's September, Internal Affairs is again in
October. I don't recall a date in front of me, but
I know we have got a lot going on, a lot of moving
pieces on the calendar in that month.
MR. BAEZ: I think it's the 7th.
CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Okay. Yeah, so the early

1	part. It's almost a month from now. Let's have
2	the Efficiency Team look at this, the information
3	you may have, any other independent research that
4	Mr. Franks, yeah, can come up with. The team will
5	meet. We will discuss, and let's present something
6	back for the October 7th Internal Affairs meeting.
7	That will give us, you know, still good time,
8	right. Hopefully we can turn it over to the
9	Legislature in some form or fashion.
10	I think more than anything, it's important,
11	from at least my perspective, is that we make the
12	informed disclosure, call it, in the sense that,
13	hey, this is something that our Commissioners have
14	decided to pursue, and so let that be, and then
15	maybe there is some statutory recommendation, but I
16	think the more important part than putting
17	MR. BAEZ: I think
18	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: a bill in front of
19	them
20	MR. BAEZ: I think if you just point a finger
21	at the problem
22	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: A thousand percent, and I
23	think that's that would be important for us to
24	elicit, initiate and start based on the findings we
25	get from the Efficiency Team, but I think I can

1	probably, you know, assume what they are going to
2	be, is that, hey, this fee is unique and different
3	from to us compared in comparison to other
4	agencies.
5	I think it's very unique what we do here.
6	There is five of us. Five of us Commissioners. I
7	it's very different from other agencies that may
8	have a secretary and, obviously, operate in a very
9	different way. I think that's hopefully it
10	comes with a little more weight that five of us
11	have deliberated, and hopefully five of us have
12	agreed on the direction that we are going.
13	So, again, so go ahead, if this can be sent
14	back to the Efficiency Team, the Efficiency Team
15	can review whenever that meeting is, or maybe we
16	will call a special meeting so that we can bring
17	back if front of us for the next Internal Affairs.
18	MR. BAEZ: Okay. And the only thing left to
19	do here is to say grace over at least our the
20	LBR proposal. They don't walk, you know, if y'all
21	got any other questions, but
22	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Yeah, let's close the gap
23	on that.
24	COMMISSIONER FAY: I just have a question. So
25	we submit to your point, what we submit to them

1 is the actual electronic LBR version, it includes, 2 like, the Schedule 8B and all that stuff? 3 MR. BAEZ: All of that good stuff. 4 COMMISSIONER FAY: And so this is for purposes 5 for us? 6 MR. BAEZ: Yes. 7 COMMISSIONER FAY: It doesn't include the 8 non-operating --9 MR. BAEZ: Right. 10 COMMISSIONER FAY: Okay. So all of that other 11 information, to your point, will go to them like it 12 normally would? 13 It's a huge, it's, like, 150, being MR. BAEZ: 14 200 pages sometimes. 15 COMMISSIONER FAY: Sounds fun. 16 MR. BAEZ: Yeah, it's a lot of paper. 17 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: It is possible to get us 18 Schedule 1 before then? 19 MR. BAEZ: I think we can. 20 Electrically. COMMISSIONER CLARK: 21 CHATRMAN LA ROSA: Not in a binder. 22 MR. BAEZ: In PDF. 23 CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Okay. 24 MR. BAEZ: We will do our best to get it to

you.

25

1	COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you.
2	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: All right. So do we take a
3	vote on that?
4	MR. BAEZ: A nod will do. I mean, if you are
5	all in agreement for us to move forward with the
6	file as we have represented, again, there are
7	numbers out there that we don't control.
8	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Sure. Sure. Okay.
9	MR. BAEZ: Thank you.
10	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: All right. Seeing no
11	opposition, let's move forward with that.
12	MR. BAEZ: Appreciate it.
13	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: All right. Let me find my
14	schedule here.
15	All right. Anything else, Executive Director?
16	That was it?
17	MR. BAEZ: That is the balance of the report.
18	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: Okay.
19	MR. BAEZ: I think I have taken up enough of
20	your time.
21	CHAIRMAN LA ROSA: It's all good. All good.
22	All right. Commissioners, any further
23	business before us?
24	I am going to turn to my Advisor, 1:30? See,
25	that's why I was smart to do that.

1	All right. So Ten-Year Site Plan following
2	this meeting back in the hearing room. We are
3	going to push that to 1:30, so 1:30 start for the
4	Ten-Year Site Plan. Hopefully that will give us
5	enough time for those to break to have lunch.
6	All right. See you guys there. This meeting
7	is adjourned.
